SELLS \$138 WORTH OF TURKEYS Mrs. L. D. Harris came to the News office Saturday and said she wanted to spend \$1.50 of her turkey money for a subscription to the News to go to her brother, B. F. Rasberry, of Alabama. Asked about her success in the raising of turkeys she said, "I have sold \$138 worth of turkeys this season and raised them all from three hens and one gobbler."

When one makes a few figures on a proposition of that kind it looks like pretty good business, and we leave it up to you to decide for yourself if it is not. Let's look at it.

Figuring that the turkeys contributed equally in producing a revenue of \$138, it would allow each a credit of exactly \$34.50. Again figuring that each turkey is worth about \$4.00 it gives a gross revenue of more than 00 per cent on the investment.

"Too much trouble to raise turkeys," says somebody. That is just why lots of us do not make more than we do. We had rather sit down and do nothing because it is too much trouble to do anything.

But 800 per cent is not bad pay for the trouble of raising turkeys. What will beat it?

SENATE BODY ACTS FOR RE-STRICTION OF IMMIGRATION Washington, Dec. 10.—The Senate Foreign Relations Committee today laid down a policy of restricted im-migration which Congress is expected indorse soon. The committee reported favorably a resolution, sponsored by Senator Lodge, Republican, of Massachusetts,

FECTIVE LAST MONDAY Announcement of a blanket limited embargo on all classes of shipments except perishable foodstuffs was made yesterday by R. S. Hampshire, superintendent of the American Rail-way Express Company here. The order is effective this morning and limits to 100 pounds the shipment that may be made by any one firm or individual in one day with the single exception of perishable food commodities which will be accepted without restrictions.

The embargo was necessitated, Mr. Hampshire said, by the unprecedented volume of express, coupled with the reduction of train service throughout the country as a result of the coal shortage. The desire for speed of shipments throughout the last several months, he said, has converted the express company into a fast freight company with shipments of every description offered daily from and to all points of the country .--

HANSEN SAYS HE WENT BAIL FOR JENKINS TO PREVENT WAR Mexico City, Sunday, Dec. 7 .- J. Salter Hansen, who furnished the bail upon which W. O. Jenkins, the American Consular Agent at Puebla, was released, declared tonight that he had acted on his own initiative. He issued this tsatement:

"I wish to say the following: On Tuesday morning last, on account of certain facts that came to my attention, which I am in no position to disclose, I suddenly realized that war between the United States and Mexico was inevitable unless one of the two Governments was ready to sacrifice its honor, prestige and dignity by receding from the dangerous po-

sition into which it was forced. "I, therefore, took all the steps necessary to effect the immediate re-lease on bail of W. O. Jenkins and relieve the tension. I did so spontaneously, and on my own initiative, and him. He always makes plenty of I am ready and willing to take upon feed. He said he had just finished myself the full responsibility or cred-

Announcement comes from State headquarters of the Seventy-Five Million Campaign that \$80,000,000 has been subscribed with several states to hear from. Owing to continued bad weather in Texas, the campaign in this State has been extended two weeks.

to volunteer for work in the mines. Within an hour from the time of the issuance of the proclamation 200 stu-dents of the State University offered their services, and it is predicted that, within a day or two, there will be available a volunteer force of 2,000 or more.

This plan seems to be an excellent one not only as a means of affording immediate relief for the coal shortage, but also because it seems likely to have a more powerful effect in getting the miners back to work than any other plan which has been pro-posed; for when the miners realize that large forces of non-union men are learning how to operate the mines and are thus becoming available for use at any time for such purpose, there will probably be a strong disposition on their part to get back into the mines and thus avoid the chance of being supplanted in their work by others. Indeed, the idea may contain the

nucleus of an effective plan for dealing with the entire strike menace, for if there were in connection with each of our essential industries and municipal activities forces of trained men and women who would be able at once to take the place of workers in case of strike, it seems probable that strikes would be much less frequent than they now are. Thus, if Massa-chusetts had had a force of trained police reserves at the time of the Bos\_ ton police strike, there would proba-bly have been no strike; and if there were in each State reserve forces of trained firemen, coal miners, steel and iron workers, railroad operatives, etc., to take the place in public utilities and other essential industries of strikers, it may be that we would soon find that there was very much less disposition on the part of work-ers to strike. Moreover the additional forces of trained employees would be available, in case of war or other emergency, to augment production or to take the place of persons needed as soldiers or for other purposes.

