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Hardeman Will Pave Highway to Pease River

According to information reaching this office, Hardeman County will pave Highway No. 51 to Pease River, and the contract for grading and drainage structure is to be let early in this month.

This was designated as a state highway more than two years ago and the paving to be done is to be paid for out of funds remaining from the \$600,000 bond issue voted in Hardeman County for the paving of Highway No. 5. So that the paving of Highway No. 51 will not make necessary the voting of more bonds for that purpose.

Highway 51 is the road running north and south across Hardeman County from Red River to Pease River and since that portion of the road across Foard County north and south is a part of 51, this county is interested in what Hardeman County is going to do in the matter. But it is something this county can not consider at the present time because of the fact that it already has a highway proposition on its hands, the building of Lee Highway from the Wilbarger County line on the east to the Cottle County line on the west.

It is said that the work in Hardeman County will start at Pease River. This means, of course, that Foard County will some day have two paved highways, one a national highway and the other a State highway. It may not be many years until both are completed. A north and south road would be a very useful highway.

Raymond Burrow Wins Letter at Wayland

Raymond Burrow of Crowell was one of eighteen to letter on Wayland College's football team this year. Raymond played with Crowell four years and played quarterback with Wayland. According to state papers the letter men will be awarded with gold colored sweaters with a blue "W."

Ollie Roberts and his wife of Fort Worth and Mrs. Blanch Long of Post, the only sister, were here to join the others who make their homes in Foard County, Elmer and Wood Roberts of Thalia and Dee Roberts of Crowell, and for the first time in many years they were all together, first at the celebration of the building of the new Baptist church at Thalia Thursday and then at a turkey feast at the home of Elmer Roberts on Friday. They were all together again at the home of Dee Roberts at Crowell on Saturday night, except Ollie. Those from New Mexico returned home Sunday.

A review of the early days was something of interest not only to them but to others who shared with them those days. Among the others who enjoyed a social hour with the Roberts families were Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Self, who were among the earliest settlers of the Thalia country. That was in 1885 before there was a Thalia or a Crowell. It was interesting to hear Mr. Self tell of those days. He said he bought a section of land just east of Thalia for \$250. There were no roads and most people lived in dugouts. It is wonderful to note the developments that have taken place in those 42 years.

Auto Victims Are Relatives of Crowell Man

F. W. Mabe of Crowell, his three brothers, J. N. of Crosbyton and J. M. and L. E., of Levelland, and his sister, Mrs. R. E. Karr, of Crosbyton, returned Wednesday from Hillsboro, near which place the wife of their brother, W. T. Mabe, was killed and Mr. Mabe and three of the children injured in an automobile accident last Sunday morning. Another child, ten months old, was uninjured.

The accident happened at Lovelace, five miles north of Hillsboro at 10:30 Sunday morning when Mr. Mabe started to drive across a railroad crossing. A long string of box cars was on the siding between the road and the main line of the railroad and came right up to the crossing, completely hiding the view of the driver of the car. The whistle of the locomotive did not blow and Mr. Mabe, knowing the schedule of the train thought the passenger had already passed, but even with that impression, he slowed up as he approached the crossing but did not hear the train. Just as he got up on the track he saw the train within a few feet of him, and shot the gas to the motor in the hope that he might get across, and with the fraction of a second more time would have made it.

Mrs. Mabe was killed almost instantly. The others are reported by Mr. Mabe to be on the road to recovery.

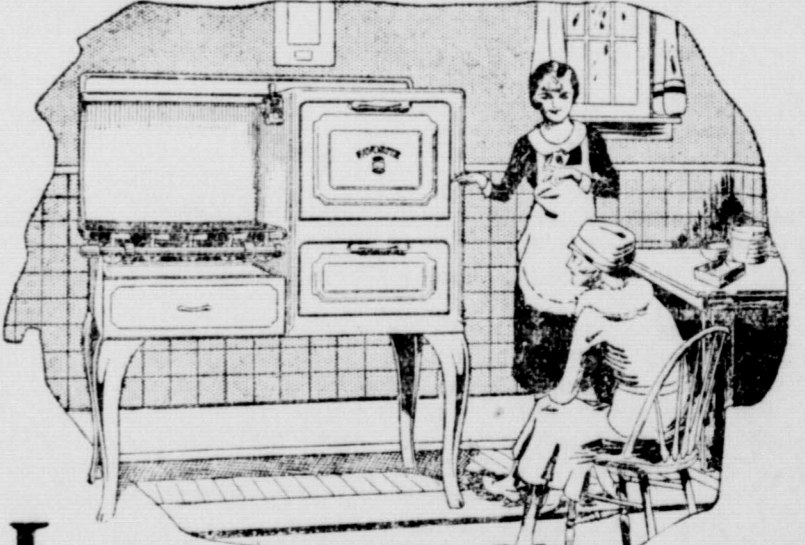

Paving on Highway No. 5 has been completed from Quannah to within a mile west of Chillicothe. The McClung Construction Co. is now paving the first block within the city limits.

