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
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
DAIN is the signal of danger. Something is wrong. Without this warning we might persist and get hurt or killed. If you felt no pain by coming in contact with fire you might burn up before you realize what was happening to you.

Pain is not a feeling. It is a sensation. The distinction is that in case of a feeling you have a vague notion of pleasantness or unpleasantness whereas in pain you have a distinct sensory experience. Feelings are not localized and have no specific organs. Pain, like every other sense such as seeing, hearing, etc., is localized in pain cells mostly on the skin and scattered throughout the body. They are mostly found on the surface because there is where they are most needed as watch dogs of our health and safety.

Another reason why pain has been confused with feeling is that most pains are unpleasant and unpleasantness is a feeling. Feelings of pleasantness and unpleasantness are the accompaniments of all sensory experience of everything we see, hear, feel or touch. Some colors look good to us, others look ugly; musical notes are Dieasant; scraping, shrill, loud noises are decidedly unpleasant; soft, smooth, velvety objects are pleasant to the touch; clammy, cold, ragged, sharp, un-

even surfaces are unpleasant. Although most pains are unpleasant, some are neutral and a few are positively pleasant. It is usually accompanied by a feeling of unpleasantness but may be neutral or pleasant at times. We have pain to warn us of approaching danger and harm. 


No portrait of Major L'Enfant exists, W. W. Corcoran, of Washington, who knew him, left a brief description of his appearance. An ideal likeness of L'Enfant has been created by Leon Chatelain, a young Frenchman of Washington, and appears in the form of a medallion on the new Chevy Chase Savings bank in Washington.

Sought Pay for Services.

"The services rendered by L'Enfant in preparing a plan for the national capital were of short duration, and for twenty-five years or more he lived in Washington, confessedly seeking what he regarded adequate recom pense for his services.

"During these years he was an inmate of the household of Dudley Diggs. He died at Mr. Diggs' home and was buried in the family graveyard, not far from the city of Washington. Later his remains were transferred by order of congress to Arlington Military cemetery, where a monument to him has been erected, the design having been secured through the American Institute of Architects." 

"I'll begin to wear them now," Melly said, "for my cold feet would like to receive the attention as much as others who might see me."


