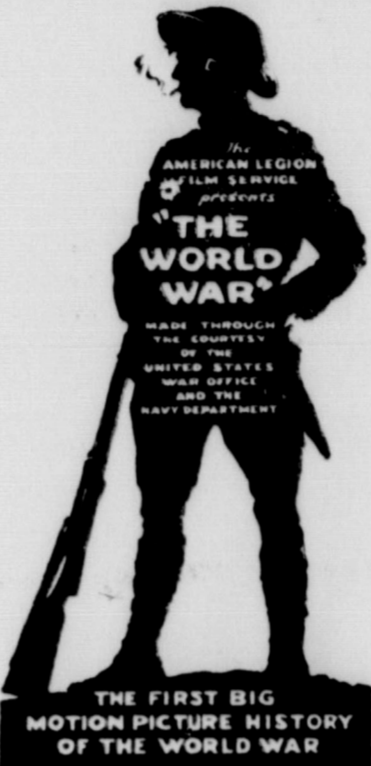

Epochal War Film to Be Shown Here Soon

"The World War" Portrays Titanic Conflict with World as Theatre, and Nations Playing Minor Roles.

The American Legion announces that it has secured the only Motion Picture History of The World War, and at a great expense has arranged for this Thrilling and Authentic Camera Record of the greatest war in all history to be shown in Crowell.

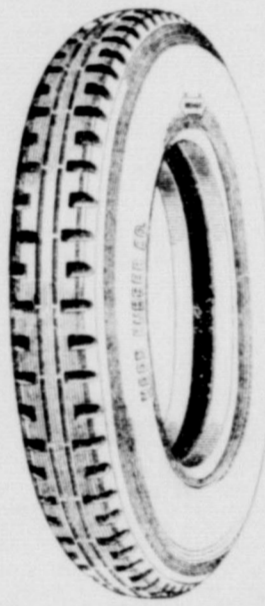

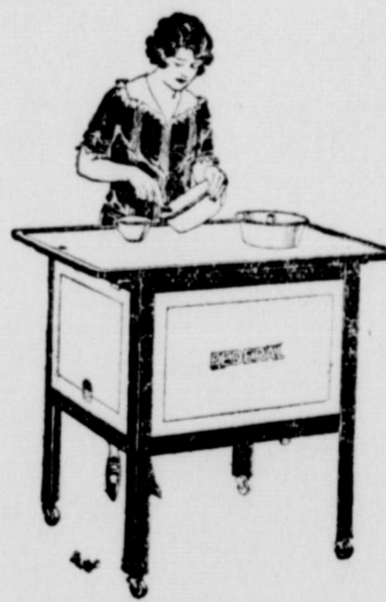

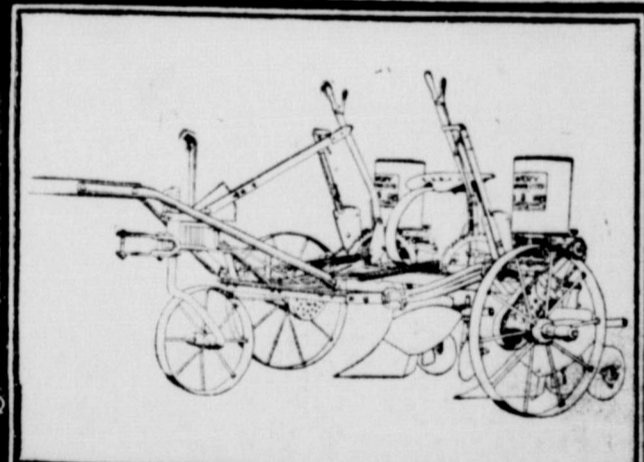
