The concrete head-house of the present plant is being torn away to make room for a larger one. old head house, which formed the highest part of the present plant, was 8 ft. wide, 14 ft. long and over 20 ft. Conservation Corps high. The new head house will have greater width and length and will be 41 feet high, making the elevator 86 feet at its highest point, since the part of the elevator upon which the

head house is built is 45 feet high. The old concrete engine room has also been torn away and a larger room will replace it in order to house a new natural gas engine which will furnish power for both the elevator and mill. No changes are planned in the plant's flour mill.

First construction work will started on the head house and within possibly 30 days its machinery will be in operation to handle grain in the present storage space.

It will likely be around the first of June before all of the new construc-




