ng printed on them: "For the water contract." "Against the water contract.'

Briefly, the proposal is to build 900,000-acre foot reservoir near Hedley at a cost to the member cities of some \$7.2 million. The program will be financed entirely by water revenues and money from other sources such as recreational facilities. No taxes will be levied by the Authority or by the city to pay for the water. It is estimated to take from two

to three years for completion.

In addition to the ballot stating "For the Water Contract" and "Against the Water Contract," voters will also mark a ballot in the annexation election. This ballot will state "For annexation to Green Belt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority" and "Against annexation to Green Belt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority."

Although the Authority has accepted Crowell as a member and Crowell's membership in the Authority has also been approved by the State Water Commission, it is still necessary for the people of Crowell to vote to see if a majority wish to join the Auth-

ere Are We Going for Water?

Where are we going to go for water if and when the wells supplying the City fail? Is there a stream in Foard County at we could dam up for a water supply? Is there another unground water supply in this area where the City could drill ore wells? These are questions that will have to be answered e time by the residents of Crowell.

In February and March of 1962-long before the City neil was ever informed of the Green Belt Authority-the engaged the engineering firm of Homer A. Hunter Assotes of Dallas to make a careful study of the water system Crowell. That report was made public by Mayor Henry Black was published in the News in the August 15, 1963, issue. A portion of that report says: "We find the lack of an ant water supply to be the most critical water problem ng the City at the present time.

"As a result of the study made by the Texas State Board Water Engineers in 1940 and 1941, it was estimated at that he that the area north of Margaret would have a safe yield approximately 51,000,000 gallons per year. In 1961, the City mped 72,000,000 gallons from the area. This amount alone out 40 per cent greater than the estimated safe yield. In dition to the water pumped by the City, the land owners and fration farmers have pumped an unknown quantity. In the years that the City has obtained its water from these wells, static water level has been lowered approximately 10 feet. d all available information indicates that the water level will tinue to decline until the area is practically dewatered.

"At the present time the City has no choice but to attempt satisfy its water requirements from the well field. However aps should be taken immediately to instigate studies and instigations as to how, when and where the City may obtain an ional water supply in the near future. An additional source supply could involve considerable expense to the City, and problem should have very careful and thorough study."

This engineering firm was hired by the City to tell them truth about the City's water supply, and the truth is not ^{ways} pleasant to hear. Nevertheless, residents of Crowell must the fact that additional water supply will have to be tained in the not-too-distant future.

Open House to Be Held Oct. 18 at **Abilene State School**

The Abilent State School will be open to the general public on October 18. The school, one of six such special schools operated under the authority of the State of Texas, provides care and training for over 2,000 mentally retarded persons. Some 23 children from this area of Texas reside at the school.

Forty-two dormitories are staffed by 263 houseparents working on three 8-hour shifts each day. The new hospital will be open for inspection, as well as the seven new air-conditioned dormitories now under construction. Guided tours will be available.
