CASPER, WYO., AND VICINITY In 1907, Casper was a city of 25,000 with a great building boom, the center of the great sheep industry extending for miles in every direction. On the road we saw several 14 to 16horse teams with 4 or 5 wagons coupled together hauling supplies, one man only to each outfit. We were told while in Cheyenne last year that the city of Casper is now the center of a great oil industry.

The coal of this region was formed during the great carboniferous age which covered something like a million years of Paleozoic time, prior to and during a part of the great disturbance known as the "Appalachian Revolution." This was a disturbance so vast as to work a wonderful change in the physical geography of the western continent and particularly in the western part of the United States. There was mashing, folding and lifting until plains grew into mountain ranges, sea bottoms rose into plains, land sank and became for a time sea bottoms. What is now termed the Permian period is the partly restored missing link in the untold ages of the world's growth and during this time there were periodic glaciations. Wyoming is a rich field for the study of geology and palaeontology.

After leaving Casper we traveled through a country where most of the people lived in sheep wagons. One man said that for 16 years he never slept in a house. His children were all born in a sheep wagon and never saw the inside of a house for years. His family would compare favorably with the average in the sand belt in the eastern part of Foard county. The family was at the time we saw them living in a tent half a mile from Casper, children going to school in town. This man was not in love with the climate of Wyoming, said that a 4inch snow in January would sometimes give them a snow every day for two months. HOW INDIANS CATCH SALMON

Equipment Consisting of "Grab-Hooks" and Long Poles Is Crude But Very Effective.

The Indians fish for salmon with "grabhook," a large iron hook fastened to a pole by a loose cord three or four feet long. A hole at the blunt end of the hook that slips over the tip of the pole keeps it in place until the fish is hooked. Then the hook is pulled off the pole and the cord gives the fisherman a chance to play his fish is necessary before dragging it ashore. The hooks are made by the blacksmith, but the poles, about twenty feet in length, the Indians make themselves of red fir, the

Southern Workman says. Taking a rough piece of dry wood of the required length, they patiently work at it with drawshave and knife until it is the right size and tapered to suit the workman. Then it is usually hardened in the coals before putting on the cord, which they braid themselves. If a pole breaks, as often happens, the broken parts are lashed together with string, pitch is smeared over and melted by being rubbed with a hot stone, which makes the pole as strong as before. The Indians generally fish from the bank or from platforms built over the water. They thrust the long pole out across the river as far as they can and let the current carry it down and into the bank, trusting to chance and a quick jerk to hook the fish if they feel one in the water.



SEEK CURE OF ELECTROLYSIS

Government Experts Aid in Installing System to Prevent Damage to Metal Structures.

The damage done annually to underground pipes, cables and other metal structures in this country by electrolysis amounts to many millions of dollars. There are very few water, gas or lead cable systems that are not more or less subject at some points to electrolytic damage from stray currents. Moreover, the loss does not consist merely in the shortening of the life of such structures; electrolytic damage is one of the causes of the leakage of water and gas from distribution systems. The failure of such systems on account of electrolytic action may also involve various dangers to the life and health of human beings. According to the bureau of standards more than 25 separate and distinct nethods of dealing with the electrolysis problem have been proposed and experimented with from time to time. Some of these methods are useless, or even harmful. The bureau of standards has been studying the subject of electrolysis mitigation for the last six ties. The bureau makes somewhat of experiments has recently been unertaken in the city of Springfield, Mass., with the so-called three wire ystem of electric railway operation; system which offers considerable romise for the mitigation of electrolyis troubles under certain conditions frequently met with in cities.

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
