ELECTRA, June 11 .- More than one hundred people including several visitors from neighboring cities and a number of farmers from surrounding communities, attended the quarterly meeting of the Electra Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture Friday night to hear reports on the Pease and Red River Valleys Irrigation Project which is being promoted as an inter-city project by the cities of Electra, Vernon, Burkburnett, Quanah and Crowell. Crowell School Bonds Sold To Dallas Company

Good progress is being made toward the erection of new school building in Crowell, as is evidenced by the fact that the \$80,000 bonds have been approved and sold and the bonds are now being printed. Brown & Crummer of Dallas are the purchasers of the bonds, and a premium of \$4,000 was paid for the bonds with accrued interest.

This progress puts the school board in position where it can go forward with construction of the building, and with little fear of serious delay. If everything works well, it should not be many weeks until the contract can be let and actual construction work started. We are told that the contract will likely be let within the next two or three weeks.

It has been the hope of the school board that the building may be completed and ready for use when the fall term opens. The patrons and pupils of the school have also shared that hope, but it can hardly be expected that that aim will be reached, for there are always some hindrances to be expected. But with no serious problems to be solved the building should be completed sometime in the


