**PROPER POULTRY CARE
URGED BY COUNTY AGENT**

"About the most important thing that a farmer can do now is to take proper care of poultry," said Fred Rennels today. "Over fifty per cent of the success of a poultry flock results from proper care in the early life of the chickens," he said.

He stated that warm quarters and plenty of fresh water were the most essential things at this time of the year to a flock of chickens. Warm water is best for the colder days and the chickens should never be crowded, according to Rennels. About 66 per cent of an egg is water so one can readily see the importance of plenty of water.

"With proper care and attention to a flock of chickens, there is no reason why egg production should fall so very low at any time of the year," said Rennels.



POULTRY COLUMN

(By F. W. Kuznetsov)

Teaching Chicks To Roost
Get the chicks on the roost as early as possible. This will prevent crowding and many other troubles, common to growing chicks. It will help them feather more quickly. Some think crooked breast bones are caused by roosting too early. This is not true in the majority of cases. Faulty rations are a more common cause of crooked breast bones. A good way of roosting chicks early is to build a sloping roost close to the floor in the rear of the house, covering the underneath side with a one inch mesh poultry netting. This naturally causes them to go up the roosts. At first only a few will use the lower roosts, but each night more will use them until soon a large portion of the flock will be on the roosts at night. The roosts may be hinged to the back of the house so they can be raised up against the inside of the back of the house during cleaning time.

Separate the Males
In the case of early hatched chicks at the age of 10 weeks to 12 weeks, remove the cockerels and either place them on the market or fatten them for a week or ten days. Early hatched cockerels are best marketed as broilers. At the present time 1 1/2 to 2 lbs. cockerels are bringing all the way from 30c to 40c per pound depending upon your local market and also on the breed. At least it is necessary to separate the cockerels from the pullets at between 8 and 10 weeks of age. This will make more room in the house for the growing pullets. Crowding pullets in the houses will retard their growth and cause such diseases as cold and roup. If you are going to sell the cockerels locally we recommend crate or battery fattening, on the other hand if you are going to ship them any distance to the market, crate or battery fattening is not very profitable, because they will lose too much enroute which the commission merchants will figure off as shrinkage. A shrinkage of from 7 to 10 per cent may be had on battery fattened broilers shipped long distances. For fattening any of the good commercial fatteners may be used, mixed with milk, preferably buttermilk, to a consistency where it readily pours from a bucket. Do not stuff them too much the first few days of the fattening period, but keep them a little hungry, and the last 3 or 4 days give them all they will eat 3 times a day. As soon as they lose appetite dispose of them.

Range and Shade for Growing Chicks
The more nearly ideal condition you can provide for your flock, the better they will do and the less trouble from disease. If possible allow them to run out doors, on a well drained range, where no chickens have been the past 12 months or better still the past 24 months. An ideal place is one with clean soil, well shaded with plenty of green food. Shade is important during the hot summer months. Green food is always important.

Poultry Business Is Successful on Ranch

Mr. and Mrs. M. L. New, who live on the Bomar ranch, 20 miles southwest of here, were in Crowell Monday with considerable produce that they disposed of at the Farmers Produce Co. J. K. McBeath, manager of the firm, states that Mr. and Mrs. New never come to town unless they bring along some cream, eggs and chickens.

Mr. New is foreman of the Bomar ranch and he and his wife provide all the dairy and poultry products for the ranch hands who number around six or eight and for their own family from just 50 Rhode Island Red hens, one cow and a little heifer. Mrs. New stated that a comfortable income was made from the extra dairy and poultry products that were not used on the ranch and that is more than enough to take care of the incidental bills for the family, such as dry goods, hardware and other items. "We do not have a grocery bill as the ranch provides that, but our chickens and cows would take care of that also if we had to buy our own groceries," Mrs. New said.

Mrs. New stated that she now has 250 eggs in an incubator that will soon be ready to hatch and that she plans to set more eggs than usual this year. "No one on either a farm or ranch should be without dairy cows and chickens," said Mrs. New.

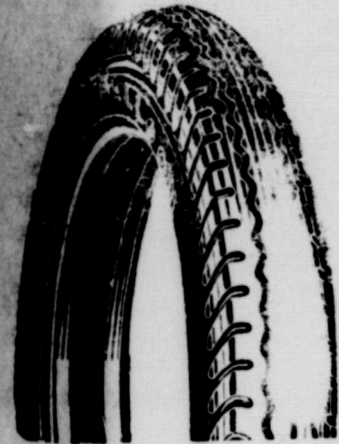

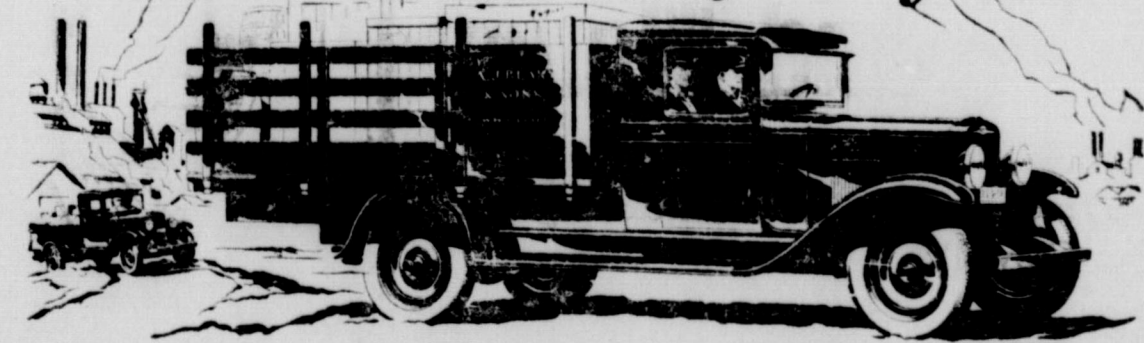

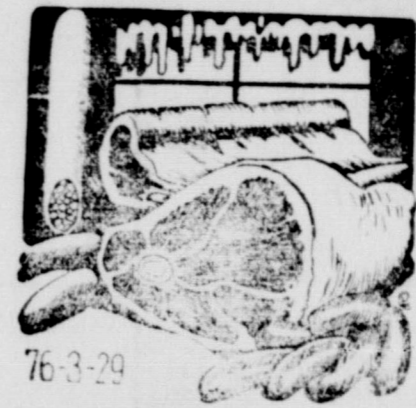
