## Official Returns of Democratic Primary Election for Foard County

The election in this county, so far as county officers were concerned, was a very quiet affair. For only three offices were there contests—for County Judge, Assessor and Treasurer. In each case the voters retired the present incumbent. T. W. Staton was elected Judge, J. H. Roach Assessor, while "Uncle Dan" Thomson will handle the county's cash. The defeat of Judge Robt. Cole for District Attorney is a great disappointment to his friends of this county and over the district.

### O. B. COLQUITT NEXT GOVERNOR

Texas has passed through another strenuous and bitter political campaign. The paramount issue, constitutional prohibition, was largely overshadowed by the personality of one man. We went into the fight divided and the division became more pronounced as the campaign progressed. With our forces united we might have won, but with a division of these two forces into two factions, each of which was swayed largely by the prejudices engendered in the bitter contest of two years ago, success for either became impossible. The forces of the opposition, on the other hand, were organized and concentrated their strength in support of one man. Result: They won, while Prohibitionists got what was coming to them—a glorious good licking. But why grieve over spilled milk? The vote seems to indicate that further agitation of the question of state-wide prohibition at this time would be unwise and hurtful to our cause. The people have spoken in no uncertain way and they have said that, for the present at least, they do not want state-wide prohibition.

writer was opposed to Mr. Colquitt and has always been and would be again, but he recognizes the fact the tremendous vote received by the Kaufman county man means something more than the voice of the saloons and their henchmen. We are still for prohibition all the way up from the school district to the nation, but the way to fight now is to cease all unnecessary agitation, to organize our forces, lay our plans and prepare thoroughly for the great contest which will drive the liquor traffic out of Texas for good and all. We are in no condition now to make a winning fight next year or any time soon. To plunge into the struggle at once would mean defeat sure and overwhelming and a setback to our cause from which we could not recover in a dozen years. We have made too many mistakes already. We sprang this question prematurely two years ago when the State was convulsed over the Bailey matter. We went into the fight this year disorganized and divided and without the ghost of a chance to succeed. We forgot every thing else in our excitement over the governor's race and in our desire to defeat Colquitt, consequently we got it in the exact spot where the chicken got the axe.

## The HOME CIRCLE Column

A well born man is always a mother's boy, and all great men have not been afraid to be called "mothers boys."

There is a charity which consists in withholding words, in abstaining from speech if to speak is to condemn. Such charity hears the tale of slander, but does not repeat it; listens in silence, but forbears comment; then locks the unpleasant secret up in the depths of its heart. Silence can still rumorm. It is speech that keeps a story alive and lends vigor to it.

The poor man imagines that \$100,000 would make him a man without annoyance for the balance of his life, and the man with three or four millions suicides because of the loss of one million. Your misery is mostly in your mind. Be circumstanced as you may, there will be enough ragged edges in your life to keep you in a perpetual fret and fume if you so will it. Within limited bounds it is not what you have, or lack, it is not what you are or would like to be, that makes you cheerful and a source of happiness to those who must be with you. It is the way you take things; a power within your self, almost independent of all external affairs and surroundings. There is no position and no station in life in which many men and women would not be thoroughly miserable.

The foundation of society rests on its home. The success of the home rests on the wives. Therefore, first of all teach our girls how to be successful wives. Begin early to train their character. Teach them that jealousy is an immorality and gossip a vice. Train them to keep the smallest promise sacredly and to speak of people only as they would speak to them. Train them to do small things well and to delight in helping others, that sacrifice made for other's pleasures is a means of soul development. Once given a firm foundation of character like this, which the poorest as well as the richest can give to the girls, and no matter what necessity arises they will be able to rise above it.

The mother who brings her children up in truthfulness and sobriety to useful spheres, and who looketh well to the ways of her household when the passing of time has left the frosts of winter in her hair, and the beauty of youth is fled, then is she worthy of all honor. To our mind, no nobler epitaph to a woman's memory could be written than that she has been a good wife and mother.

