Jubilee Visitors Are Invited To Visit and Inspect New Hospital

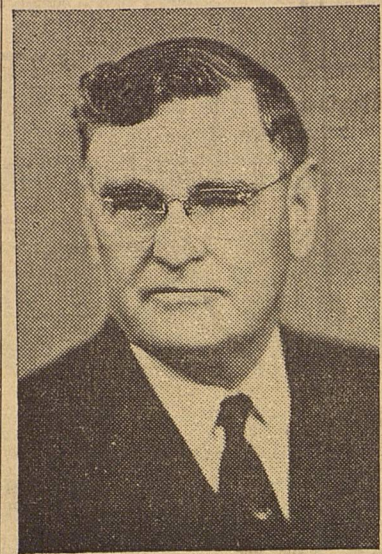

Pupils of Riverside School Win Places at Regional Meet

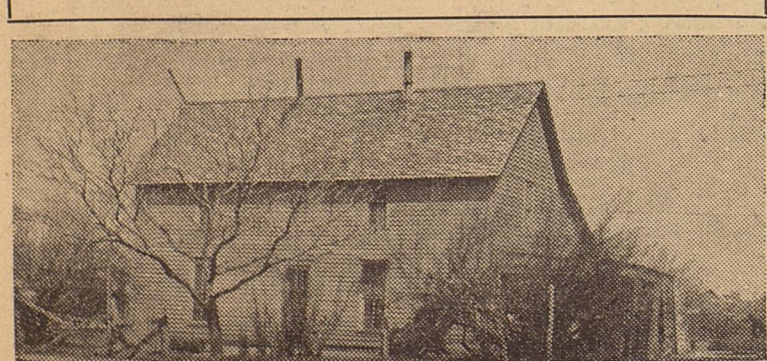

WPA Approving Only National Defense Projects At Present

The Works Progress Administration is not approving any projects at the present time except those for national defense and it is at this time, therefore, impossible for additional projects to be inaugurated, according to Judge Leslie Thomas who returned from Fort Worth Wednesday where he conferred with Herman Holtzer, acting supervisor, concerning W. P. A. operations in Foard.

This, of course, is due to limited finances, national defense, and quota reductions. Judge Thomas and the Commissioners' Court have manifested a desire and ability to secure further projects if and when they can be approved by W. P. A. and quota calculations will permit.

Rodeo, Parade and Memorial Service to Be Principal Features

Largest Crowd Ever to Gather in Foard Expected to Attend Birthday Celebration

Foard County's Golden Anniversary Jubilee, which will be the greatest celebration in the history of the county, will be opened Monday morning at 10 o'clock and continue until Tuesday midnight.

Plans for the two-day celebration, which is believed will be attended by a record crowd, have been completed, according to George Self, general chairman; and Dwight Moody, J. R. Beverly, Leslie Thomas and John Rasor, the committee appointed by the Farmers' and Business Men's Association when plans were first formed in January.

The Program

The program will be officially opened Monday morning at 10 o'clock with a concert played by bands from Quanah and Vernon. A speech of welcome will be made by Judge Leslie Thomas shortly after the start of the concert.

Shortly before the noon hour, at about 11 o'clock, a dedication service will be held on the court house lawn for the newly completed Foard County Hospital, during which the hospital will be officially turned over to the county by the Works Progress Administration. Judge Thomas of Crowell and Herman Holtzer of Fort Worth, acting W. P. A. Supervisor, will be in charge of this program.

Most of the first morning will be devoted to the registration of Foard County's pioneers and other guests of the celebration. Registration will be done by members of the Crowell Business and Professional Women's Club and a number of booths will be placed on the business streets of Crowell for this purpose. The old-timers and guests will be presented with cards bearing their names and addresses to be pinned on.

A part of the morning's program will be turned over to the Lighterust Doughboys, popular string band of Fort Worth, who will be here all day Monday. They will participate in the pioneer parade and give another musical program in the afternoon.

Basket Lunch
At 12 o'clock of the first day of the Golden Jubilee, a basket lunch will be spread on California and Houston Streets, south and east of the court house for visitors and guests. Two tables reaching from the intersection of California and Houston Streets with Main and Commerce Streets will be erected for the dinner. The streets will be roped off and washed Sunday and there will be no traffic allowed on the streets until after the dinner.

The food for this dinner will be brought by the people of Foard County with well-filled baskets. Some 6,000 people were fed in this manner during the celebration five years ago, and Claude Callaway, chairman of the dinner committee, feels assured that the people of the county will make the dinner even greater this year.

Chuck Wagon Dinner
The old-time cowboys of Foard County who are present for the Jubilee will be treated to a real old-fashioned chuck wagon feed at noon Monday. The chuck wagon and members of the Wichita Falls Chuck Wagon Gang will be here for this purpose and H. E. Ferguson, chairman, will be in charge. Only those who are real pioneer cowboys of Foard will receive invitations to this affair.

Pioneer Parade
Beginning at 1:30 p. m. sharp the huge pioneer parade will take place. The parade, which is expected to be at least two miles in length, will form on Logan Street, six blocks north of the square.

