### Feeding and Care of Baby Chicks

(By F. W. Kazmeier, Bryan, Texas)

Daily Routine

Early in the morning, about six clock, examine the heater, replensh fuel supply and make sure the hicks are comfortable. Raise the over, remove all litter, dirt and droppings and replace with fresh material. Note the chicks closely, kill weaklings or sick ones. Examine the feed hoppers and be sure they contain a supply of feed. The feed hopers should never be allowed to go ry for even a few minutes. If the hicks crowd around the feed hoppers, provide more hoppers. Keep oppers clean. At eight, examine all water dishes, clean all drinking vesels and refill with fresh water. If ou are feeding milk provide a new upply of milk in clean containers at his time. If possible keep sour milk buttermilk before the chicks all he time. 


