



# **Facts About Foard County and Its Rich Natural Resources**

Although a small county compared to the larger counties of the state, the area of Foard County covers 631 square miles and has a variation of natural resources, including oil and gas, which puts it to the front as a leading West Texas County. The county was organized April 27, 1891. The territory required for the new county was secured by obtaining a strip

of land three miles wide from the east side of Cottle County and the portion of Knox County lying north of the Wichita River, also a strip south of the river, and a large part of Harde-man County situated south of Pease River. Crowell was named as the county seat on the day of the organization.

Wheat and cotton are the principal money crops of the county, although other farm crops are raised successfully. Wheat is planted in tight land sections of the county and the sandy land territory is planted in cotton. Grain sorghums and other row crops are planted on either the tight land or sandy land.

Ranching and stock farming is an important industry in this county. In addition to several large ranches, cattle and sheep are raised successfully by farmers on a smaller scale. Leasing land for oil and gas purposes had for many years before oil was discovered been a revenue producer for land concernent of this county. The first oil wall was brought in 11 owners of this county. The first oil well was brought in 11 miles northeast of Crowell on Thursday, June 6, 1929, at a depth of about 2,000 feet. Natural gas was also found in this field, which is today supplying Thalia and Crowell. On Thursday, July 20, The Texas Co. opened an oil field in the west part of the county when the Texas Co. J. K. John

in the west part of the county when the Texas Co.-L. K. John-son No. 3 blew in as a good producer from a depth of 3,563 feet, accompanied by an estimated gas flow of 3,500,000 cubic feet. Other gas sands were encountered in this well and in January, 1934, a gas processing plant was constructed by The Texas Co. at a cost of \$150,000. The gasoline processed from the natural gas is conveyed to a loading rack on the Santa Fe at Foard City in a pipe line. When the gas is stripped of the gasoline content it is boosted through a pipe line to the power plant of the West Texas Utilities Co. at Lake Pauline near Qua-bab and used for fuel Margine reactions have been wede nah and used for fuel. Many improvements have been made on the plant since it was constructed. This field now has two flowing producers, six producers on pump, and five wells pro-ducing natural gas, with only three dry holes in the field. Well No. 17 is now being drilled.

# **COURT PASSES** PETITION AT MEET MONDAY

#### To Match WPA Funds For Construction of Hospital


A \$12,500.00 bond election for Saturday, October 29, was order-ed by the Commissioners' Court ed by the Commissioners Court at a regular meeting Monday, Sept. 26. for the purpose of rais-ing Foard County's share of a \$30,000.00 WPA project calling for the construction of a new and medone hospital in Crawell modern hospital in Crowell.

At the meeting last Monday, **a** petition, carrying the names of 211 resident property tax pay-ers, was presented and passed by This the Commissioners' Court. This number of signatures was more than the statutes required.

The election was called for the purpose of giving qualified voters of the county an opportunity to vote on the question of issuing \$12,500.00 worth of bonds to build and equip a county hospital. If the bond election results in favor of issuing this amount of bonds the hospital building will be constructed under a WPA pro-gram with the Government furnishing \$22,000, or about 70 per cent of the total cost of \$30,000. Bond money to the amount of \$8,000 will be used in the erec-tion of the building and the balance would be used to buy modern equipment and to supply proper lighting and heat for the build-ing. W. P. A. money can not be used for these purposes.

It is the plan of the Commis-sioners' Court to build a two-story hospital on the same location the present hospital and the building will be constructed of native rock. It will be modern and complete in every respect and will furnish hospitalization for a maximum of fifteen patients. it believed that this size hospital will meet all the needs of Foard County and the proposed bond issue would raise the county tax rate only 4 cents on the \$100 valuation. It is estimated that this project would furnish employment for about 80 men for approximately eight months. Plans for the county hospital have been drawn by Joe Ben Roberts, architectural student in the University of Texas in Austin, and have been submitted to the WPA office in San Antonio for approval