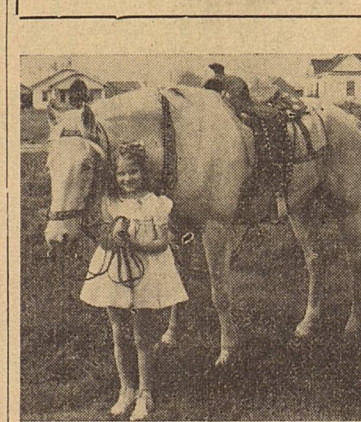

Public Health Has Made Gains Since First World War

Austin.—Data released by the Texas State Headquarters for Selective Service reveal that out of the first 9,506 Texas draftees, 28.79 per cent, nearly one out of every three, were temporarily or permanently rejected for active service because of health defects. These figures show a slightly lower percentage of rejectees than during the draft period of World War I, when 31.2 per cent of the men examined by local draft boards were rejected.

"On the basis of these figures, we find evidence of the tremendous task that lies ahead of us if the degree of physical fitness required for an all-out national defense program is to be attained. The professions of medical science and public health are utilizing every weapon at their command to improve the state of the Nation's health, but they alone cannot win the battle. The support of each individual citizen and his co-operation are invaluable in raising the health levels of the Nation and the State," Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, stated.

Further examination of the medical reports on the first nine thousand Texas draftees provides statistical information on the most prevalent health defects and indicates where the greatest health hazards lie among the younger male population.

Of the 2,737 young men rejected for military service, or placed in limited service groups, 967, or 10.17 per cent of the total draftees, were placed in Draft Classification I-B as having minor physical defects, perhaps remediable, which would make them unadaptable to the regular military service, but, if necessary, would allow them to be placed in limited service. In Class I-B the physical impairments most commonly found were defects of the eyes, 163 cases; hernia, 122; syphilis, 132; skeleto-muscular defects, 97; teeth, 90. The 363 additional rejections for various other defects brought the total of Class I-B rejectees to 967.

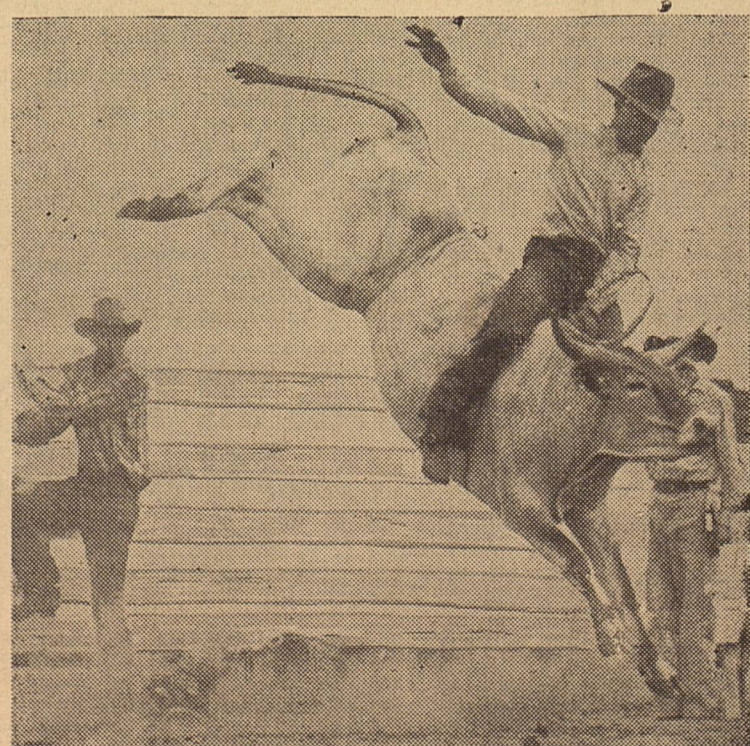

rejection because of physical defects) numbered 1,770 persons. Out of this number, 430 were rejected because of skeleto-muscular defects, 235 because of syphilis, 189 because of impaired vision, 162 because of diseases of the nervous system, 126 because of heart trouble, 87 because of hernia, 85 because of teeth, 78, eye, ear, nose and throat diseases; and 378 persons rejected for other physical defects.

It is impossible to know without consulting the case histories of each individual rejectee to what his physical unfitness can be attributed. It can be established that there are many indications of improper childhood care, of harmful and debilitating personal health habits, of malnutrition and lack of attention to positive health measures.

The above figures are not without significance to every thinking citizen. They reveal that in the tremendous advances made in the period since the World War the field of medical science and public health have not had as positive an effect on the health of the public at large as is desirable or necessary if we as a nation are to have optimum health.

