# **Personal Service in** the Telephone Job

The idea of the Public Utility Services, as it has become recognized both by users and organizations supplying service, is that the service must be adequate and that all desiring service must be served under practices that do not discriminate.

In the case of the Telephone the results desired from the service require the cooperation of three parties because the the service is a distinctly personal one. These three parties are the Telephone Company, The Party Calling, and The Called Party.

When the housewife lifts the receiver from the hook, after having signaled central, she must call for the desired number, the company must set up a clear voice track all the way from her telephone to the other and the party called must answer the telephone before conversation can take place.


Should any one of the three fail the call can not be completed. If the number is correctly given, or if the connection is not properly made, or if the party called does not answer, the object of the call is not attained. Only the second of these operations can be performed by the Telephone Company; the other two must be done by the users of the telephone.

Therein lies the personal character of telephone service. Satisfactory results can be attained where there is complete cooperation between the users at both ends of the lines and the Telephone Company which furnishes the connection between them.