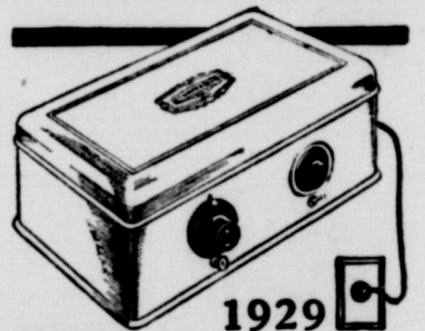

WHAT'S DOING IN WEST TEXAS

(By West Texas Cham. of Com.)

Finishing work is being done on the basement of the new Methodist church at Woodson. The basement is divided into seven rooms, including kitchen, assembly room, and class rooms. Gas connections are in every room.

Building permits from Snyder have already exceeded the \$300,000.00 mark up to November 15. The City Council is planning the installation of a new \$18,000 sewage disposal plant to be erected within the next 30 days.

An athletic stadium is soon to be built for the Abilene public schools. The school athletic council already has \$13,000 out on interest to be used in building the plant and this sum will be increased.

Plainview is to have an over pass of 600 feet along the Santa Fe tracks on Highway 28. It will be made of steel and concrete. Plans are practically complete for the grading and drainage structure on the highway.

Concrete is being poured for the fourth and last story of the new \$80,000 hospital at Dalhart. B. C. Frohman, general contractor in charge of the work, expects to finish by April. This will give Dalhart one of the most complete hospitals in this part of the state.

The first baby beef show conducted in Swisher county will be held in Tulia February 2, 1929. C. B. Martin, county agent, now has 34 baby beeves on balanced rations in boys clubs, one of which won \$544.84 in prizes recently.

Arlington's new city hall will soon be finished. Brick is being laid on the top story, and plumbers are at work in the basement. White face brick is being used in the exterior work of the building, and this will make it one of the most attractive in town.

Del Rio recently celebrated the big event of the season there when the new Roswell hotel was formerly opened with the Hawaiian Welcome Ceremony. F. L. Childs, general manager, sponsored this unique entertainment.

Plans are being made in Goree to install a sewerage system. If present indications mature, work will start on the system about the first of the year and it will be ready for use the earlier part of the spring.

Paducah is constructing an ornamental white way along the streets of the business section. It will have 34 standards mounted on the side walks with wiring underground when completed, and will replace the old system of 17 standards located in the center of the street.

The district convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce held November 23 at Decatur drew a large crowd. President A. M. Bourland, Manager Homer D. Wade, and Publicity Manager E. H. Whitehead, were among W. T. C. of C. officials present.

The Central Texas District Convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce is to be held in Merkel on December 6. Competition is keen among the towns in that section for the privilege of being named as next year's place.

Work will start on the building of a diversion dam on Bluff Creek near Winters soon, since the carrying of a city bond election of \$72,656.65. Winters has recently bought a new fire truck, erected a new water reservoir, and completed some paving.

Jim Cates, who has been breeding Buff Orpington Chickens for a number of years, has just received word from the National Buff Orpington Club Meet at Austin that he had won several first prizes on his entries.

I ask that we use the stories found in the various basis and supplementary readers used within this age range, some of which at least are available in every school.

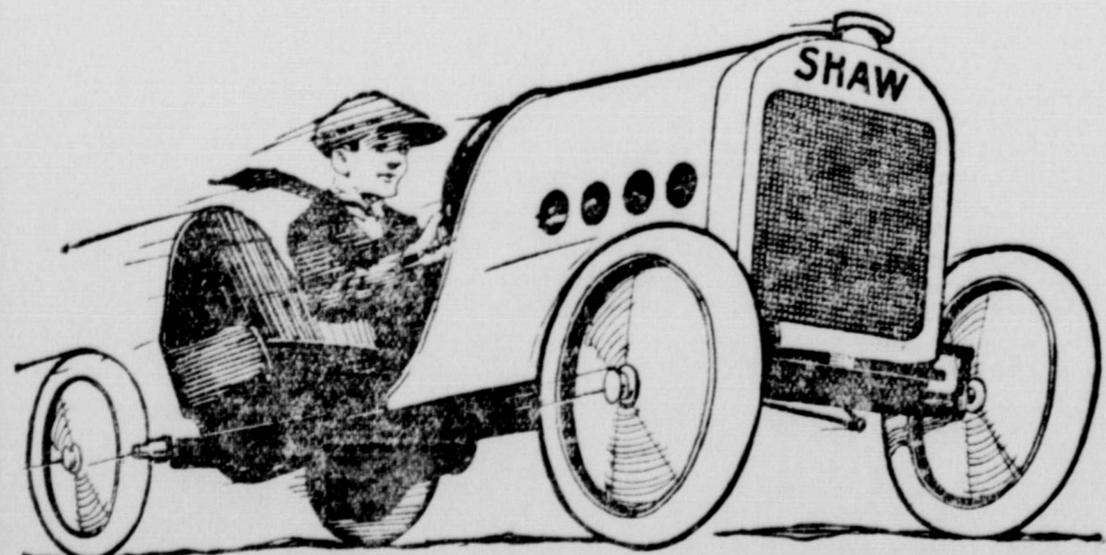
