Nine proposed changes in the Constitution of the State of Texas are being published in this week's issue of the News and will be printed for four consecutive weeks. These proposed changes will be voted on at elections to be held in November.

Proposed are:  
HJR 1: Permits compensation to person imprisoned for offense not committed.  
HJR 23: Gives commissioners' court additional taxing powers.  
HJR 15: Relates to building program at State institutions of higher learning.  
SJR 5: For a better Teacher Retirement System.  
SJR 2: Increasing Veterans Land Fund by \$100,000,000.  
HJR 46: Relating to oaths of office of state officers.  
HJR 11: Pertaining to commitment of persons of unsound mind.  
HJR 9: Allows judge to deny bail to person twice convicted of felony.  
HJR 39: Relating to physically handicapped.

Mr. Gribble passed away Tuesday at 7:15 p. m. in a Chillicothe hospital following a serious illness of about two weeks.

Mr. Gribble was well known and loved by a host of friends in this area. He was always interested in the welfare and development of the town and county and contributed of his means to all worthy causes.

A 24-hour gauge of 137.51 barrels of fluid, including 94.5 barrels of new oil, has been reported for a Canyon reef discovery 12 1/2 miles northwest of Crowell, Tennessee Gas Transmission Company No. 1 C. M. Carroll, section 36, block A, SP survey.

Flow was on 30-64-inch choke from open hole at 6,106 to 6,139 feet and it was reported Wednesday to be flowing 192 barrels every 24 hours following further testing early this week.

## Less Than 1,000 Voters Turned Out for Last Saturday's First Primary

In the first Democratic primary election held in Foard County last Saturday, one new commissioner was elected and a run-off election slated for another commissioner's job. J. L. (Bill) Bell, present commissioner of Precinct No. 1, was defeated by W. R. (Bill) Moore of Thalia. Moore received 93 votes to Bell's 91.

A run-off race for the commissioner's job in Precinct No. 3 was assured between Floyd (Dock) Borchardt and Harry Traweck. In last Saturday's tabulations, Traweck led the race with 66 votes, Borchardt was second with 62 votes, and Glenn Shook was third with 28 votes.

Bob Abston was elected Democratic chairman, Precinct No. 1.

L. A. Andrews, Precinct No. 2; Otis Gafford, Precinct No. 4; W. A. Dunn, Precinct No. 5; C. L. Adkins, Precinct No. 6; G. A. Shultz, Precinct No. 7; Grady Halbert, Precinct No. 8; and S. B. Farrar, Precinct No. 11.

Ray Shirley was elected chairman of the Foard County Democratic Executive Committee and Miss Lottie Russell was elected secretary.

In the race for governor, Price Daniel led the other six candidates for the office with 284 votes. Ralph Yarborough was second with 271. W. Lee O'Daniel third with 204. J. Evetts Haley fourth with 103. Reuben Senterfitt fifth with 25, and J. J. Holmes sixth with 4.

In the race for lieutenant governor, John Lee Smith led with 356 votes. Ben Ramsey second with 276, followed by A. M. Aikin Jr. with 128 and C. T. Johnson with 37.

## 133 Farmers Sign for Soil Bank Here

Preliminary reports indicate that approximately 133 county farmers have signed up to participate in the 1956 Acreage Reserve Program, reports Ray Hysinger, chairman of the Foard County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

If farmers carry out their expressed intentions, about 3,103 acres will be in the acreage reserve in the county this year.

Chairman Hysinger explains that acreages and possible earnings indicated by Foard County farmers participating in the program total 1,395 acres of cotton with earnings of \$20,212.70 and 1,708 acres of wheat with earnings of \$10,088.00.

The program, which operates under the soil bank law enacted late in May, too late for full operation in 1956, will continue through 1957, 1958 and 1959.

