ROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION, PRO-VIDING FOR AND RELATING TO THE CREATION OF CONSER-VATION DISTRICTS.


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Senate Joint Resolution No. 12. amend Article 16 of the adding thereto at the end thereof at other section to be known as Section 59, declaring the conservation and preservation of all the natural re-sources of the State of Texas are public rights and duties; providing for the creation of conservation dis-tricts, declaring such districts bodies politic and corporate, defining the authority of such districts, and conferring upon the Legislature authority t pass laws with reference thereto; de claring that the Legislature shall hav authority generally to legislate for the purpose of conserving the natural re-sources of the State; fixing the time for the election for the adoption o rejection od said proposed constitu-tional amendment; making certain provisions for said election and the ballots thereof and the methods thereof ; directing the issuance of the proc-lamation therefor, prescribing certain duties of the Governor of the State and making an appropriation to defray the expenses of said election. Be it resolved by the Legislature of

the State of Texas: Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto at the en hereof another section to be known Section 59, and which shall read as fol

Section 59a. 



#### John Smith and Pocahontas.



#### Lofty Himalaya.


Himalaya, in south central Asia, is the most elevated and stupendous mountain system on the globe. It is not, as sometimes represented, a single chain, but a system, consisting of several parallel and converging ranges, with a vast number of rugged, snowy peaks, separated by great elevated valleys and plateaus. On the north the system descends to the elevated plateau of Tibet, on the south to the depression drained by the Ganges and the Indus.
