Herein fail not, and have you then and there before said Court, on the first day of the next term thereof, this Writ, with your return thereon, showing how you have executed the same.

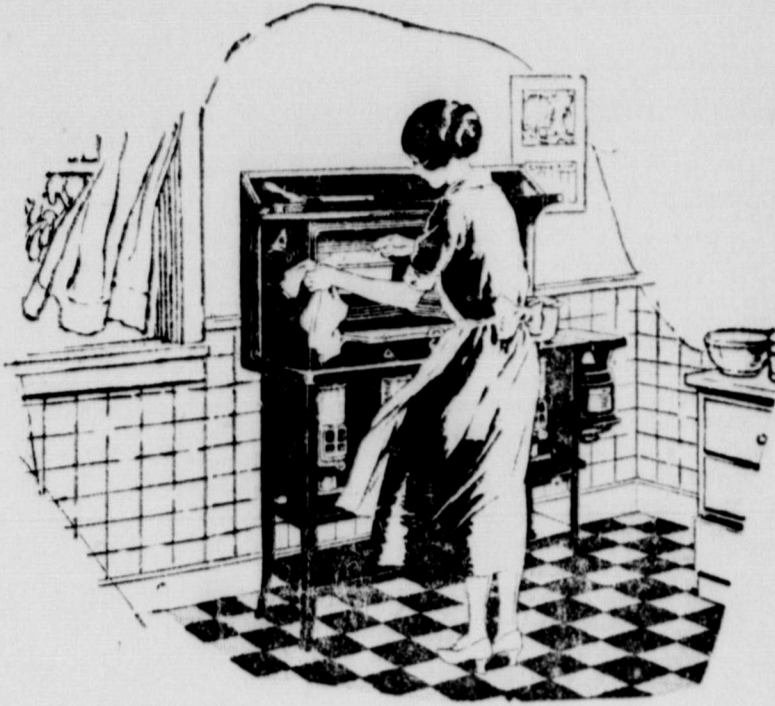

Our Vacation Trip

By Rev. W. J. Mayhew

Early in the afternoon of Wednesday, August 10, wife, her mother, Mrs. Harrison, and I started on our vacation trip. It was sprinkling rain when we left home, and we found quite a deal of mud before we reached Paducah. However, this was soon passed and Matador high-balled and we drove into Floydada at 4:30 p. m. We had a brief visit with old friends of other days and drove a couple of miles into the country where we spent the night with the first Sunday school teacher I ever had, Mother Carr. Her husband, Rev. W. H. Carr, pronounced the marriage ceremony which tied me hard and fast to the woman who has since ever told me where to "head in." He has been dead about ten years. Mother Carr lives with a daughter, and her other children are living within easy call of her. She was by my side when I was converted. No wonder I love her.

Next morning we drove into Plainview where we lunched with friends of whom we were pastor for four years at Granger, Texas. It was a pleasure indeed. In the afternoon we drove to Tulia and dropped into one of the leading banks of the city to meet an old friend we hadn't seen for fifteen years. Our next stop was Canyon, where we met a number of old-time friends and ate dinner with my mother's double-cousin. They begged us to stay over Sunday with them, but time forbade. Driving to Amarillo we met other friends with whom we spent a pleasant hour. Here we met a double-cousin of the writer, with his daughter and her husband. They live twelve miles north of Dumas, so we followed them home that afternoon and spent Sunday with them, enjoying the trip and visit very much indeed. They live in an adobe house, so we had our first experience in spending a night in such a residence. Inside, the building was plastered and painted, so it was not only comfortable but looked like it might be the interior of a fine brick or stone building. And the outside didn't look at all bad, for it was a good job that was done both of the making of the dirt blocks and the laying of them.

Monday morning we continued our journey, passing Dalhart and crossing the State line at Texline. We entered New Mexico a full hour before we left Texas. Let the children figure out how that could be.

Our first New Mexico town was Clayton. From there we went to Las Vegas, a most beautiful little city which nestles among great trees whose wide-spreading branches seemed to entreat us to linger. We enjoyed our visit to Sante Fe, the capital city. In and around it are to be seen many points and things of historical interest; but we were compelled to satisfy ourselves with a few hours spent in driving through her winding, narrow, shady streets and viewing her quaint and beautiful buildings, etc.

We turned southward, our next point of interest being Roswell. We took the eastern and less scenic route, which was quite a bit nearer than the western route. But evidently most of the travel goes the other way, for we travelled forty-five miles without so much as meeting a car. But the road was fine and we enjoyed the trip.

Roswell is the most beautiful city we saw. Her wide shady streets and her many beautiful homes are very inviting to a tourist who has been seeing nothing but barren wastes for more than a hundred miles. Besides it has the best tourist camps we saw. Her 1700 artesian wells make water so plentiful that the yards, gardens and truck-farms are scenes of beauty and plenty. These fine flowing wells are shallow, some being only 200 feet deep and the deepest only about 800 feet. From Roswell we made a side-trip out to what is called the "Bottomless Lakes." As we looked into their clear, placid depths we wondered what kept the water from running out if the lakes have no bottoms. These lakes have no visible source or outlet, but seem to have been formed by a part of the hillside having dropped no one knows how deep.

Our next stage of the trip was toward Carlsbad. We passed through a surprisingly large strip of irrigated country. The Pecos river is the source of the water supply. The canals are filled with large streams of clear running water; and, it looks like the water runs up-hill in many places. We had repeated surprises come to us as we travelled for miles, apparently up-hill all the way, to run across another canal carrying its burden of sparkling water to the thirsty fields of alfalfa, corn, cotton, etc. It certainly transforms what would otherwise be a vast desert into an extremely fertile area. We were surprised to find so large an area in New Mexico under irrigation. A number of prosperous looking towns dot the Pecos valley throughout this irrigated section.

Arriving at Carlsbad in the late afternoon we spent the night. Next morning at 10:30 we were at the mouth of the Caverns, 30 miles southwest of Carlsbad, waiting for the guides to let us start our trip into the darkness below. If the edi-

tor will allow I shall be glad to tell something of what we saw in Carlsbad Caverns in a separate article.

Returning to Carlsbad in the late afternoon we again spent the night there. Resuming our southward trip, our next stop was Pecos, Texas. Here we turned westward, passing Balmerha, Fort Davis, on our way to the "Cowboys' Campmeeting." I shall give some particulars about how this meeting is run, and some bits of history connected with it, in another article, at some future time.

We retraced our steps to Pecos, then eastward on the Bankhead Highway to Sweetwater. After leaving the valley of the Pecos river most of the country for a hundred miles is a sandy, barren desert. Before the hard-surfaced highway was built through this section it must have been a job to get across this country in its deep sands. In many places the railroad has been compelled to build solid board fences along its line, to prevent the sand from covering the tracks.

Turning northward from Sweetwater we passed Roby, Hamlin, Sagerton, Rule, Rochester, Knox City, etc., home, reaching Crowell after an absence of two weeks and five hours.

As to crop prospects, we saw nothing on the trip the equal of Foard County, outside of the irrigated district. On the Plains, the crops look good, but they are extremely late; so the harvest will be determined largely by the lateness of frost. In the locality of Roby and Hamlin we saw the best cotton we had seen anywhere. Farmers were both picking cotton and poisoning the worms which threaten it.

The entire trip constituted 1728 miles. We found gasoline selling at all prices, from 12 cents per gallon to 28 cents. Wife kept count of the cars we met, not counting those met in the towns and cities, and there were 1513, most of whom were tourists.
