FOR UNIFORMITY

One of the things to be submitted at the extra session of the legislature soon to be called is the enactment of a uniform textbook law. In this we are all very much interested.

We believe in such a law if it serves to prevent frequent changes and thereby reduce the cost of books. These were the arguments advanced to support the first uniform textbook law and which went into effect in September 1896; but the saving in the cost of books has been more than offset by the frequent changes in the adopted books.

In 1908 the total sales of textbooks in Texas were \$463,939.00; in 1909, the year after adoption, these sales were \$879,898.00, an increase of \$415,959.00, due to the changes in the uniform series. From 1910 to 1913, inclusive, the average annual cost of textbooks was \$618,977.50; but in 1914, the year after another adoption, the sales totaled \$1,272,401.00, or almost double the average annual cost under the 1908 adoption, due again to the number of changes in the uniform series. The sales of books in 1915 amounted to \$781,-711.00. 
