Austin, Tex.—Gov. Price Daniel's money raising proposals indicate that many of next year's tax battles will be fought on familiar terrain.

Basic program submitted by the governor to the State Finance Advisory Commission is the same as the one he submitted in 1959. Even the total goal is nearly the same.

In 1959 the Legislature passed a bill aimed at raising \$185,000,000 in new money. Governor Daniel estimates 1961 new-money needs at \$193,000,000. This is to cover an expected deficit of about \$68,800,000 and increased annual spending of about \$62,527,000.

To raise this money, the governor suggests revising the corporation franchise tax formula and increasing the liquor tax, gross receipts tax on utilities and the auto sales tax. He also suggests passing the abandoned-property act (allowing the state to take over unclaimed bank accounts, property, etc.), and putting a tax on beer and cigarettes sold on military bases.

Governor Daniel also told the Commission of four other tax ideas which he said had been suggested by others.

These include:

1. A 19 per cent increase on all items in the Omnibus Tax Bill except cigarettes, tobacco and franchises.
2. A 1-cent-a-gallon increase in the gasoline tax.
3. A tax of 1 cent per thousand cubic feet on the processing of natural gas.
4. A 3 per cent tax on gross receipts of gas pipeline companies.

Governor Daniel said he knew his proposal would be criticized as "riding the same old horses." But he said the affected tax sources would not be taxed any heavier than those in neighboring and competing states.

No Fishing Licenses Brings on 176 Arrests

Too many fishermen still think they can get by without a license, according to the director of law enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission. Last month 176 persons paid fines for failure to buy their \$2.15 fishing license. This license is required for all persons who fish with rod and reel, except those under 17 and over 65. Persons fishing outside their home counties also need a license.
 In all, there were 272 violations in May, with a total of \$5,197.74 collected in fines and costs.
 A number of arrests also were made for killing game out of season. Several were caught shooting doves, quail, ducks and deer. Two others were caught "telephoning" for fish, which is the illegal use of an electrical device for shocking fish.
 Current fishing licenses will be valid until September 1, when a new license will be required. The 1960-1961 hunting license has been revised and the new licenses will be placed on sale September 1. The new license has been devised to provide a better record of sales and to facilitate handling of the licenses by license deputies.

