## Farmers' Institute Well Attended

The Farmers' Institute, the first session of its history, was called to order by President H. M. Ferrien Saturday afternoon at 1 o'clock in the District Court room. The program was opened by some remarks along the line of farming by Bro. Wilhoite and with a word of prayer.

Mr. Ferrien then read a paper which he had prepared bearing on the subject of education of the farmer along those lines in which he is especially interested. Prof. Muse made a talk along the same line that was interesting and of a nature to awaken thought. W. B. Mitchell of Margaret responded with an excellent paper on the subject of good roads, bringing out many interesting facts on that subject.

The subject was also discussed by Dr. P. L. Kincaid. The thought which we regard as the most important one developed was that it is economy to build good roads even though at heavy

cost, while it is ruinous extravagance not to do so as the country develops. Some eye-opening statistics were read by Mr. Mitchell and others cited by Dr. Kincaid as to the road proposition.

A short talk was made by J. W. Bell on wheat farming, in which his conservation of moisture was set forth in deep and early fall plowing. Mr. Bell says he is not thoroughly satisfied as to subsoil plowing but is going to satisfy himself on that subject by actual experience. He has eight acres which he proposes to plow to a depth to which he has never gone.

The exercises were interspersed with well-rendered recitations from Miss Owens, daughter of G. D. Owens, and Miss Lottie Woods, each of which was received with hearty applause from the audience.

The News is pleased to report this splendid beginning of the Farmers' Institute and hopes

that it may lead to great things in agricultural lines. It is important that these meetings be well attended and the various subjects thoroughly discussed. And it is also important that men of all vocations attend and enter into the discussions. It is necessary that the Farmers' Institute be made our institution whether we be farmers or not. It should be yours, it matters not in what you may be engaged. It is from the earth that we all get our living. Then let us awake to our surroundings and make a study of agriculture, the ground rock of all vocations. The News commits itself freely to the advocacy of any and all methods of procedure towards greater achievements in this direction.



**Victory for Women**

How many of the ladies of Crowell realize that a victory has been won by the women of the United States in the past week, over Postmaster General Hitchcock and the Senate? Only those who have seen the Woman's National Daily and read from day to day of the bitter fight being waged in the Senate by the Postal department backed and bought by the Express Companies against the great Magazines. Few of us would stop to think what this fight meant and of what importance is the victory not only to ourselves but to the nation. It meant that such magazines as were fearless in exposing rotteness in high places (Upton Sinclair in his war on the beef trust, the exposure of the Standard Oil methods and the Sugar Trust and others) would be suppressed or obliged to go out of business because they were teaching the people where to place the blame for our economic conditions. It meant that paper manufacturers would have to close down because of less demand for their product; it meant that thousands of employees would be thrown out of employment; it meant that millions of dollars invested in expensive printing plants would go to waste, and all because they made too public the graft that is ruling our government.

The publishers in Washington following the victory of the American Woman's League and The National Daily in effecting the defeat of the movement to raise magazine rates, are loud in their praise of the work done by the Leaguers. They confess that without the assistance which they had from the 100,000 women who compose the League Founder's Chapter they would still be fighting their battle in the senate and with small chance of winning it."

"Under the organization of the American Woman's League, woman will establish her own republic, so powerful as to be able to secure for her any laws, any opportunities, any advantages she may demand and will so train her that should suffrage be demanded and secured she will step into its use and responsibilities trained, experienced and organized. I believe that with her own republic once organized she will prefer its powers and opportunities to that of franchise, since man has denied her the suffrage. Woman is, through the League, building an empire peculiarly her own that will yet stand on an equal footing with that of man.

"We seek to found the woman's republic on education, the arts, and the best there is in human life. May woman preserve it clean and true, for on its shoulders will rest the hope of the people and their homes. If our grandparents poured out their lives and treasure to establish these United States, will women refuse the sacrifice and effort needed to establish a greater power and resource for good—a government within a government, but one of such high ideals and purposes as to make sweet and clean the hidden places and carry this nation to the fore-front in education and the fine arts as man has carried it in money-making?"

"The League's battle is the same battle which the founders of this nation fought and won, but which their descendants have sold for money."

"We fight for a free and fearless press; the right of a fair, open hearing in one's own defense when accused; an equal standard of morals for man and woman; temperance; an equal opportunity for woman; cleanliness, daylight, sunshine in the nation, community and home; education without price or limit; an honest administration of public office; abolition of child labor; the preservation of the

nation's natural resources for our children and grand-children; rights, not privileges; the improvement and beautifying of the nation, the city, the community and the home; an equal standing before the law for woman; and the opening to woman of every possible avenue of independence and opportunity."

