Man Ambushed Near Quannah

Quannah, Texas, March 20—Crawling alongside a wire fence, a man with a handkerchief over his face leveled a six-shooter at T. Y. Landers last night as the latter drove along a country road on his way to this city. Without a word Landers brought his whip down with a tremendous crack over his horse's back, and simultaneously the six-shooter spat fire at him.

The first bullet was wide, passing in front of the carriage, but the next fired as Landers was about opposite the masked man hit him in the calf of the leg. Four shots were fired before Landers' flying ride carried him to safety. The second bullet was the only one to find its mark. Landers is a groceryman here.

Sheriff Walker went to the scene in an automobile and, although he put bloodhounds on the foot-prints which appeared to have been made by the would-be assassin, the dogs failed to keep the trail. Landers' hat was found in the road near the scene.

do wish to say we retire from the work with the very best of feelings for those who have been our patrons, both as subscribers and as advertisers. Our work has been as pleasant as that of average newspaper men, no doubt. We are simply changing work because we think it will be good for us as well as for you. On the 1st of April the News will be under its new management.



Voting on Prohibition in Future

There is some inquiry as to the meaning of the vote in July on the amendment in case it carries, which the Dallas News answers in the following paragraphs.

The proposition which has been submitted to the voters of Texas, and upon which they will pass on July 22, is to repeal the present Section 20 of Article 16 of the Constitution and to adopt another Section 20 in its place.

"Present—Section 20. The legislature shall at its first session enact a law whereby the qualified voters of any county, justice's precinct, town, city (or such sub-division of a county as may be designated by the Commissioners' Court of said county) may by a majority vote determine from time to time whether the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be prohibited within the prescribed limits."

"Proposed—Section 20. The manufacture for purpose of sale, barter and exchange and the sale, barter and exchange of intoxicating liquors on and after the second Tuesday in January, A. D. 1912, is hereby prohibited within this state, except for medicinal, scientific and sacramental purposes. The legislature of the state of Texas shall at noon, on the second Tuesday in January, A. D. 1912, by authority of this section, meet in session in the city of Austin, and pass efficient laws to enforce this section; but nothing contained in this section shall prevent any session of the legislature from passing any law to enforce the same; and all laws in force when this amendment is adopted providing remedies, penalties or forfeitures in relation to the manufacture sale and transportation of intoxicating liquors shall remain in full force and effect until modified or repealed."

If the amendment (the new section) should be adopted, the local option system will be at an end, and there will be no further voting on the subject of prohibition in Texas, unless at some time in the future the legislature should resubmit the question, and to do this a two-thirds vote of the legislature would be required in each branch of same.

In the event of the adoption of the new section, State-wide prohibition will become the rule on the second Tuesday in January, 1912; but its effectiveness will depend upon the action of the legislature, which is directed by the proposed section to enact laws for the enforcement of state-wide prohibition.

In short, if the amendment carries, local option cases and state-wide prohibition becomes the rule.

ANCESTORS OF NAPOLEON

Great Emperor of France Was Descended on Both Sides From Distinguished Italian Families.

On the paternal side he was descended from one of the most illustrious families of Florence. Civil dissension occasioned many of the noble families to emigrate from time to time, among whom was the ancestor of that branch of the Bonaparte family from which Napoleon was descended.

When the island of Corsica became subject to France, Carlo Bonaparte, the father of Napoleon, whose profession was the law, was chosen to represent the nobility of the country. He afterward received the appointment of "procureur de roi," or king's attorney general, at Ajaccio. Napoleon was educated at the Ecole Royale Militaire at Paris, an institution founded by Louis XV. for the education of the sons of noble families with small fortunes for the military service; and his eldest sister was educated at the academy of St. Cyr, which was a foundation for the education of young ladies of noble family.

On the maternal side the descent of Bonaparte is still more distinguished. The family of Ramolino, to which his mother Madame Bonaparte, belonged, is one of the most ancient in the republic of Genoa, and allied not only to all the principal families of that republic, but to the families of most of the great potentates of Europe.





FIRST JURY CASE.

A noted case tried in the reign of the conqueror, with Otho, bishop of Bayeux, presiding as judge, has been erroneously supposed to be the first jury case on record. A dispute had arisen about certain lands, to which the sheriff laid claim on behalf of the king. All the men in the county were assembled and sworn to say the truth. BREEDING OF NEW PLANTS

Experts Now Are Giving Attention to Developing Varieties That Have Certain Desired Qualities.

New purposes are constantly entering into the breeding of plants. We are producing maize with extra high content of starch, and other forms with high content of oil. The Germans breed potatoes for alcohol production and other special uses. We need peaches and other fruits for extra long shipments. We have peas and sweet corn specially adapted for canning. We are beginning to breed for disease-resisting qualities. The United States department of agriculture is working on a wilt-resisting cotton and watermelon, a rust-resisting oat and similar things. The North Dakota experiment station is producing a disease-resisting flax. The Maine and Vermont experiment stations are investigating the subject of blight-proof potatoes. We shall probably breed blight-resisting peaches, disease-free ginseng and blight-proof tomatoes. We already have a wilt-resisting and non-tail-resistant cowpea, although not the result of direct breeding. We are constantly giving more attention to securing plants that have the desired qualities inherent in themselves rather than in obtaining these qualities by means outside the plants.—From L. H. Bailey's "An Iowa Plant Breeder," in Century.

