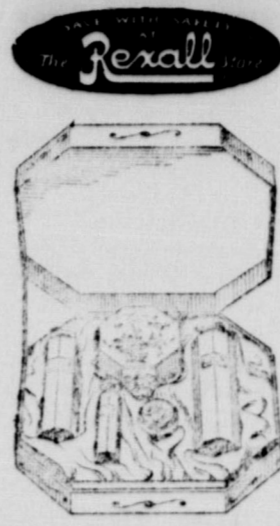

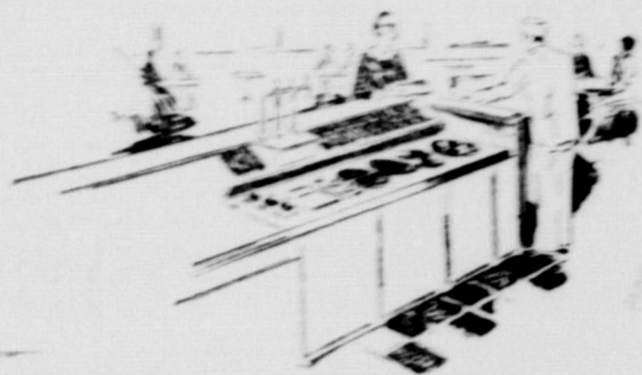

He says one test was made for oil at a depth of 4000 feet and that a good grade was found, but the question is whether it can be pumped out of a depth so great at a cost that is not prohibitive.

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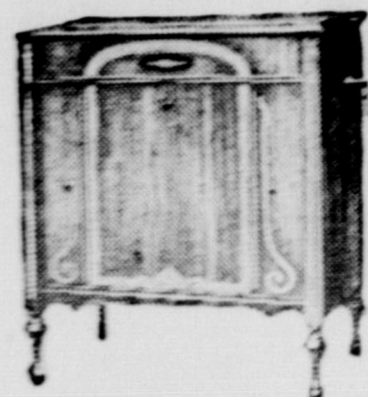

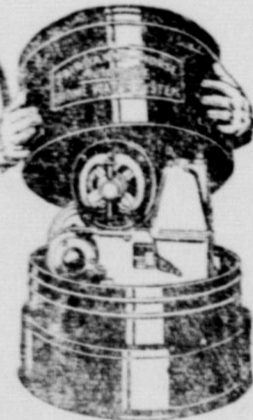

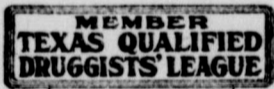

Commissioner W. J. Tucker is expected here at an early date to go over the situation with officials of the San Angelo Board of City Development.

whose rights to oil royalties have been jeopardized by action of the state in seeking to declare unconstitutional an act of the legislature granting one sixteenth of the oil to land owners purchasing state land. Under the old law the state retained the mineral rights of state land. The legislature passed a bill giving the land owners one half of the royalty and acting in good faith the landowners permitted oil operations on their land. Should the bill be declared void, title to royalties on many thousand acres of West Texas land will pass from the land owners and will work a great hardship in West Texas. The matter was precipitated when the royalty of Ira G. Yates was attacked. The Yates pool in Pecos County is now one of the most promising pools of West Texas. The directors of the West Texas Chamber voted at their recent meeting in Cisco to support Mr. Yates and other West Texans whose property is jeopardized and the legislative bureau of the organization instructed to take whatever action is necessary in the case. Homer D. Wade, manager of the organization, is now making a study of the


matter.

Vernon—Programs and invitations to the Northwest Texas Press Association meeting in Wichita Falls Sept. 9-10 are being sent out by Ray Nichols, editor of the Vernon Record, who is also secretary of the Press Association. Sam Roberts of Haskell is president of the organization.

Wichita Falls—The special train of West Texans who went from Wichita Falls to California where they spent two weeks studying the irrigation situation there has returned. The party was headed by H. A. Kemp of this city. B. M. Whitaker, agricultural manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, represented his organization. The party reported a successful trip and returned convinced that Texas offers a better field than California for agricultural development.



Ball Snakes' Good Work

Two Kansas professors have been making some experiments to determine the value of snakes as rodent destroyers. They placed about forty ball snakes in a cage and watched them capture live rats and observed how much of that kind of food the snakes would consume. "A ball snake weighing about three pounds eats more than three times its own weight in rodents in the course of six months," declared Prof. Frederick Hisaw. "This is equivalent to twelve adult pocket gophers a year. One three-pound snake should be able to clear an acre and a half of alfalfa land of rodents." He estimates that one ball snake would save a farmer about \$3.75 a year. The scientists said they found these snakes to be "gentle, easy-going creatures."—Pathfinder Magazine.