Will you ladies of Crowell not enlist in this the League's Army of Independence and become a citizen of its republic?"

The home comes even before your religion, for without the former there would be no church and the American Woman's League means first and last the preservation of the home; the beautifying of the home and the education of our children. Enroll yourselves under the banner of the greatest organization the world has ever known and in the meantime allow me to help the cause along by sending for your subscriptions for you. **Sam Houston**

Seventy-five years ago the 21st of next month, Sam Houston, with 750 brave men behind him, changed the destiny of one nation and enlarged the perspective of another.

However time may have sobered the judgement of his fellowmen or dimmed the brilliancy of his achievement on that day, the state whose sovereignty he secured and his country to whose material advantage it has ever since inured can never withhold from him the credit of a performance, accomplished under trying difficulties, which entitles him to consideration as among the world's benefactors. In lowering the colors of the emotional Santa Anna on the banks of the San Jacinto he evolved a new industrial empire and experience hath shown builded more wisely than he knew. Republics may be ungrateful and grow indifferent to the memory of those who have done most to make eminent but every fragrant blossom that lifts its face to the soft southern breeze out of the once barren wilderness to whose development he gave life and impetus, pays its silent tribute to Sam Houston, soldier of fortune, whose spirit still lives to inspire and animate posterity if he dose'nt. Born in Virginia while the country was still felicitating on the establishment of its own government and the distinguished part played in achieving that coveted position by its First Citizen, Houston gave a nation a domain greater in area and more fruitful in soil than that for which the intrepid Continental Army suffered and offered up the last full measure of devotion in the eight years struggle for independence. His warlike instinct, sharpened by his intimate association with the Cherokees, who adopted him as their son and imbued him with their philosophy of life, he cherished the blessings of peace where they would be secured

with honor more than most men similarly nurtured.

In the forty-eight years since his fathers gathered him back into the fold, Texas, once the synonym for the most primitive of American civilization, has seen its place among the most prosperous and most orderly of the states of the Union. Occupying a negative position but a few years ago as a producer of every day staples it now boasts of more wheat lands than the two Dakotas, more corn lands than Illinois, more fruit lands than California, more timber than Michigan; produces more vegetables than Indiana, more rice than all the other states combined, more cattle than any single state, more petroleum than Pennsylvania, more iron than Alabama, more marble than Vermont, more granite than New Hampshire, has more railroad mileage than the great state of New York and adds \$600,000,000 a year to the agricultural wealth of Uncle Sam.

It raises one third of the total cotton crop of \$850,000,000 grown annually in the country and with the development of the American linen industry made possible by the Oxford processes which achieve here in 24 hours which requires 30 weeks to accomplish abroad, Texas will be the largest producer of flax in the world. Largely an unexplored wilderness Sam in Houston's day it now gives shelter and a good living to almost 4,000,000 persons. Worth relatively little then, it has a reality value to-day of \$8,000,000,000 and is growing at the rate of half a billion dollars a year. Of all his countrymen, none would be prouder of the wonderful growth of Texas which these striking achievements represent, than Sam Houston, were he allowed to penetrate the veil of the tomb and view the magic changes that have been wrought by the wizardry of time over the land which to him was the fairest of the universe over.

It wasn't the height of the buildings in lower Manhattan that impressed him, nor the crowds of Nassau street, nor the speed of the elevators, nor the intemperance of the people, relates the New York Sun. He took them as matters of course—about what he had expected. When they took him up to the twenty-fifth floor he was plainly interested in the ships and the ferriboats. But these two were about what he had looked for. Presently, however, he caught something moving in the bed of the ravine at his feet. "By George," said he, "that's queer. I'd never thought of that." What he saw was a covered delivery wagon with the name of the firm painted broadly on the top. On the flat roof of a little building to the south was painted the name of a printer and the special kind of work he did. Good roads are winning a permanent place in popularity with the farmers and no community is considered progressive that has not improved its public highways. Build good roads and place your community in the progressive class.

Property is the basis of prosperity. We may increase our wealth by creating property, adding value to property and by moving property into the community. The farms, mines and fisheries are the natural producing lines of industry and increase wealth.

