



Business Streets of Crowell Topped Friday


Work on State Highway 16 through Foard County north and south was finished last Friday afternoon with the completion of repairing and re-topping of the streets in the business section of Crowell.

Repair work on the city streets was started two weeks ago and completed last week by the local department of the State Highway Maintenance Department under the supervision of Curtis Ribble, Premier Mussolini inspects one of section foreman. The last part of the highway work, which was finished last week, consisted of topping the gravel base from Crowell north to Pease River and from Beaver Creek south to the Wichita River, Also included in the work was the repairing of State Highway 28 west of Crow-

The work north of Crowell was done by Brown & Root, and the work south was done by Ernest Loyd, Fort Worth contractor. All of this work was done under the supervision of Mr. Bryan.

At present, topping work on State Highway 16 is going ahead in Knox County on the unfinished strip between the Wichita River and a point six miles north of Benjamin. When the seal coat is laid on that section the entire length of State Highway 16 will be hard surfaced.