WHAT WE OWE TO ASIATICS

Literature, Arts, Sciences, Copper Work and Weaving of Cotton, Wool and Silk Come From Them.

It was Asia, through Arabia, which gave Europe the literature, the arts, and the sciences, which we have developed and of which we now boast. Gunpowder was probably invented in China; it was certainly introduced into Europe from Arabia. The finely-tempered steel of Damascus went over from Arabia at the time of the Moorish invasion of Spain; and its manufacture was continued at Toledo. The copper-smiths of Bagdad supplied the world's market with their wonderful productions centuries before there were any industries in Europe. Weaving of silk and cotton had its birth as an industry in Arabia, and the weaving of wool was learned by the Crusaders in the same wonderful country. Astronomy, mathematics, the mariner's compass—all came to us from the Arabs. And Asia is coming into her own again.

Texas Industrial Notes

The Pecos Commercial Club has closed a deal with a Northern company for the erection of a packing house at Pecos, and construction of the plant will begin at once. The leading commercial clubs of the state, especially those in the cattle raising sections are urging the necessity for more packing houses, and plants have been established in Amarillo, Sweetwater and other West Texas towns. It costs about five dollars to ship Texas cattle to the Chicago packing houses and the shipper pays the freight. If more packing houses were built in Texas to utilize our surplus of live stock five dollars would be added to the price of Texas cattle which would go into the pockets of the producer. This would mean \$43,970,000 added to the value of Texas cattle which is more than the packing houses would cost.

The Texas hen is becoming world famous and her cackle

sounds as musical to the farmer as the clink of gold dollars but with all her enterprise she has heretofore been compelled to accept a secondary position on the farm; the eggs are exchanged for coffee and sugar; they buy the baby new dresses and occasionally relieve the family purse strings but the farmer looks to other products for his money crop. Mr. J. F. Peck has reversed this custom by putting in a first class poultry yard inside the city limits of Sherman, and will give his entire time to the poultry business. The plant is equipped with incubators, glass eggs, sanitary nests, and all up-to-date labor saving appliances and the hens have nothing to do but lay eggs. All eggs will be guaranteed and no chickens will be counted until they are hatched.

A number of commercial clubs are offering prizes for the best farm products, organizing corn clubs, hog clubs and preparing to hold agricultural exhibits and live stock shows this fall which is a commendable method of encouraging agriculture and promoting the prosperity of the country. But how about the human race. Babies are about as important to the welfare and future prosperity of a country as hogs, dogs and chickens and without special attention the Texas stork has become world famous; we have the largest families of any state in the Union and the native Texan ranks at the head of the human race in physique and intelligence but if we encouraged the babies by organizing stork clubs, offering blue ribbons, gold medals and parading this noble bird before the public as we do prize-winning colts at country fairs we would soon build up a civilization as noted as that of ancient Greece as well as marry off our old maids and bachelors. In its

last analysis the quality and quantity of the people regulate the value of property in a community. As a rule property sells according to the number of people within a given area regardless of the number of head of live stock it may contain and the happiness of a people depends upon the number of babies in the homes and not upon the number of hogs in the community. It is all right to hold corn shows, hog shows, etc., but how about baby shows?

The man with the cow is becoming almost as popular in Texas as the man with the hoe and the demand for pure milk and dairy products of all kinds is growing larger every day. The United States Department of Agriculture estimates that 2000 pounds of butter, which is worth \$500, takes less than fifty cents worth of plant food from the ground, and that the industry is one of the most profitable in which the Southern farmer can engage. The opportunities for dairying in Texas are almost unlimited, and with the excellent ranges and plenty of domestic grasses there is no reason why the Texas dairyman should not prosper, without being subject to the proverbial charge of "watering his stock."

Last week on his farm near Cotulla, President Kerr of the Stockman's National Bank of Cotulla, discovered a rich deposit of coal while sinking a well on his land. The deposit was reached at a depth of only sixty feet and is one of the most promising veins uncovered in Texas in recent years. Arrangements are under way for developing this field, shafts are being sunk and machinery is being placed for working the mine on a large scale. The coal fields of Texas are unexplored but the Government has examined a portion of

our coal field and estimates a deposit 31,000,000,000 tons. If we continue to mine our coal at the present rate it will take 16,900 years to get this coal out of the ground.

Oil development is becoming more active in different sections of the state and local capital and independent operators are becoming actively interested in the development of this industry. Reports from the Pecos country say that much prospecting is going on in that section; wells are also being drilled inside the city limits of Longview. In the San Antonio fields much progress is being made and additional wells are being sunk. Reiser is a new gas and oil center lately opened up. Texas oil and gas fields rank among the first in the United States and the product that makes millionaires while you wait, flows in inexhaustible quantities from innumerable wells throughout the state. Texas is thus enabled to offer added inducements to industrial enterprises in the way of cheap fuel.

About 700,000 acres of oats were harvested in Texas during 1910, the yield varying from twenty to seventy-five bushels per acre and the total amounting to about 24,325,000 bushels.


