### World's Highest Bridge

The Grand Canyon, that has baffled the skill of the world's greatest, engineers to bridge, has at last been conquered, and the great barrier that has seperated the northern and southern rims of this mammoth gorge has fallen below the march of progress.

The bridge which is recognized as one of the greatest feats in engineering history, is 467 feet above the waters of the Colorado, and the main span is 618 feet in length. The bridge will eliminate the historic Lee's ferry 6 miles above the site of the bridge.

The main span is a deck arch of 618 feet, the arch being of the threehinge type, with battered trusses designed with reversal stresses for cantilever erection. The bridge will be 833 feet long. The formal opening will be held in early spring.