#### Helium Gas Cheapened.


Up to 1915 the total output of helium gas in all the world had probably been less than 100 cubic feet, and it was worth about \$1,700 a cubic foot. But just before the armistice was signed a shipment of 150,000 cubic feet of helium gas was sent to Europe, and it costs less than 10 cents a cubic foot

Helium gas was first discovered on the sun, by spectroscopy. It is the best gas for use in balloons, because it is not inflammable. It is now extracted from the natural gas of Texas and Kansas.

The method is delicate and complex, but is based upon the fact that the principal constituents of natural gas liquefy when cooled to about minus 329 degrees F., but that helium remains a gas at that temperature, and hence is easily separated.







National Tuberculosis Association, Which Sponsors Sale, Will Place 650,000,000 Seals on Sale to Finance the Fight Against Tuberculosis.



The Red Cross Seal-as millions of Americans know it to day, is an agent of happiness and health. It was originated in 1907 by Miss Emily P. Bissell, of Wilmington, Delaware, who learned through Jacob Rils of somewhat similar seals that were sold in Norway for the purpose of raising funds with which to fight tuberculosis.

Miss Bissell persuaded the American Red Cross to take up the idea with the result that seals were sold in a limited number of communities in 1908. The sale yielded a revenue of approximately \$3,000. The Red Cross then decided to issue the seals each year and to turn the proceeds over to the National Tuberculosis association and its affiliated societies for the purpose of financing the campaign against tuberculosis. The number of seals sold in America increased by leaps and bounds until in 1917 the total reached 180,000,000.

This year the seals are again on sale beginning December 1. More than half a billion seals have been printed for distribution to state and local agents. In addition to the seals "Health Bonds" in denominations ranging from \$5.00 to \$100.00 are to be sold in lieu of seals to large contributors, who do not send out a sufficient quantity of mail in December to make use of all the seals they would like to purchase. WORKERS NEEDED TO

FIGHT WHITE PLAGUE National Tuberculosis Association, Which Sponsors Red Cross Seal Sale, is Conducting Intensive Educational Campaign.

A call for volunteers to fight under the standard of the National Tuberculosis Association and its 1000 affiliated bodies throughout the country against tuberculosis-humanity's most vicious foe-has been sounded.

A recent health survey, made by the experts of the National Tuberculosis Association, brought to light some startling statistics with regard to the prevelency of the disease. The findings of this survey have revealed a national menace, which must be eradicated. The figures show that each year 150,000 persons die of the disease and that there are approximately 2,000,000 cases of tuberculosis in the United States today.

## **DOUBLE BARRED CROSS** ADOPTED 17 YEARS AGO

The double barred Red Cross is seventeen years old this month. In October, 1902, the International Anti Tuberculosis Association, then meeting in Berlin, adopted the cross as the emblem of the world-wide fight against tuberculosis. It was proposed by Dr. G. Sersiron, of Paris. It is a com bination of the Croix de Lorraine and the cross of the Greek Catholic church. Both crosses are symbolic



## ALL TO BE HONORED ALIKE

No Distinction in Headstones Over British Officers and Mon Who Died in the War.


Speaking of the resolutions adopted by the imperial war graves commission, a writer in the London Times says: "From the first it was laid down by the commission that no distinction should be made in the form or character of memorial to officers and men lying in the same cemetery. It was felt that what was done for one should be done for all, and that all, whatever their military rank or position in civil life, should have equal treatment so far as their graves were concerned. Were the erection of monuments left to individual initiative, probably those of the well-to-do would overshadow those of their poorer comrades, to the loss of the whole sense of common sacrifice and service. The place for the individual monument, it was thought, should be at home. Therefore the creation of individual headstones of a single uniform pattern has been decided upon. These headstones will bear the badge of the regiment or unit to which the soldier belonged, together with the name, rank, regiment, and date of death. They should be easy of identification, and will perpetuate the present effect produced by the wooden crosses. As a central monument in each cemetery a cross and memorial stone are to be set up, simple but impressive in character. An inscription for the stone has been selected by Rudyard Kipling."

## OLD-TIME TOOTH POWDER AD

Printed in Scottish Newspaper in 1660, in All Probability It Was the First.

One of those individuals who has leisure enough to dig into the records of days long past, has unearthed what is said to be the first advertisement ever published of a preparation for cleansing and preserving the teeth. It appeared 258 years ago, and, though the language is a bit involved, the writer needed no lessons from modern publicity experts in claiming virtues for his product. The ad was printed in the Mercurius Politicus of Leith, Scotland, in 1660, and reads:

" 'Most Excellent and Approved Dentifrices to scour and cleanse the Teeth, making them white as Ivory ; preserves from Toothache; so that being constantly used, the parties using it are never troubled with the Toothache: it fastens the Teeth, sweetens the Breath and preserves the Mouth and Gums from Canker and Imposthumes.
