Wild and Structural Fires Cause at Least One Death, Evacuates Cross Plains, Vicinity BY MARGARET HETRICK

Unseasonably

conditions across the Big Country and large areas of Texas have caused wild and stru 'ural fires to flare up for several weeks.

On Tuesday, December 27, 2005, Cross Plains in Callahan County was the victim of a wildfire, which destroyed homes and buildings, including the Methodist Church.

At least one death is believed to have been caused by the fire. A fire was reported

northwest of Cross Plains at Peak area. approximately 12:30 P.M. witness reports, the flames reached 30-40 feet at times.

Later a sheet of flames and smoke approached Cross Plains. DPS troopers put up road blocks on Highway 36 and other roads going into the town.

Firefighters emergency crews were called to Cross Plains from across the Big Country. Shelters for evacuees were set up at the Brownwood Coliseum by the Pecan Valley Chapter of the American Red Cross, and at a Cross Plains 1st Baptist Church, according to reports.

Governor Perry responded to the wildfires with a order to deploy the Texas Army National Guard assets, with assistance from the U.S. Forest Service. He issued a disaster statewide declaration.

Wildfire threat levels are expected to remain high for the next 30 days, due to a weather pattern that has created the most severe wildfire threat in five years in Texas, the Governor's office stated.





Common Cold or Strep?

Fever, runny nose, sore dish that allows the strep bacthroat and cough-these are some of the symptoms that lee you may experience during oild cold and flu season. However, when is a scratchy throat just an annoying side effect of the common cold or a sign of a more serious illness, such as strep throat?

cent of sore throats are caused by viruses, and 10 to 20 percent are caused by Streptococcus, the bacterium that causes strep throat. A respiratory infection, such as strep, spreads easily when people are in close contact with one another, such as in an office setting or a college vd 1 dormitory. However, strep is in more commonly seen in children between 5 and 11 years of age.

"Anytime your child has persistent sore throat, even if inior they do not have other symp-11 5t toms like a runny nose or fever, you should call your pediatrician," said Kelley Taynwo lor, MD, FCAP, a pathologist from Atlanta, Ga. "If left untreated, strep can develop into a more serious-and of a sometime life-threatening condition, such as rheumatic fever or kidney failure."

Symptoms of strep throat can vary depending on a child's age and are similar to those of the common cold. Some of the common symptoms, according to the National Institute of Health, include:

- · Sore throat
- · Fever
- · Difficulty swallowing
- Fussiness
- · Lack of appetite Swollen glands

If a sore throat is accompanied with a rash or if a child has difficulty breathing or extreme trouble swallowing this could indicate a more serious illness and immediae medical attention is require

"It's difficult to definitively dignose whether a person hala virus or strep throat simply by examining the patient," aid Dr. Taylor, a physician who diagnoses patients with illness such as strep throat through laboratory medicine. "That's why it's important for patients to visit their physician and receive the proper testing so that a positive diagnosis can be made."

If strep throat is suspected. a physician or other medical care provider will perform a throat culture by swabbing a patient's tonsils and back of the throat. The smear is then dipped into a special culture

The 17th District Dead, Or Just Asleep?

"What if we get our 17th District back?"

"Is there a chance the Supreme Court might make it happen?"

A few months ago such questions would have been considered ridiculous, but now they are being asked.

They are in reference, of course, to the historic U.S. Congressional 17th District of West Texas. It was carefully redrawn by the courts in 2001, then swept away in 2003. The area was divided into new districts, with Eastland County placed in the 19th.

However, on Dec. 12, 2005, the U.S. Supreme Court announced that they would hear arguments on constitutional challenges to Texas' redrawn congressional boundaries.

The 17th District had been composed of a block of counties with close proximity and similar interests. It was replaced with a long, loosely connected string of counties stretching from Eastland to a base at Lubbock and the border of New Mexico.

Randy Neugebauer, as a Republican candidate in 2004, said in Cisco that the 17th District was part of the

He said he didn't dwell on the past, but looked to the future, which included the newly created 19th District. He presented himself as the best Representative for the future, for he was part of the Republican team.

Among the Republicans who definitely had a part in redistricting was Rep. Tom DeLay, U.S. House Majority Leader. Apparently his reasoning was to "get rid" of Democratic representatives across Texas and elect Republicans.

DeLay, from Sugarland, wielded donated money and power across Texas and else-

where. Apparently he was supported by Gov. Rick Perry, Rep. Tom Craddick (before and after he became Speaker of the Texas House) Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst, U.S. Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison, and many others. DeLay and others were major fundraisers. Currently DeLay and two of his associates, Jim Ellis and John Colyrando, are under indictment for illegally funneling corporate donations to 2002

They are awaiting trial, and not quietly - especially on the part of DeLay.

Challenges were immediately filed in the courts, but nothing much happened. Various rulings upheld the actions of the Republicans, or at lease indicated they were within Texas law.

would consider the case, the High Court set March 1, 2006 as the date to hear oral arguments. It appears that the Court will hear arguments from four separate appeals that have been consolidated into one case.

This means the Court will consider whether the current Texas Primaries. Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott has stated that elections will go forward under existing districts.

A decision is expected from the Supreme Court before the end of June, 2006.

If the Court finds Texas' Congressional Districts illegal it could send the matter back to the Texas Legislature. Wonder what would happen to it there?

Could the Court require that these districts be put back into the same configuration that was drawn up in 2001? Hopefully yes, and new elections called.

But nothing can turn back time and all of its changes, as we all sadly learn. It is hard to undo anything as drastic as redesigning voting areas, and impossible to replace good people who are gone.

And who can wipe away the feeling that an election was manipulated? Who can undo something like that? But in the meanwhile, a basic question continues: "Does West Texas get its 17th District back?"

Perhaps the best thing that could come of this redistricting fiasco is that the process will finally be taken away from political parties and courts, and entrusted to a delegation chosen by the public.