## Dogs and Cats Will Be Inoculated on Saturday, August 4, Against Rabies

County Health Office, Dr. M. M. Kralicke, has announced that Dr. Ralph Flesher, Vernon veterinarian, will be in Crowell Saturday, August 4, for the purpose of inoculating dogs and cats against rabies. This project is sponsored by the Crowell Lions Club.

Dr. Flesher will begin work at 9 a. m. in the building formerly occupied by Wm. Cameron Lumber Co. on North Main Street.

There will be a charge of \$2.00 for the inoculation of each animal. Dr. Kralicke said, and will include the medication and registration.

Registration forms will be made out in triplicate on each animal, one for the owner, one for the veterinarian, and one to be given to the City Council. Animals need inoculation every year. Those inoculated last year will need it again this year.

Should an inoculated animal bite someone, by checking the tag, it could easily be determined when it was inoculated and if there would be danger of the person bitten contracting rabies.

Dr. Kralicke urges everyone owning a dog or cat to have it inoculated Saturday while the veterinarian is in Crowell.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1956.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 15 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Article VII, Sections 17 and 18, providing a method of payment for the construction and equipment of buildings and other permanent improvements at State institutions of higher learning and providing for the payment of the same by the State.

Section 1. That Section 17 and 18 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereinafter set forth.

Section 17. In lieu of the State ad valorem tax on property of seven cents per \$100 on the one hundred dollar (\$100) valuation herebefore permitted to be levied by the State on property of the one hundred dollar (\$100) valuation...

Proposed Constitutional Amendment to Be Voted on at an Election to Be Held on November 6, 1956.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11 proposing an amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 15, providing a method of payment for the construction and equipment of buildings and other permanent improvements at State institutions of higher learning and providing for the payment of the same by the State.

Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereinafter set forth.

Section 15. In addition to the bonds now enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Permanent University Fund may be invested in first lien real estate mortgages on property owned by the United States Government or any agency thereof, in bonds, corporation stocks, preferred stocks and common stocks as the Board of Regents of the Permanent University Fund may determine, and the same shall be subject to the same rules and regulations as are provided for the investment of the Permanent University Fund in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Section 16. The Board of Regents of the Permanent University Fund shall have the power to acquire, construct, equip, furnish, maintain, improve, repair, and otherwise provide for the construction and equipment of buildings and other permanent improvements at State institutions of higher learning, and to provide for the payment of the same by the State, in the same manner as is provided for in Section 15 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Section 1. That Section 43 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 43. (a) In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Article 48, Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities, or wholly or partly by the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such fund each year shall be not less than the amount required by law to be paid into the fund by each employer, and shall not exceed at any time six percent (6%) of the compensation paid each such person by the State or school district, or in no case shall any person retire before attaining the age fifty-five (55) or complete thirty (30) years of creditable service, but shall be entitled to refund of money paid into the fund."



#### Proposed Constitutional Amendment to Be Voted on at an Election to Be Held on November 6, 1956.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 31 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 51-c, providing that the Legislature may grant aid and compensation to persons who have been fined or imprisoned under the laws of this State for offenses of which they are not guilty, under such regulations and limitations as the Legislature may deem expedient.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all of the ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment granting power to the Legislature to grant aid and compensation to persons who have been fined or imprisoned under the laws of this State for offenses of which they were not guilty."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment granting power to the Legislature to grant aid and compensation to persons who have been fined or imprisoned under the laws of this State for offenses of which they were not guilty."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

#### Proposed Constitutional Amendment to Be Voted on at an Election to Be Held on November 6, 1956.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 46 proposing an amendment to Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the Oath of Office to include appointive officers of the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 1 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 1. Members of the Legislature, and all other elected officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation: 'I, \_\_\_\_\_, do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of \_\_\_\_\_ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly nor indirectly paid, offered, or promised to contribute any money, or valuable thing, or promised any public office or employment, as a reward to secure my appointment or the confirmation thereof. So help me God.'

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all of the ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing the form of the Oath of Office for elective and appointive officers of the State."
