ing copies of a telegram which I sent to the Governor concerning the former life and deportment of a certain party who had been convicted and whose application for a pardon was pending. They have pretended to believe the telegram was, a voluntary contribution on my part to induce the Governor to grant the pardon. As a matter of fact, they well know the law required the District Judge to make such reports when requested by the Board of Pardons and they also well know this telegram was sent as an official duty and in response to the request of the board; yet they have not been open and fair enough to so state to those whom they have sought to poison against me. Every District Judge in the state makes these reports to the Governor and the Board of Pardons. I have probably made more than a hundred of them, and in none of them have I protested the granting of a pardon nor have I recommended it for the reason I consider the granting or refusing to grant clemency a matter for the Governor and the Board of Pardons to decide and not a responsibility of the District Judge. The telegram which I sent read as follows:

"Greene comes from one of best families this part of state. Never accused of crime before indictments these cases. Do not believe is criminal at heart. My opinion he was first unwittingly drawn into violation by trying to assist friend whom he thought in difficulty through unexpected adverse turn operations entered into with honest intentions and that subsequent violations resulted from efforts to extricate himself from first mistake. Money all repaid by bonding companies and if you feel clemency should be granted under circumstances, I have no protest. In other words, whatever you do is all right with me."

In making the report, I considered that the Governor was entitled to know the truth concerning the matter and I challenge any one of those who have been trying to make capital out of it to put his finger on one single word or statement in it that is not the truth. It may be that some of the opinions expressed were not shared by others; but they were expressed as opinions and not stated as facts and they constituted my honest conclusions from the facts that were available to me at the time.


As above stated, the law requires the District Judge to make these reports and common honesty requires that he tell the truth in them. I have made many of them and whoever is elected District Judge for the next term will be compelled to continue to make them or else be guilty of violating the laws of the State. L of course, have no apology to make for trying, as best I could. to comply with the law and perform my duties in an honest, conscientious manner. At the request of the board, these reports cover matters that are not shown by the court record, such as the nature of the family, whether he has been a constant violator of the law and therefore a criminal at heart and whether or not he would probably make good if granted clemency. These are the points covered by the above report and which I try to cover by every report which I make to them.

It is quite probable I could find incidents in the life of my opponent in this race that would justly constitute the basis of adverse criticism, but I have felt that such a course was not proper. especially for one seeking the high office of District Judge. I have preferred to conduct a clean, honorable campaign and seek election upon my own merits, feeling that the demerits of my opponent, however monumental they may be, would be no proof of my fitness and qualifications to be District Judge. On this basis I solicit the favorable consideration of the voters of the district in the primary next Saturday.

The words of the prophets surged into their minds. Here indeed was a son of David; here was the promised leader who should free his people, drive the Romans before him, and sit again upon the throne in Jerusalem. With a great shout they surged forward.
