Schools Will Get \$5 Per Capita This Week

Austin, Texas, April 9 .- A total of \$6,850,000 will be sent to the public schools of Texas this week from the available school fund, it was said Monday by Prof. S. M. N. Marrs, Superintendent of Schools. This is a per capita apportionment of \$5 each to the 1,370,000 scholastics.

With \$8 a child already paid this \$5 will make a total of \$13 sent the schools and leave only \$2 a child remaining to complete the \$15 total.






