Besides it has the best tourist camps we saw. Her 1700 artesian wells make water so plentiful that the yards, gardens and truck-farms are scenes of beauty and plenty. These fine flowing wells are shallow, some being only 300 feet deep and the deepest only about 800 feet. From Roswell we made a side-trip out to what is called the "Bottomless Lakes." As we looked into their clear, placid depths we wondered what kept the water from running out if the lakes have no bottoms. These lakes have no visible source or outlet, but seem to have been formed by a part of the hillside having dropped no one knows how

Our next stage of the trip was toward Carlsbad. We passed through a surprisingly large strip of irrigated country. The Pecos-river is the source of the water supply. The canals are filled with large streams of clear running water; and, it looks like the water runs up-hill in many places. We had repeated surprises come to us as we travelled for miles, apparently up-hill all the way, to run across another canal carrying its burden of sparkling water to the thirsty fields of alfalfa, corn, cotton, etc. It certainly transforms what would otherwise be a vast desert into an extremely fertile area.