Texas has 122,000 births annually, which is a birth every four minutes, according to the Texas Commercial Secretaries Association, which keeps close tab on the work of the stork in the state. This is a splendid record but even at this rate it will take the stork sixty-five years to double our population. The stork is a valuable bird but entirely too slow for empire building. We need people from other states and countries.

The Government Census Report on cotton ginned places the 1910 crop for the United States at 11,254,115 bales against 9,737,592 bales for 1909, making an increase in production of 1,436,523 bales over last year. Of the 1910 production Texas furnishes 2,912,244 bales and of the increase in production we show 534,650 bales. When we enter the realm of King Cotton Texas is a power that must be reckoned with. We have just had statewide rain and the prospects for a bumper crop in 1911 look bright.

The immigration movement towards Texas is assuming large proportions every day, and practically every important railroad whose lines extend into Texas are running special ex-

ursion and homeseeker trains into the state. A pleasing feature of our immigration is that it is composed of a class of prosperous, substantial men and women who are turning their faces towards Texas with the view of making permanent homes in the state. The movement towards Texas is a perfectly natural one, as Texas presents golden opportunities to every class of citizenship.

The construction of good roads will go a long way toward solving the problem of keeping the young men on the farm which is a question that is receiving much attention at this time. It is not hard work that drives the young people from the farm to the city nor is it allurements that entices them away from the old home down on the farm so much as it is the isolation of farm life that discourages the boy in the rural districts. The building of good roads, besides checking this exodus from the farm to the city will add thousands of dollars to the value of contiguous property and will give quick returns for the money invested.

The public schools of Texas are on a higher plane of efficiency and are enjoying an area of greater prosperity than ever before in their history. The extension and improvement of our rural schools during the past few years is an important step made by our educational system and reflects great credit on the people of this state. The scholastic population of the state on August 31st, 1908 was 893,441 and for the scholastic year ending August 31st, 1910 was 949,096 making an increase of 55,655, during the past two years. The spirit of co-operation among all educational forces of Texas has created an educational atmosphere which has tended to give strength and impetus to the movement for better schools and for the highest type of citizenship.

### Pool and Billiard Halls

The following statement of facts will give some idea as to what the people of Oklahoma think of these things: The people of Eldorado it seems were the first to take action. They passed an ordinance to prohibit the running of pool and billiard halls in the city limits. The case was carried to higher courts and sustained. A short time ago a petition signed by seven hundred people was presented to the City Council of Frederick asking that these things be abolished. Indianapolis has also taken action along the same line.

Altus, Okla., Feb. 9, 1911.

To Whom This May Concern: It has been reported to me that parties are circulating the report that notwithstanding, that the people of Altus voted the pool and billiard halls out, and that the city council, by ordinance put them out, they are now running wide open in the city of Altus.

The party or parties circulating such report is or are doing so either through ignorance or willful falsehood. Pool and billiard halls with all their attendant vices are a thing of the past in Altus.

Since they have been put out scheming parties have tried to work the city council to get them in again, but the council will not permit them and if it were left to the voters, they would vote stronger than ever to keep them out, for our people know they were the hotbeds of all manner of vice and corruption. They were the haunts of the bootlegger, the gambler, the procurer for lewd women, and every other vice and crime in the calendar of crimes.



A wife in the Congo region costs \$10. This sum is paid to the parents of the girl or to the man who owns her as his slave. The girl seldom has any voice in the matter. Sometimes, however, the couple wishing to be married make their own bargain and then it is an interesting business. The young man seeks to meet the darling of his dreams. But how and where are the questions that worry and puzzle him. Often he takes refuge in the home of the evangelist and gets him to write a note for him. He then goes out, cuts a stick and splits it at the top, puts the letter in the split and hurries to get a carrier.

When it is delivered he stands around to see how it is received. If it is favorably received a nice pot of food is cooked and sent to him. The parties are then considered engaged. A man can have as many wives as he can buy. I saw one man, a king, who had 40. The marriage feast is a ceremonious affair with the heathen. If the groom is wealthy all of the drums, horns, bells, musicians and dancing masters are hired to do the bride honor. All of the luxuries of the tropics, according to the native ideas, are in evidence at the feast. I have known them to have a hundred pots of food at a single wedding supper.—Southern Workman.

## POSSUM BREEDING.

Mr. Le Souef, curator of the Sydney Zoological gardens, has proposed the breeding of opossums in Queensland on systematic lines. Mr. Le Souef would select, he says, a site sheltered from the westerly winds, as possums like protection from the cold while they are feeding.
