4-H GOLD STAR AWARD WINNERS NAMED FOR '61

Gena Adeock and Bobby Magee have been named as winners of the 1961 Four-H Gold Star award for Foard County, the Extension Agents, Mrs. Carroll and Joe Burkett, announced Monday.

These awards are given each year by the Texas A&M College Extension Service to the outstanding 4-H Club boy and girl in each county.

Bobby and Gena will be honored at the award banquet to be held at the Wilbarger memorial auditorium December 2.

Gena, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Adeock, is 17 years old and has been in 4-H Club work seven years. She has carried demonstration in canning, clothing, frozen foods, home improvement, bedroom improvement, and safety.

Bobby has won the following awards for outstanding 4-H work: dress, dress revue and home improvement.

improvement. She has been delegate to the district camp, president and secretary to her 4-H club, delegate to the district council and a member of the county council.

In 1959 Gena won an all-expense-paid trip to the Texas 4-H Junior Leadership Lab at Bastrop. She was county and district dress revue winner in 1961 and won a trip to the State Fair to represent this district in the State Dress Revue.

Bobby is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Bond, is 15 years old, and has been in 4-H Club work six years. He has carried demonstrations in safety, sheep production, field crops, leadership, and beef cattle production. He has won county medals in achievement, dairy judging, agriculture, and meat animal production.

Bobby has held most of the 4-H Club offices during his six years in 4-H Club work. He is now serving as a member of the Foard County Health and Safety Committee, and has been a member of the district-winning land judging team and was a member of the 1961 poultry team which won district.

Both Gena and Bobby are members of the Foard County Junior Leaders 4-H Club and have been very active in helping younger members, and have served on many committees involving community activities.

Two Accidents Occur in County During Week End

Sheriff P. W. Taylor and Deputy Duane Cates reported Monday that two accidents had occurred in Foard County over the week end.

The first occurred early Saturday night at the intersection of US 70 and A Street, when a 1957 Chevrolet driven by John Reynolds of Crowell was in collision with a 1956 Pontiac driven by an Antlers, Okla., man.

No serious injuries were believed to have been suffered by the occupants of the cars involved.

The intersection of the farm-to-market road and US 70 in Thalia was the scene of the other accident which occurred Sunday night about 7:30 when a 1956 Pontiac driven by Sam Tole collided with a '59 Ford driven by a Mr. Maahs of Plainview. Mrs. Tole remained in the hospital overnight for observation and the others were treated at the local hospital. There were 4 other passengers in the Maahs vehicle.

The Crowell High School football team battled the mighty Albany Lions, defending State class A champions, to a 6-0 draw for nearly three quarters last Friday night at Stamford in a regional play-off game, before all-state fullback Johnny Agan blasted through Crowell's strong line to scamper 57 yards for a touchdown. This is the first time Albany had been held scoreless during the first half of any game they have played this season.

The heavier Lions scored two more counters in the last quarter to make the final count 21 to 0. Tackle Johnny Woodward intercepted a pass on Crowell's 30-yard line to set up the second touchdown. Quarterback Roy Hogan ran this one over about the middle of the fourth quarter. The last score came just 30 seconds before the end of the game. This one, too, came after an intercepted pass about the middle of the field. Hogan passed to all-state end Rocky Hill for the TD. The pass and run was good for 52 yards. Hill kicked all three of the extra points.

This was Albany's 26th consecutive victory and was perhaps the Lions' greatest obstacle toward another State championship. The lighter Crowell boys amazed the 5,000 spectators for three quarters when they played on even terms with the team that won the State championship last year and had easily pushed aside all opposition this season, including four strong 2A teams.

The following thirteen boys represented Crowell in this important contest: Junior Hopkins, Gerald Howard and Jon Lee Black, ends; Danny Rader and James Borchardt, tackles; Dale Henry and Paul Bax Ekern, guards; Jerry Setliff, center; Ronnie Bradford, Jim Mac Gafford, Dale Doyal, John Stone and Larry Henry, backs; Bob Borchardt was unable to play due to an injury. Eight of these boys are seniors and were playing their last game for Crowell High; Howard, Rader, Borchardt, Dale Henry, Setliff, Bradford, Gafford and Stone. Albany's outstanding boys were the three who made the all-state team last year: fullback Johnny Agan, right end Rocky Hill, and left guard Bill Stapp.

