Voting Strength in Foard Heavier Than For 1932 Primary

Foard County's voting strength this year is considerably heavier than it was for the last election year, 1932. Total poll tax payments this year amount to 1,497, compared with 1,139 two years ago, a difference of 358.

There is a gain in voting

strength in each voting precinct of the county. The total number of poll tax receipts for the four Crowell boxes amounts to 723, or almost half of the county total.

FREE VOTE INFORMATION

Any person becoming 21 af ter Jan. 1, 1933, and before any election in 1934 at which he or she wishes to vote is entitled to a free vote. Only such persons as become 60 years of age on Jan. 1, 1933, or prior thereto are entitled to a free vote.

The date of a person's be coming 60 years of age will likewise govern as to a person be coming blind, deaf, dumb, per-manently disabled or losing a hand or foot. Therefore the right of exemption for causes next above named for any given year is dependent upon whether or not such cause existed on Jan. 1 of the preceding