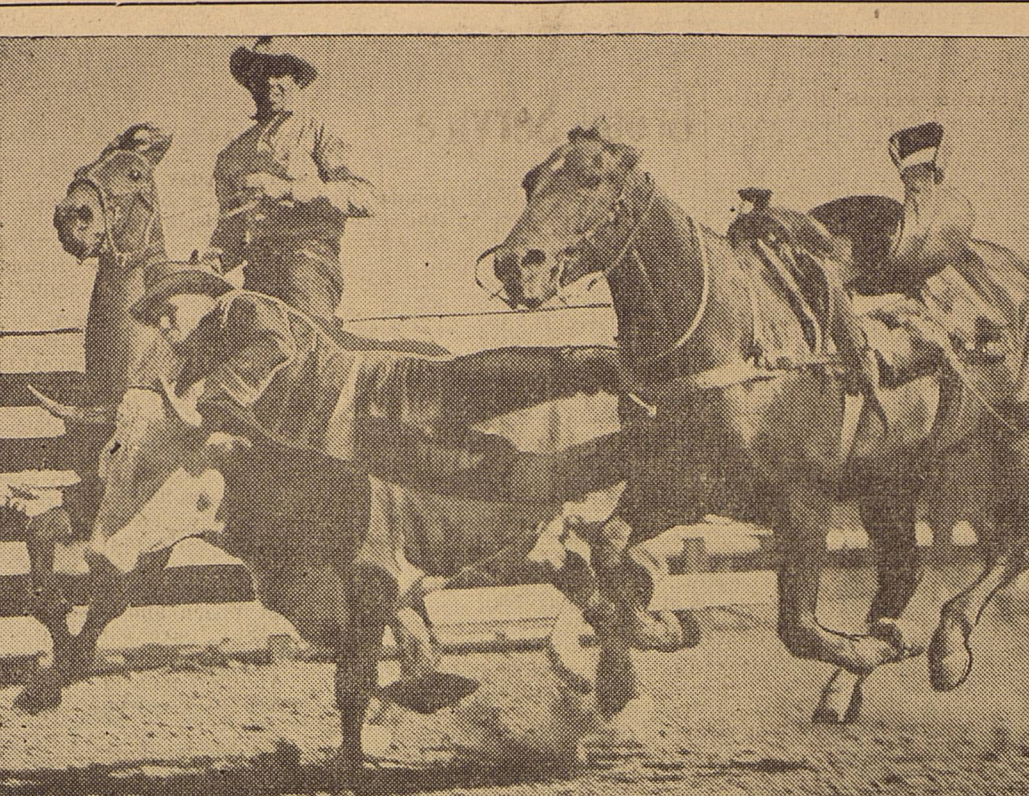

Foard Hospital To Be Member of Group Service

The Foard County Hospital has become a member of the Group Hospital Service, Incorporated, according to information received from the area office in Dallas, and present groups in Crowell will be re-opened for a limited time to allow new members to enroll, in line with the opening of the new hospital.

Following is a part of the letter received announcing the acceptance of the local hospital:

"Group Hospital Service is happy to welcome the Foard County Hospital to the roster of recognized hospitals in the State, and wish to pledge their support toward helping this hospital pay its own way. Group Hospital Service is the servant of the Texas Hospitals, and is anxious to serve not only the fine new Foard County Hospital, but also the people of the county. May we suggest that the easiest way for this county to maintain their hospital protection so that when the need for the hospitalization arises, the burden of the bill will not fall on the taxpayers of Foard County."

During the past year quite a number of Crowell and Foard County people have benefitted from the Group Hospital Service plan of hospitalization. These people and many others realize the need for some type of prepayment plan to meet such an emergency as hospital care when it is needed. For only a few cents each month each employed person and their families can have their hospital bill paid before they even enter the hospital.

Dr. J. F. Kimball of Dallas originated the first non-profit plan of hospitalization in the United States. Today, Dr. Kimball is at the head of Group Hospital Service, Incorporated, of Texas. The plan has grown until today there are sixty-six non-profit plans in the United States and Canada with over six million people enrolled. In the State of Texas alone there are over one hundred thousand subscribers, and Group Hospital Service has paid the Texas hospitals over one-half million dollars.

John E. Long of Crowell is the local representative of Group Hospital Service and will be on hand during the opening of the new hospital to furnish descriptive literature as to how protection under this non-profit plan may be secured.

Group Hospital Service is endorsed by the Texas Hospital Association and the Texas Medical Society. The doctors in this area are anxious to see all of the people participate in this plan.

Tenant Farmers Have Chance to Purchase Farms

Tenant farmers of Foard County have another chance to become farm owners, for Julian Wright, Farm Security Administration Supervisor, has announced that application blanks will be available April 25 for long-term, low interest loans with which tenants may buy farms.

"Most farm families have ownership of a family-size farm as their goal," Mr. Wright said, "and it is for these people that the FSA's tenant purchase program is designed. Sharecroppers and farm laborers as well as tenants are eligible for these loans, but preference is given to families which have adequate livestock and equipment.

Farmers to whom these loans are made choose the farm they wish to buy, which is valued by the local tenant purchase committee, composed of county farmers who know local land values, and by outside appraisers. Borrowers are not restricted to fully-improved farms, for the loan may be made to include funds to build or repair the home, barn, and for other improvements.

Tenant farmers of Foard County may get the application blanks in the county judge's office, Crowell, Texas.