"The sanctity of the marriage relation must not be broken by divorce," says seedy sentiment, no matter though the ever-present specter of bruises, wounds, perhaps of a fearful death, may hang over the head of the victim, she should walk unswervingly by the side of the despicable brute whose brawny hand, nerved by rum or reasonless passion, may at any time strike down her frail form. 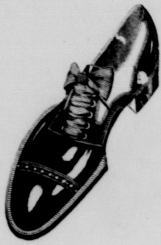

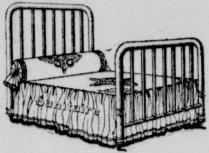

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution AUTHORIZING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A HOME FOR WIVES AND WIDOWS OF CONFEDERATE SOLDIERS AND SAILORS.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 7. Joint Resolution to amend Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1903, so as to authorize the grant of aid in the establishment and maintenance of a home for the disabled and dependant wives and widows of Confederate soldiers and sailors and such women as aided the Confederacy, and making an appropriation.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1903, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Article 3. Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, associations of individuals, municipal, or other corporations whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1880, and who are either over sixty years of age or whose disability is the proximate result of actual service in the Confederate army for a period of at least three months, their widows in indigent circumstances who have never remarried and who have been bona fide residents of the State of Texas since March 1, 1880, and who were married to such soldiers or sailors anterior to March 1, 1880; provided, said aid shall not exceed eight dollars per month, and provided further, that no appropriations shall ever be made for the purpose here-

inbefore specified in excess of five hundred thousand dollars for any one year. And also grant aid to the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the Confederacy, under such regulations and limitations as may be provided by law; provided, the grant to aid said home shall not exceed one hundred and fifty thousand dollars for any one year, and no inmate of said homes shall be entitled to any other aid from the State; the Legislature may provide for husband and wife to remain together in the home; and provided further, that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed to prevent the grant of aid in case of public calamity.

SEC. 2. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the regular election of State officers, in November, 1910.

The sum of \$5,000.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to pay the expenses of carrying out the provisions of this Resolution.

Wholesale or frequent changes in the administration of school affairs are disastrous to real school interests, and disheartening to teachers, trustees, and superintendents. It is believed that the election or appointment of educational officials for terms of four, six or eight years would assure a greater degree of permanence in school policies, which is absolutely indispensable to rational progress in education. Under this plan, trustees of public schools would be elected for terms not to exceed six years and should be divided into three classes consisting of two and three trustees respectively for independent school districts and of one trustee in each class for common school districts. Boards of education so constituted will contain a majority of "hold-overs" at all times, which of itself dlocks hasty, ill-advised, and useless changes.

The lengthening of the terms of school officials will tend to protect the schools from political interference. In the administration of the public school system, there is no place for boss state-making, machine meddling, partisan wire-pulling or division of spoils. Educational questions should be discussed on basis of principal and should be settled by an appeal to honest standards in education, not to personal and political considerations. So long as county superintendents hold office for two years only, so long as the State Superintendent's term of office is limited to two years, so long as school trustees term of office is limited to two years, so long as regents of the University of Texas and other educational institutions hold office for short terms, it is idle to expect the exclusion of partisan politics from school affairs. The present system of electing school officials invites political manipulation and the politician is mere-

ly cultivating the promising field for his activities when he meddles in school affairs.

"The educational system of our state conceived by the fathers of the republic and fostered by democratic statesman has become the just pride of our people, and we pledge our continued efforts to strengthen and maintain it in all its branches, and to keep it clear from partisan politics; to this end, we favor the submission by the legislature of a constitutional amendment looking to the election of school trustees and appointment of the members of the governing of the higher institutions of learning for a term of six years, as contemplated by the law and practiced by each administration until declared unconstitutional by a recent decision by the supreme court."—Texas State Democratic Platform August 10, 1900.

#### Longer Terms for School Officials.

"That we declare in favor of longer terms of office for superintendent of schools and for the governing boards of all state educational institutions and for the boards of trustees and the terms of the members of each board to be so classified as to prevent the retirement of the majority of any board at one time, and assert it as our belief that such a policy will give a better business administration of educational affairs and at the same time will protect the schools from the interference of factional politics."—Fourth Conference for Education in Texas, April 22, 1910.