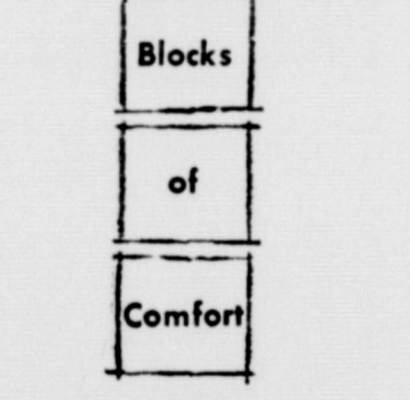

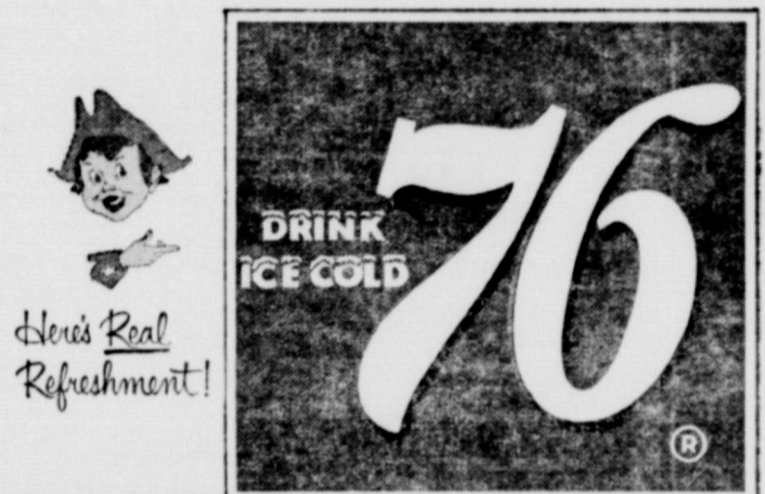

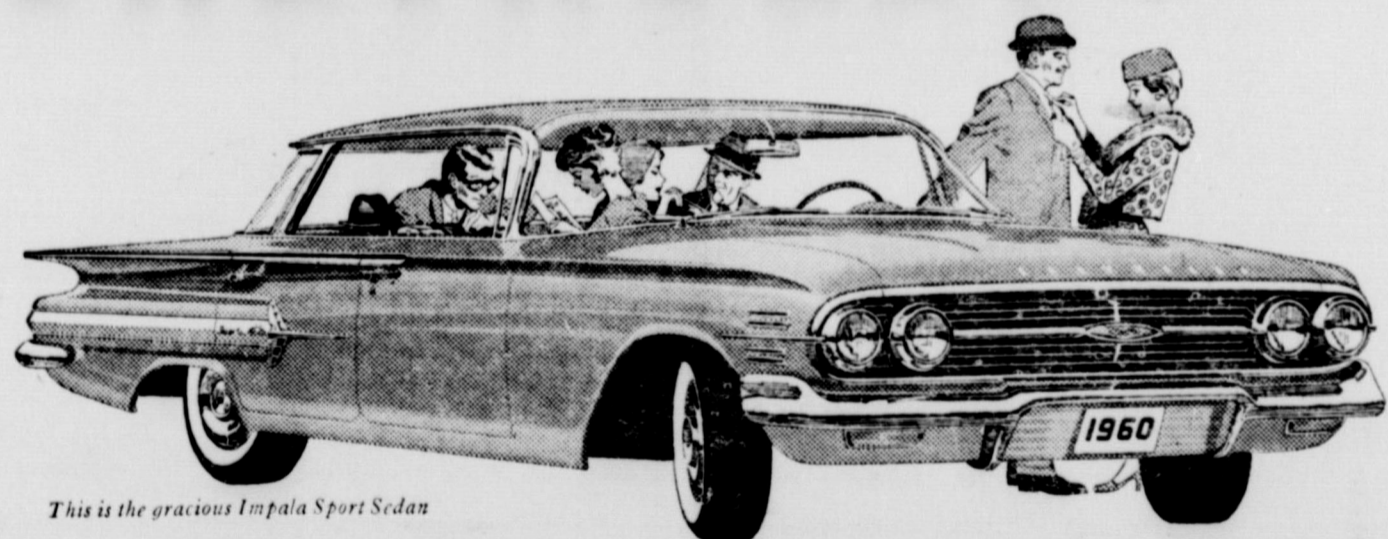

Spear Fishing Fun Described in Magazine

Spear fishing combines the skills of many sports into one. This is the approach of an article on spear fishermen by John E. Tilton, aquatic biologist of the Game and Fish Commission, in the June issue of Texas Game and Fish magazine.

Tilton points out that to be a successful spear fisherman, a man must be a strong swimmer, a good stalker, and have the patience of an angler.

"As the number of diving enthusiasts increases, and they hunt in waters once fished exclusively by hook and line fishermen, certain frictions and irritations are bound to result," he says.

"Although the problem is not serious in Texas, it is in some other states. However, local flare-ups have occurred in isolated places, particularly where very clear waters invite skin diving activities."

The new state law permitting spear fishing limits the take to rough fish, including buffalo, carp, Rio Grande perch and gar. Spear fishermen are warned not to take game fish under penalty.

"Fortunately, most spear fishermen in Texas today are organized into active clubs whose leaders recognize the perils to their sport involved in law violation," he says. "In some areas spear fishing has been outlawed or severely curtailed because of alleged blatant disregard of fish harvest laws and conservation principles."

If you are good at mathematics, know something about farming, and like an argument, there is a free-for-all just starting that you might like to get into.

For the past 10 years it has been rather generally assumed that we have a "farm problem" in this country, although not everyone has agreed on just what the problem is. Congress has debated it endlessly without agreeing on a solution.

Now mathematicians and statisticians have begun a hot argument over whether there really is any "farm problem." They are using figures, charts, equations and mathematical formulas to support their arguments.

Personally, this is one argument we intend to steer clear of and report impartially, figure by figure, strictly as a spectator. To bring you up-to-date, here is what happened so far in the battle of the mathematicians.

A Matter of Money
The question is: Are farmers getting a fair share of the national income?

"No," say U. S. Department of Agriculture statisticians, economists and mathematicians.

"Yes," say statistical experts who have supplied the Farm Journal with figures showing farmers have 50 per cent more income than the average American family.

The Farm Journal is an old and highly respected farm magazine and so it surprised a lot of folks when it bought a full page advertisement in the equally reputable Wall Street Journal to tell businessmen what its mathematicians had learned about farmers.

Farmers last year, the Journal reported, had a gross income of more than \$46 billion. That, if equally divided, would give each farm family an income of \$9,978,

compared with the U. S. average of only \$6,470. Per capita farm income, it said, in 1950 was the highest on record.

The average farm family, the statisticians figured, owns equipment, buildings, and savings worth \$43,724. How many town families, asks the Journal, are worth that much?

USDA Rebuttal

It is grossly misleading, the USDA says, to compare farmers' gross income with non-farmers' take-home pay. A fair comparison, it argues, would be between farmers' net income, after payment of operating expenses, with city workers' pay envelope.

The average farm worker, according to USDA figures, last year had a net income of \$1,672, including allowances for housing and food grown and consumed on the farm, about one-third less than the national average.

Approximately 5,000,000 farm families last year realized a net income, including the sale of their products plus government payments, of only about \$8 billion, USDA figures show, with which to pay family living expenses. The money farmers have to spend will buy less at the store than at any time since prior to World War II, the Department reports, while non-farm families can buy 50 per cent more than in 1940.

Ten years ago farmers spent 50 cents out of each dollar received for production expenses. Last year they paid 70 cents and kept 30 cents. While consumers pay 10 per cent more for most food items than in 1950, prices paid farmers have gone down an average of 20 per cent.

There are the figures, so if you want to get into the argument, you can choose your own weapons.
