R. E. B. Baylor Judge Baylor was born in Bourbon County, Kentucky, in 1791, and died in Washington County, Texas, in 1873. He was buried, according to request, on the original campus of Baylor Universtiy,

at Old Independence.

Before coming to Texas in 1839, Judge Baylor had served in the Kentucky legislature and two terms in the national congress from Alabama. He served in the Texas Congress, in campaigns against Mexicans and Indians and in the constitutional convention that paved the way for Texas to

enter the American Union in 1846. When President Anson Jones solemnly proclaimed that the Re-public of Texas was no more. When tear-dimmed eyes watched the Lone Star Flag of Texas pulled down for the last time and sup-planted by the sacred folds of Old Glory, it was Judge Baylor that invoked divine blessings for the newest member of the Federal

After statehood he served as a district judge for 15 years and usually preached wherever he held court. He presided over the first ourt in the city of Waco and



### Explanations on 1938 Soil Conservation Program

Warning To Cotton Farmers
many farmers have failed to grasp the idea what it will mean if they overplant their cotton allotments this year. If a cotton farmer overplants his cotton allotments his cotton allotment, he will not be permitted to sell any cotton until the penalty is paid. The performance supervisors are now checking all farms, and when cotton allotments are overplanted, a card will be issued to that farmer denoting what has been done. If a farmer does not overplant his cotton, his records will be clear, and a different colored card will be issued to him.

Performance Supervisors There are six supervisors now in the field checking performances, and two more will be added before the week is gone. These supervisors are checking from 25 to 50 per day, depending, however, upon the size and kind of farms.


