IS EVERY ONE IN THE CENSUS? Complete Census Report Is of Great Importance to Crowell and Foard County: Co-operation By All is Needed

CROWELL, FOARD COUNTY, TEXAS, TEXAS, FRIDAY 18, 1930

For the next ten years the outside world will judge the popula-tion of Crowell and Foard County by the official government census that has practically been completed here. Various maps, statistics, almanacs and other sources, up to 1940, will list the local population according to the 1930 census figures.

Census enumerators everywhere have encountered some diffi-culty in taking the census and no doubt there are a number of instances in which persons have been entirely overlooked.

Every man or woman interested in the welfare of his community should take it upon themselves to take a few hours, if necessary, and check up and see if everyone in this city or county has been enumerated.

Anyone who has not been enumerated is requested to send his or her name to Mrs. Pearl Carter at Quanah, enumerator for the city of Crowell, and she will return a census blank. The Foard County News will also be glad to take anyone's name and see that it is placed with the proper authorities.

There are a number of people here on the highwav paving pro-gram, the city paving work, telephone work, and oil work, most of whom are entitled to be listed in the local census, that may not be enumerated.

Won't you help to see that the local census is complete? Let's make it a popular question to ask all local people if they have been enumerated and if they know of anyone who has not been enumerated. Wouldn't it be worth any trouble that we might go to if we can find persons that the census escaped? Any person that intends to be in Crowell or Foard County for only a short while is entitled to be enumerated here if he or she has not been enumerated elsewhere.

Due to Mr. Womack's ill-health no tion of the event although the observance of this day brought many happy memories to the old couple.



WHY EVERY FARM IN FOARD COUNTY SHOULD HAVE 300 LAYING HENS


There are a number of reasons why every farmer in Foard County hould have three hundred laying hens, but one of the most important of these is the direct benefit to the farmer himself. Since he collects most of his income in the fall; he is apt to spend more than is wise be-fore the first of the year. This means that in the spring months he must curtail his expenditures unless he has an additional income.

The farmer who has a large flock of laying hens helps his country keep its trade balance, for if Foard County prospers we must not buy as much as we sell.

Owing to the late season and the irregularity of the rainfall vegeta-bles do not always do well. Especally is this true to the southern part of the county which is mostly mixed land. Hence the people of Foard County use lots of shipped-in vegetables.

Foard County is well suited to poultry raising, having an abundance of sunshine and being well drained. The farmer who has three hundred laying hens not only takes care of he vegetable bill but the entire food oill as well.

The farmers are using more and more tractors every year which means they are using less grain. When the demand for grain has lessened there is apt to be an over production of cotton which is almost as disasterous as a drought. I am speaking
