

Likely That a New Treaty Will Scon Be Made. City of Mexico, Peb. 8.—It is highly probable that the treaty of 1845 be-tween the United States and Mexico, fixing the boundary line along the Rio Grande, will be abrogated and another one signed and ratified, as a result of the negotiations which are now in progress.

The question at issue is not to make the Rio Grande navigable to a greater extent than is enjoyed at present, but to destroy its present navigability in the interest of agriculture and the de-velopment of the adjacent lands on ei-ther side of the stream. The treaty of 1848 establishing the Rio Grande as the dividing line between a por-tion of the frontiers between the two countries stipulated that neither coun-try should for any purpose divert the channel of the stream or take from it a sufficient amount of water to render it unnavigable to a certain distance from the mouth.

t unavigable to a certain distance from the month. It was believed at that time that the navigability of the river would be of prime importance to the commerce and interests of the frontier. Times, however, have changed in the last site ty years, and the great advancement of the frontier States and the develop-ment of lands have been so import and that the advigability of the stream has become a secondary consideration and is giving way to the growing de mands of agriculture and cultivation of arid lands.
