### Let's Help Each Other

(Editorial)

Of all times for local people to seriously consider the matter of supporting local firms, it should be now. A trying period is already with us and with the closest co-operation, conditions will be much better than they would otherwise be.

It is of the utmost necessity that we keep every dollar possible at home. We have mentioned it before and we will mention it again that tests have proven that a dollar circulates twenty times within a community during a year. The dollar sent away moves once and never returns.

There are people in Crowell today that are out of work and whose future outlook is very gloomy because they have been laid off from various jobs because business with the firms for which they have worked has fallen off to too great an extent to justify their employer to keep them on the payroll.

Of course general conditions have been largely responsible for this, but the point that we are trying to bring out is, that if the local trade that's going to out-of-town firms, mail order houses and itinerant peddlers were turned over to local merchants there would be a great many jobs open to local persons that are in great need of employment.

Another situation that we are facing, and which we have already experienced, is that without proper support, we are bound to lose more local firms and industries and consequently we will have more people suffering from lack of employment. Of course we would like for additional industries to come to Crowell and provide a payroll, but isn't it just as important that we give the proper support to keep the industries that we have from failing as it is to se-

In cases where you have to order certain items, in all probability there is a local firm that can order that item for you and give you a better deal on it than you could secure by ordering it yourself and the profit from the transaction would stay at home instead of going elsewhere.

In speaking of patronizing local firms, before this lesson can really be brought home to local people, the business men of the town and their families, in many cases, must become more patriotic along this line themselves. Too many feel that all local people should patronize their line of business, but that it is all right for their families to buy their needs in another line from out-of-town firms. Unthinkingly, many local firms will buy certain supplies for their business that could be supplied through local channels just as cheaply if they would take the time to find out about such matters.

There is one certain method of making times better, a method which we control ourselves, that of doing everything possible to keep our own money in our own community.

A situation resulting from co-operative efforts of the people along this line, might be something like this: John Jones and Company would put Bill Smith back on the job. Other firms might do likewise. Bill Smith and family could buy needed dry goods, groceries and various other items, and the same would be true of other reinstated employees and their families. The grocerman would naturally be in a position to buy more of the farmers' produce and pay a better price for it.

Of course we could go on and on with such a story but we bebelieve anyone can readily see how the community as a whole would benefit by closer co-operation along this line.

Folks, we must help each other in order to help ourselves.

### Surface Tanks Are Cleaned with Dynamite for law enforcement positions.

Marlin-No need anymore to skin p the mules and lose one's religion scraping the mud out of surface tanks, for a new cheap and practical method in which dynamite used has been developed by Da Clinton, county agent of Falls cour

ty. About every five years these watering places get so filled up with mud that after putting it off as long as possible farmers finally spend an average of two weeks to do a job that is now done with dynamite in half a day. It used to cost from 40 cents to 75 cents per yard to move dirt that has been removed in these Falls county demonstrations for 16 cents per yard. Three tanks have been cleaned out by the new method in the service were tipping them off. the past summer and at least 50 more are to be done this fall.

In explaining, Mr. Clinton says: 'If the tank is not dry, drain off the water. In the last job we set set charges of dynamite in five rows 30 inches apart and 22 inches apart in the row. A dairy herd demonstrator in Bastrop county says his 10 cows have paid him from \$83 to \$95 per month above feed for his labor and care of milk and for the use of five acres of sudan pasture. Two others declare that their cows are feeding themselves and the family, helping to pay for farm improvements, and re-building the land besides.

M. W. Franks in Coryell county ays he'd rather milk dairy cow than pick cotton, and thinks \$93 above feed cost from 13 cows in one ummer month isn't so bad. His ood cost \$1.50 per hundred, the cost of producing a pound of butterfat was 14½ cents, and it sold for 43 cents. He stays by his cows and plants surplus land in cotton.

In Fisher county 25 cows in deminstration herds have produced fat for 21.4 cents per pound. Sudan grass pasture lowered the cost 5.3 cents per pound and increased the profit \$1.25 per head.

### FINGERPRINTS TAB FEDERAL WORKERS

### Civil Service Commission Wages War on Crooks.

Washington.-The United States Civil Service commission spares no pains in probing the character of prospective federal employees, especially

In endeavoring to separate the chaff from the wheat the commission has striven to keep abreast of the times, so much so, in fact, that it may be said that it is next to impossible for a man with a "record" to worm his way into a position with Uncle Sam. Fingerprints are largely responsible for this barrier.

A few years back, along with the general increase in crime, mail robberies in large centers took a sudden and startling jump. The circumstances of many of the thefts pointed to inside assistance, or at least inside information. The accuracy with which holdup

### First Experiments.

The first experiments with finger printing postal employees were made in the New York City post office. The result was the discovery of a considerable number of men employed in the office who had criminal records. Having found a way to eliminate

criminals already employed, the next step was to enlarge the system to prevent further employment of those who might seek to enter Uncle Sam's service to extend their field of criminal operations.

Gradually, as the means is made available by congress, the Civil Service commission is establishing a system whereby eventually every person who enters the federal civil service will be fingerprinted. The commission has installed a fingerprint system in approximately 1,200 cities, including Washington, and in those cities all appointees are fingerprinted for comparison with the records of the central fingerprint register of the Department of Justice.

Thus far the results have more than justified the expense involved. For example, the losses of the New York City post office were reduced 50 per cent during a Christmas holiday rush by fingerprinting all applicants for temporary employment.

### Value Is Proved.

If there was any doubt as to the value of fingerprinting in connection with civil service examinations it was dispelled by the commission's experience in fingerprinting all applicants for positions under the bureau of prohibition. Many crooks attempted to obtain employment in the prohibition force. Fingerprints, however, kept

Fingerprint records taken by the civil service commissioner's agents throughout the country are first checked locally, but the keystone of the whole system is the central finger print register of the Department of





# Babson's Tip On Advertising a

What Roger Babson, soothsayer of Wall Street, says frequently carries considerable weight in financial circles. It does not follow, however, that intricately phrased "Babsoncharts" and "barometer letters" would hold much of inspiration for advertising men, or, for that matter, the run of sales executives. An exception to this occurred April 1st when, on page 1 of his "Reports," Mr. Babson took time off from more technical matters to discuss the subject of Sales and Advertising. Said he in part:

"What we need in this period is courage in advertising. Well placed, vigorous advertising is a powerful tonic for sales. Remember that every readjustment offers a great opportunity to prepare for good business. How? When times are dull the general tendency has been to cut down on advertising expenditures. This means that less space is used in newspapers and magazines to create goodwill for products.

"Therefore, when things are quiet, outlay for advertising should give a greater return, because of more concentrated public attention. People do not stop reading magazines and newspapers during such periods. They probably read more, and when rivals and others reduce their advertising space far more attention is attracted to those who continue advertising. . . Less advertising by others may be far more valuable to you than reductions in the price of the space you are using. When stocks are selling under their real value they are usually good buys. They are at bargain levels. The same applies to commodities. In a similar way, when advertising values are at a maximum, space should be bought. This is a good way to lay the foundation for an increase in sales."