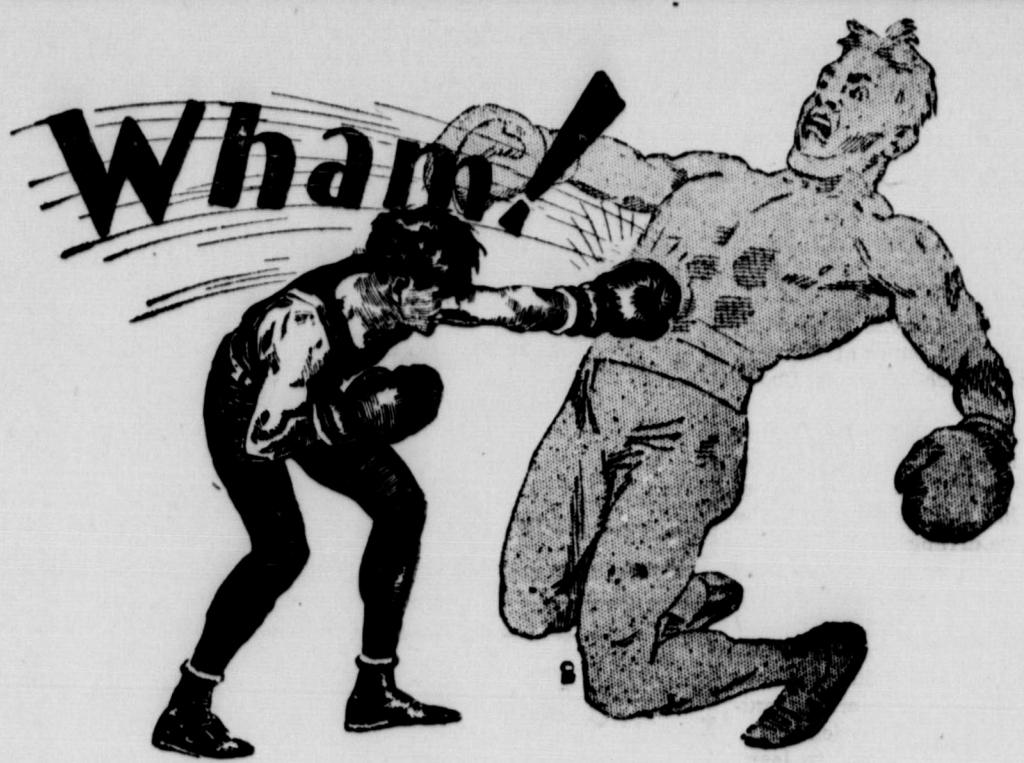

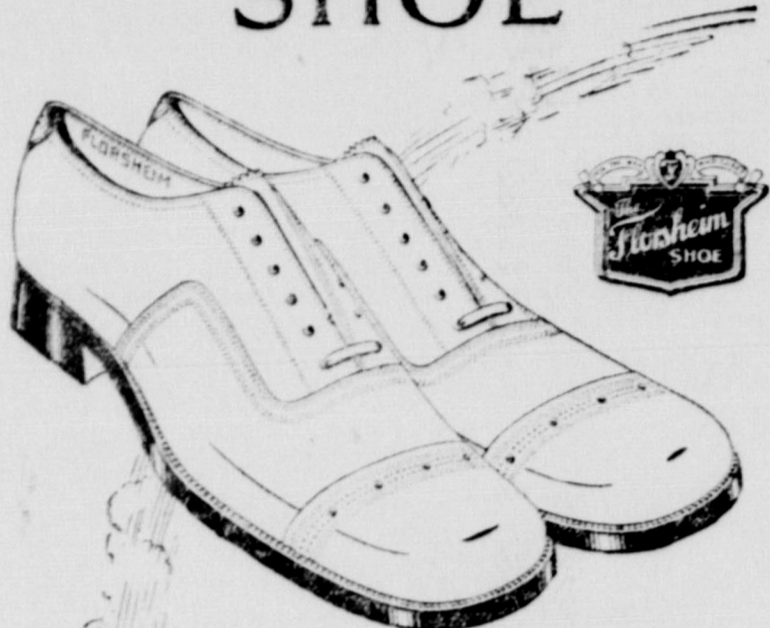

Vaccine for Pneumonia

Pneumonia among the natives of Madagascar has been greatly cut down by use of the antipneumococcus vaccine developed at the Pasteur Institute of Paris, according to official reports recently received at Paris. Pneumonia with a high mortality has been responsible for as many as a fourth of the hospital cases in some of the areas, says the report. The immunity conferred by the vaccine lasts about a year. The medical authorities in Madagascar have found it wise to give doses of quinine to malarial patients before they administered the vaccine in order to stave off attacks of fever which, when they occur, the natives are likely to regard as a direct result of the vaccination. No ill results have been recorded as yet from this double treatment.—Indianapolis News.

Museum Gets Relic

The Museum of the Peaceful Arts in New York has acquired a fragment of the old lightning rod set up about 1770 on St. Paul's cathedral, London, under the direction of Benjamin Franklin. Recently the old lightning arrester was removed from the cathedral and a more modern rod erected. The clerk of the works at the cathedral sent a section of the old rod, 10 1/2 inches long, to the museum as a gift. When the new building to house the museum is erected it will be one of the many historical, scientific, electrical and mechanical exhibits donated to the institution.