These boys who have played four years can boast a record of 41 victories and 6 losses, as well as four bi-district championships. In 1959 the Wildcats went to the semi-finals.

Win-loss record of the Cats for the past four years includes 10 wins and 2 losses in 1958; 13 wins and 1 loss in 1959; 11 wins and 1 loss in 1960, and 10 wins and 2 losses in 1961.

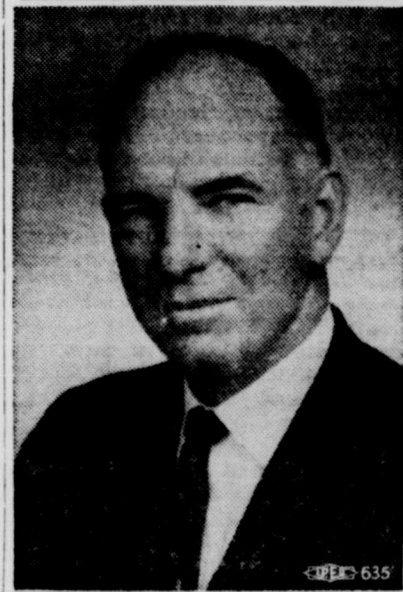

Judge Purcell Issues Statement in Regard To Race for Congress

Judge Graham B. Purcell of the 89th District Court at Wichita Falls has formally announced his candidacy as Democratic representative for the 13th Congressional District of Texas.

Running as "a Democrat without prefix, without suffix and without apology," Judge Purcell outlined a program based on "integrity in public office, protection and strengthening of the rights of small independent business men, a realistic farm program, strengthening of national defense and preservation of world peace, preservation of the independent oil producer and the domestic oil industry, and the promotion of such legislation as will best serve our freedom, our economy and our form of government."

Purcell, a district judge for the past six years, paid tribute to outgoing Rep. Frank Icard and said that he'd feel it a privilege to serve with the Democratic administration in Washington.

Purcell, whose first experience in community service was as a 4-H youngster in vocational ag work, now has a distinguished record of civic, religious and youth service in his community. Logically, he stressed moral values in his announcement.

"Integrity in public office and strengthening the moral fiber of our entire citizenship is, in my opinion, an important duty of our national leaders. I will strive to carry out the duties of this office with this obligation in mind."

Purcell, a five-year combat and overseas veteran of World War II, has had education, training and experience which uniquely qualifies him for federal legislative office. He holds a bachelor of science degree in agriculture from Texas A&M College (1946) and a law degree from Baylor University (1949).

In addition to serving as a district judge, he is also judge of

the Juvenile Court of Wichita County, he's a deacon of the Memorial Presbyterian Church, District Chairman of the Scouts. He is married to the former Betty Smith of Tucson, Ar. and has four children, three boys and a girl.

Purcell, born 42 years ago, a stock farm in Archer County, been singled out for more honor than any other member of legal profession in recent years in North Texas. An untiring worker, he has held membership chairmanships and top executive positions in dozens of the most important community activities in the area.

He has concentrated on youth work, such as Boy Scouts, YMC Boys Clubs, Child Welfare health projects which principally benefit children.

In 1960, Judge Purcell was one of the recipients of the Altr Club Awards for outstanding citizenship and in 1958 received Civitan Club's annual award "outstanding citizenship."

Judge Purcell decided to for Congress on the repeated insistence of North Texas Democrats that he is the only Democrat in the field big enough to run without a run-off.

Enjoy your company by planning ahead. Plan the meals, do the marketing and as much of the preparation as possible so that only last minute preparation is necessary. Freezer meals are excellent for such occasions. Make plans for when to take food from the freezer. Plan foods which will require the same heating or cooking time and the same temperature. Using the same dish for freezing, cooking and serving will save both time and energy.

Whether your child eats in the cafeteria or carries a packed lunch, you need to know what he is eating, and then plan his other two meals around his lunch to form a well balanced menu. Three well balanced meals a day are necessary for his growth and development, and for good work at school.

A good lunch or supper includes some protein food — meat, poultry, fish or eggs. It also includes vegetables, fruits and bread. And, of course, a full half-pint of milk.

An adequate breakfast and a well-planned evening meal, in addition to a good lunch, should add up to three balanced meals daily for the school child, or any family member.
