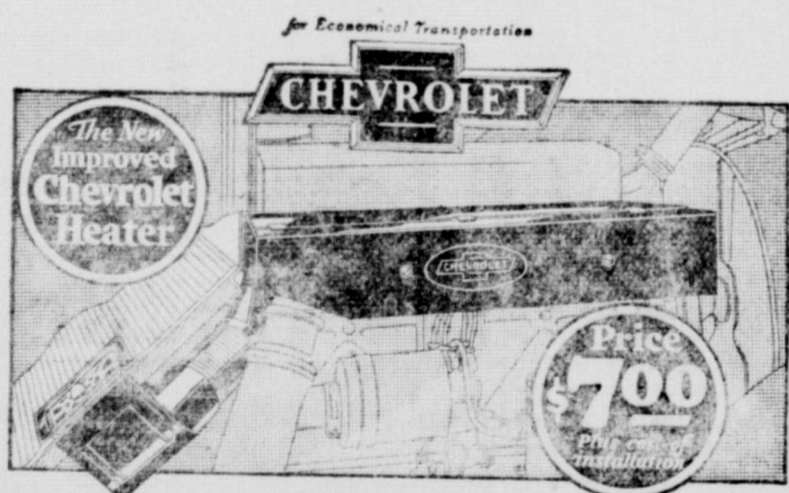

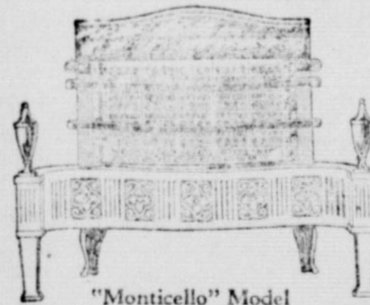

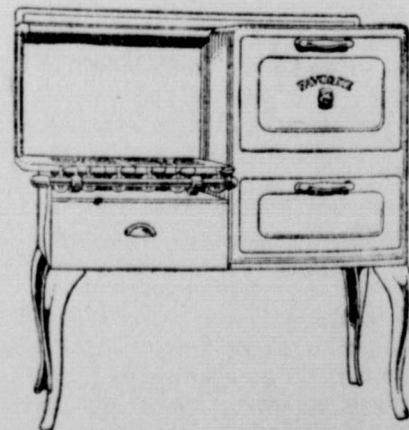

It seems that one should never find it necessary to call attention to the benefits of home people trading at home when our wants can be supplied at home. The principle in it is evident to most people. The practice of going out of town for your needs is not because those wants cannot be supplied at home. It is due to something else, either because one thinks he can get goods cheaper away from his own town or because he thinks it will give him an individuality in the ownership of some article or commodity. Should one be so liberal as to grant an advantage in buying where there may be bigger variety from which to select, the interest one should have in the growth of his own community should be sufficient to disturb the out-of-town buying inclination and practice. Some people not in business buy lots of goods away from Crowell. Some men who are in business buy some of their needs out of town when they can get it at home. This applies particularly to printing. This is not intended as an expression of grievance, but merely to call attention to a hurtful practice. Men make investments, sometimes pretty heavy, that they may get in position to take care of the public's wants and needs and they are entitled to the trade of the community. If Foard County's money could be spent at home, all of it, though it be less plentiful than it has been, it would be a great help to the town and community. Money is the life blood of business and when it is turned through arteries of trade leading from the home town and community it is like bleeding them.

It is hardly necessary to insist on our subscribers reading the ads in the paper. This is a day of advertising and most people are looking for places at which to trade where they can get most for their money. And this is going to be the practice especially while money is scarce. So that short finances bring the seller and buyer more closely together than when they are flush. Reports of ad results have been made to the News recently that are almost surprising. The advertiser will find it greatly to his advantage to keep before the public because the ad-reading public is looking for him in these columns and he is disappointed if he fails to find him.

Poultry Pays Good Profits

J. J. McCoy, who lives northwest of Crowell, has found the poultry business profitable. Mr. McCoy has 900 hens on his farm and for the greater part of the past year the average income was \$71.00 per month net profit. He will cull his flock in the next few days and get the boarders out, which will include all the undersize, crooked backs and others that do not show promise of paying for high priced feed. Mr. McCoy stamps his eggs. His stamp carries his name and address and in addition it says "guaranteed fresh and infertile." Mr. McCoy is making preparation to get some poultry feed early, especially his grain ration as he thinks it will be higher later in the year and next spring.

After culling his flock very closely, he expects to have only about 500 hens throughout the year.

T. B. Testing Work

The State Veterinarian was here this week doing some T. B. testing work. This work, under certain rules and regulations, is carried on free of charge. The purpose of the work is to eradicate tuberculosis among cattle. It is stated by authorities that a big percent of the human tuberculosis is communicated by cattle. That being especially the case among children.

After a certain number of tests a certificate is issued showing that the herd is accredited and free from tuberculosis, however, other tests are made in order to keep check on the herd.

