The increase in consumption dairy products in the United States in recent years has given the American dairy industry a practically unin-terrupted period of financial well-being during a time when other agricultural industries have had peroidical ups and downs, according to the Bureau of Agricultural Economics.

Statistics compiled by the bureau show that people in the United States are now drinking more milk, eating more butter, cheese and ice cream, and using more condensed and evaporated milk than they were ten years ago. In addition to this per capita increase in consumption there are today nearly 15 million mouths to feed in the United States than there were a decade ago. Each person is now consuming mately 13 gallons more milk per year than in 1919; 3 pounds more butter; pound more cheese; 2 pounds more ndensed and evaporated milk, and




## AIR MAIL FATALITIES FOUND TO BE LOWER

The mortality rate of airplane pilots during the first six months of 1929 in contract mail operations was one to every 1,063.293 miles, ac-cording to figures made available by the Aeronautics Branch of the Department of Commerce. This was a decrease of 50 percent under the **rate** for the first half of 1928, a comp**ari**son of figures showed.

The number of miles flown by con-tract mail operations in the first half of 1929 (6,379,776) nearly equals the mileage for the entire year of 1928 when 7,846,296 miles were flown, and seven pilots and nine passengers were killed, the Department stated.

Mr. Vecera in commenting on the results said: "If t had not been for the terraces on my farm during the heavy rains that we have had the past year, I would not have any soil or crop." Mr. Vece-ra is making preparation to put more terraces on his field.



a question of fact, and not of law, so I won't pass any opinion upon it, but will let the fury decide."

#### Mingling Old and New

Curfew in the ancient city of Rouen, France, now rings by electricity. The curfew bell has heretofore been worked by hand, but now it has been wired to the great clock, said to be the oldest in the world, in the tower. As soon as the clock strikes nine, the bell begins to toll automatically and continues for a quarter of an hour. The clock itself was manufactured in 1389 and for five centuries it ran with out repair. It has only one hand, marking the hours.

#### Air Currents Charted

The government has recently published the first chart of the air currents, the publication dealing with the air currents of the North Pacific. The chart shows wind diagrams at altitudes of 10,000 feet, 5,000 feet and 2,500 feet and at sea level for the areas in the vicinity of Manila, Guam. Peers Harbor, Seattle, Medford, San Francisco, Los Angeles, San Diego, Coco Solo, Canal Zone and Hongkong.
