Austin, Texas.-Commercial failures in Texas during January numbered only 59, the fewest for any January since 1920, when 33 bankrupt companies were reported, according to Bevard Nichols, editor of the Texas Business Review, issued monthly by the Bureau of Business We wish to sincerely thank our Research at the University of Texas.

"This compares with 47 insolvens in December and 61 in January of 1929," Mr. Nichols said. "Liabilities of the 59 bankrupt companies totaled \$757,000, against \$1,181,000 for the 61 failures in January a year ago. Many of the failing companies were small concerns, the average liability amounting to but \$13,000, compared to \$20,000 in January,