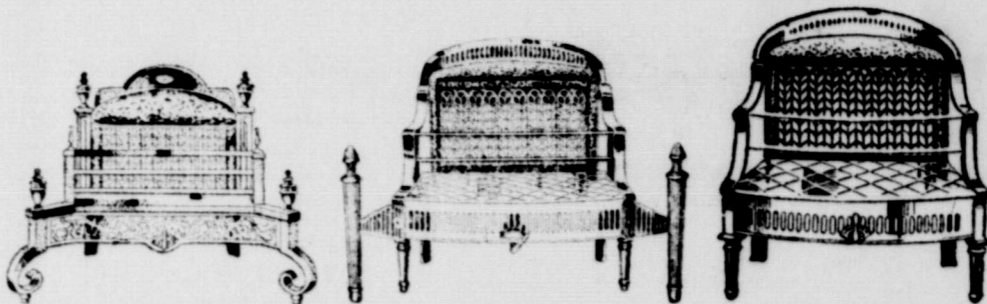

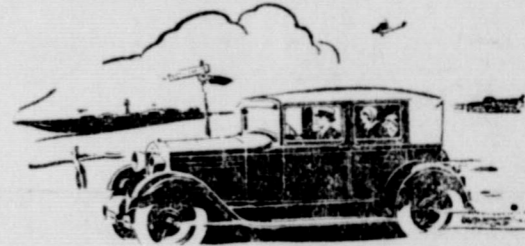

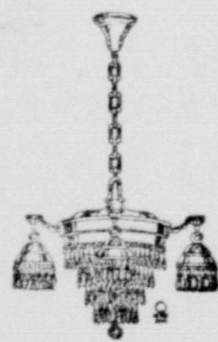

MOTOR BIKES DISAPPEAR

The commerce department has con-
ducted a world census of motorcy-
cles, and discovered that the fami-
lar "chug-chug" of the two-wheeler
is becoming less popular in the
United States but is spreading rap-
idly abroad.

The world total January 1 was
1,941,303, nearly twice as many as
in 1924. Europe owned 1,577,187,
more than three-fourths of the total.
Only one motorcycle was register-
ed in Alaska although tiny Guam has
14 and the island of Ceylon 2,923.
Great Britain uses motorcycles ex-
tensively, having 699,213 registered
—an increase of 11 per cent in a
year.

The United States makes nearly 18
per cent of the total, although only
140,847—about 8 per cent—were
registered for use in this county.

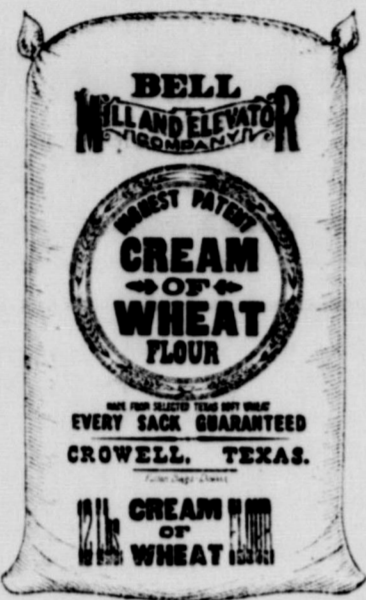

WHAT'S DOING IN WEST TEXAS

(By West Texas Cham. of Com.)

A 10,000 egg capacity electric incubator will be in operation in Tahoka by January, and the owners, Prof. Taylor, White, and Verner Smith, will be in the market for eggs from certified flocks, after that date.

The new Booker bakery recently built has equipment installed and has been baking for a week. L. N. Traylor is manager of the new bakery and states that he is able to feed the whole town.

An effort is being made in Nolan County to get a County Health Unit with financial assistance from the Rockefeller Institute. The county would finance half the project which would insure a full time doctor and four helpers.

A survey of the whole of Dawson County to account for every cow in the country is being sponsored by the Lamesa Chamber of Commerce to interest a milk plant there. The milk plant pays 18 cents more per butterfat pound and deliveries are made after the milk.

T. L. Kimmel, proprietor of the Electric Hatcheries at Hockley, has doubled the capacity of his incubators this year and will handle 15,000 more eggs. This is one instance of the increasing interest in poultry in the town.

Randall County Scored at the State Fair at Dallas, winning second place in the Agriculture exhibit. The exhibit was sent to the fair by the Canyon Chamber of Commerce and Randall County Commissioners, with County Agent W. H. Upchurch in charge.

Between 15,000 and 20,000 rabbits have been poisoned in Midland this year with the county furnishing the poison. In counties where the rabbits were not poisoned damage to crops is estimated as high as five percent.

Paving of 16 down town blocks is going on at Pecos. Six blocks have been graded and prepared for the paving with gutters and curbs constructed. Laying of the bitulithic pavement has begun. Each block will be opened as it is finished.
