





Teaching Chicks To Roost Get the chicks on the roost as early as possible. This will prevent crowding and many other troubles, common to growing chicks. It will help them feather more quickly. Some think crooked breast bones are caused by roosting too early. This is not true in the majority of cases. Faulty rations are a more common cause of crooked breast chicks early is to build a sloping roost close to the floor in the rear neath side with a one inch mesh causes them to go up the roosts. At first only a few will use the lower roosts, but each night more will use them until soon a large portion of the flock will be on the roosts at night. The roosts may be hinged to the back of the house so they can be raised up against the inside of the back of the house during clean-

Seperate the Males

In the case of early hatched chicks at the age of 10 weeks to 12 weeks, remove the cockerels and either place them on the market or fatten them for a week or ten days. Early hatched cockerels are best marketed as broilers. At the present time 11/2 to 2 lbs. cockerels are bringing all the way from 30c to 40c per pound depending upon your local market and also on the breed. At least it is necessary to separate the cockerels from the pullets at between 8 and 10 weeks of age. This will make more room in the house for the growing pullets. Crowding pullets in the houses will retard their growth and cause such diseases as cold and roup. If you are going to sell the cockerels locally we recommend crate or battery fattening, on the other hand if you are going to ship them any distance to the market, crate or battery fattening is not very profitable, because they will lose too much enroute which the commission City of Crowell. Range and Shade for Growing Chicks

The more nearly ideal condition ou can provide for your flock, the better they will do and the less trouble from disease. If possible allow them to run out doors, on a well drained range, where no chickens have been the past 12 months or better still the past 24 months. An idea! place is one with clean soil, well shaded with plenty of green food. Shade is important during the hot summer months. Green food is always important.

Mr. New is foreman of the Bomar ranch and he and his wife provide al the dairy and poultry products for the ranch hands who number around six or eight and for their own family from just 50 Rhode Island Red hens, one cow and a little heifer. Mrs. New stated that a comfortable income was made from the extra dairy and poultry products that were not used on the ranch and that is more than enough to take care of the incidental bills for the family, such as dry goods, hardware and other items. "We do not have a grocery bill as the ranch provides that, but our chickens and cows would take care of that also if we had to buy our own groceries," Mrs. New said.

Mrs. New stated that she now has 250 eggs in an incubator that will soon be ready to hatch and that she plans to set more eggs than usual this year. "No one on either a farm or ranch should be withou dairy cows and chickens," said Mrs. New.







Tires for the new Ford are specially made to give long wear

For best results, the tires on the new Ford should be kept inflated to an air pressure of 35 pounds and checked regularly to insure this pressure all the time. This is important. Low inflation breaks down the sidewalls of a tire. By causing overheating, it also destroys the rubber that acts as an insulation, with consequent separation of the cord.

At the end of each 5000 miles, when you have the front wheels packed with grease, it is a good plan to have the wheel alignment checked. This will prevent premature wear.


