Record Crop Is Indicated By the Government Report

Washington, D. C., Oct. 8 .- According to the condition report of the Department of Agriculture released here today, as of Oct. 1, this year's cotton crop will be the largest ever grown, totalling 16,627,000 bales, as compared with the previous record crop of 16,135,000 bales produced in 1914. The report today shows a gain of 817,000 bales since the previous forecast in the middle of September.

Cotton of this year's crop ginned prior to Oct. 1 totalled 5,639,284 running bales, counting 162,041 round bales as half bales and including linters, compared with 7,round bales, to that date last year, the census bureau announced today.

The condition on Sept. 16 was 59.5 810,000 bales. Last year's produc-168.4 pounds, compared with

160.0 pounds a fortnight ago and 167.2 pounds the final yield last year. Texas condition was reported as 59 350,000; ginnings 2,048,705.

Following the report today the market suffered another severe decline in price going into new low levels for the season.

Early Newspapers Met Opposition of Church

The first newspaper was produced when written accounts of the imperial armies of Rome were sent to the generals in command in all parts of the provinces.

In 1566 the first official news sheets were published in Venice. They were written by hand and exhibited in public places. People paid the small coin of a gazzetta to read them. Hence the name. The church opposed the enterprise, and Pope Gregory even prosecuted the editors.

The oldest form of newspaper in England was in the beginning of the reign of James II-the so-called News-Letters, written by hand, and sent by post to subscribers in the country. In 1709 the first daily paper, the Dally Courant, was issued.

The oldest of the London daily papers, the Morning Chronicle, appeared in 1769. The Morning Post is the oldest of existing morning papers. Founded in 1772, it was followed about 1788 by the first daily evening paper, the Star.

The Times first appeared in 1788 as a continuation of the Daily Universal Register. Its originator and owner, Mr. John Walter, succeeded in 1814 in printing the Times by

In 1845 the Daily News was founded, with the help of Charles Dickens. It was the first paper to lower its price from 6 pence to 8 pence, (12 to 6 cents).

Midnight Sun to Be

Seen Only in Summer The midnight sun is visible within the Arctic circle at and near midnummer. The sun is then observed to skirt the horizon without dipping below it. This results from the incilnation of the earth's axis to the plane of its orbit. The elevation of the pole at any given spot is equal to the latitude of that spot; and the sun's polar distance on midsummer day being 66% degrees, the sun can barely graze the horizon. Still further north the aldnight sun is observed for some days before and after midsummer; and at the pole itself a day of six months begins at the spring equinex, the sun circling at first round the rim of the horizon, then in gradually more elevated circles parallel to it. At the North cape, latitude 731/4 degrees borth, the midnight sun is visible from May 12 to July 29. At no place in ingland has the sun been visible at

The cotton boll weevil, one of the worst enemies of American agriculture, threatens to be unusually numerous this year, according to United States Department of Agriculture scouts sent out against the armies of insect pests. Both in the older cotton regions of the South and in the Arizona fields the overwintering insects have been found in considerable numbers. At Tallulah, La., an examlustion of Spanish moss, in which the weevils usually take shelter for the winter, disclosed 280 of them to a ton of moss, as compared with 16 a ton in 1924, 299 a ton in 1923 and 137
