Bryan O'Connell, county relief administrator, has received following information from the Texas Relief Commission: "In both emergency and second-

ary drouth counties alike, emergency relief will be given to all needy persons and dependents, subject to investigation by the Social Service divisions of the local Emergency Relief Administrations. Existing policies and pro-cedure will be followed, except as otherwise noted in this section. "Relief shall be given to all needy persons whose available re-

sources are inadequate to provide the necessities of life for themselves and for their dependents." A definition of available resources was given as follows: "In determining the extent to-

which available resources are insufficient, particular attention will be given to:
"a. Cash resources and property convertible into cash, except

that applicants must not be required to sell household property or property essential for normal farming operations. "b. Credit available from private or public agencies, including crop production loans, seed loans,

and special government food loans if and when available. "c. Benefit payments from the Agricultural Adjustment Admin-

istration. "The relief program in both towns and open-country in desig-

nated drouth areas will be based primarily upon cash payments for work on approved projects, payable by check.

"As drouth funds are limited and must be divided among 199 counties, the budgets must be held to very reasonable limits. Relief can anly be granted to the extent of the budgetary needs."


