The Child reportedly was complaining of an illness and feeling bad and the parents took him for a car ride to make him "feel better."

The parents were not following Texas law when they buried the child, without notifying the authorities, but Taylor county officials said they had no other recourse but to allow the man to recover the body from its gravesite.

A community blood drive will take place on Monday, July 24. The Meek Blood Center bloodmobile will be parked at the Baird Post Office from 8:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. Meek Blood center supplies blood to seventeen area hospitals.

"The need for blood is constant,: said Frances Baker, donor recruiter. "Hospital patients require medical care every day, regardless of holidays and summer vacations. One out of every ten hospital patients receive a blood

transfusion, and most of these patients require at least three pints of blood."

Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten Registration at Baird Elementary School

Baird Elementary School will hold a Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten registration for the 2006-2007 school year beginnining on Thursday, August 3, and ending on Friday, August 4th. The registration will be held at Baird I.S.D. Cafeterium from 8:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. each day.

Pre-Kindergarten:

The Baird I.S.D. Pre-Kindergarten program will operate on a half-day basis during the 2006-07 school year. Students will be enrolled in an A.M. group (7:45-11:30 A.M. or a P.M. group (10:45-2:30 PM.) All Pre-K students will be served lunch in the school cafeteria from 10:45-11:30 A.M. MORE INFORMA-TION ON THE HALF-DAY SCHEDULE WILL BE PROVIDED AT THE TIME OF REGISTRA-TION.

According to Texas State Law, a child is eligible for enrollment in Pre-Kindergarten if the child is 4 years of age as of September 1, 2006, and is 1) unable to speak and comprehend the English language; 2) educationally disadvantaged; 3) homeless; or 4) identified with special needs. In order to qualify for the program based upon #2, students must meet the criteria of financial need as determined by a formula provided by the state (which is based upon eligibility to participate in the national free or reduced lunch program),

During this registration, Baird ISD will be enrolling 4 year olds who meet the above criteria and live in the Baird School District. Also during this registration;, Baird I.S.D. will be taking applications for all other 4 year olds who live in the Baird School District. The Pre-Kindergarten program has limited spaces, so parents are urged to register their children as early as possible. Kindergarten:

To be eligible for enrollment in kindergarten, a child must be 5 years old as of

September 1, 2006. Kindergarten operates on a full day basis from 7:45 a.m. to 2:30

Completing Registration:

To complete registration, parents will need to bring copies of their child's birth certificate, shot records, social security card, proof of residence, and proof of in-

(Proof of income is required therefore parents mst bring either a statement from employers showing monthly wages or a paycheck stub.)

Any new students 1st-8th grade may register at this time also.

If you have any questions, concerning student registration, please contact James Wyatt, Elementary School Principal, at 854-1400, Ext. population below 10 individuals. Sheriff Curtis said that last year, the county jail averaged 8.1 inmates daily. Sheriff Curtis said if the county's jail population goes over 10 inmates, the Commission, going by records, can shut the county jail down. 
VFW Fundraiser To Be August 5

A Sleepless Nation 700 Million Strong

A new report by the National Academies' Institute of Medicine shows that between 50 and 70 million Americans struggle with chronic sleep problems and according to the United States Surgeon General, sleep deprivation and disorders cost the nation \$15 billion in health care expenses and \$50 billion in lost productivity each year.

A lack of sleep can take a toll both psychologically and physically, from daytime sleepiness to weakened immune systems. Long-term sleep deprivation leads to problems that can include memory lapses, depression, irritability and impaired work performance.

To win the battle over sleepless nights, many Americans are turning to medication. In 2005, 42 million prescriptions for sleeping pills were filled. An analysis by Medco Health Solutions, Inc. found that the number of adults ages 20 to 44 using sleeping medications rose 128 percent between 2000 and 2005, and was up 114 percent among 10 to 19 year olds in that same time period.

Insomnia is the most common sleep disorder, affecting between 30 and 40 percent of adults within a given year. Other sleep disorders include sleep apnea- a temporary suspension of breathing that occurs throughout the nightand restless leg syndrome, which is characterized by intense discomfort, mostly felt in the legs when at rest. One of the first steps to relieving sleep problems is to talk to your doctor or pharmacist about it.

Here are some tips for insomniacs:



Kinky gets to stay Kinky; Grandma must stay Carole By Ed Sterling

AUSTIN - Secretary of State Roger Williams on July 10 rendered a decision on how the names of the two independent candidates in the race for governor will appear on the November bal-

It'll be Richard "Kinky" Friedman and Carole Keeton Strayhorn.

Strayhorn said she would appeal the secretary of state's ruling, and filed suit in an Austin state district court. She wants to be Carole Keeton "Grandma" Strayhorn on the ballot.

Williams, Texas' chief elections officer, went into detail in explaining why "Grandma" won't be listed with Strayhorn's name, as she requested.

In a letter to Strayhorn's attorney, Roy Minton of Austin, Williams wrote:

"Your letter does not articulate any facts that would counter my interpretation that the use of 'Grandma,' in the context of Carole Keeton

Strayhorn's name appearing on the ballot, is a slogan and as such is prohibited by the Texas Election Code."

Williams said his office also took these factors into account:

 Strayhorn has never appeared on the ballot under the name "Grandma;"

• Strayhorn's declaration of intent lists her name as Carole Keeton Strayhorn;

 Strayhorn's petitions list her candidate name as Carole Keeton Strayhorn;

· The only reference to "Grandma" in communication with the Secretary of State's office appears on Strayhorn's campaign literature; and

 "Grandma" is not found on any of Strayhorn's official letterhead or communication with the Secretary of State.

Strayhorn said her office has distributed \$72 million to three cities, 158 counties and 131 hospital districts from the \$2.2 billion Tobacco Settlement Permanent Trust Account.

But she couldn't resist taking a potshot at the man she considers her main opponent in the race for governor: incumbent Gov. Rick Perry.

"These funds from the tobacco settlement provide a stict-in-the-arm for hospitals that are burdened with the responsibility of treating patients who cannot afford health care, including hurricane evacuees who have sought care at Texas hospitals and tens of thousands of children who have been

Thursday, July 20, 2006 dropped from the Children's Health Insurance Program under this governor's administration."

Since the first distribution of funds from the Tobacco Settlement Permanent Trust Account in April 2001, local entities have received nearly \$205 million from the fund.

State Rep. David Swinford, chair of the House State Affairs Committee, asked Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott for an opinion on the question.

The attorney general's office has up to 45 days to render a formal opinion on the questions.





Yep, the drawling couple, their voices elevated enough to be heard above other lungs" "leather intermission, are from Austin. Turns out we have dozens of friends in common.


