Council To Consider Annexation Of 21 Acres At West City Limits

Muleshoe city councilmen tomorrow will consider the possibility of annexing 21.47 acres of land to the city, it was announced Saturday as the agenda was drawn up for the October council session. The land lies in the Richland Hills area, most of it west of the present city boundaries. (See map, Page 5).

The larger territory, 20.67 acres, stretches virtually all along the west side of the Richland Hills area, west of West 20th Street, and will include "several properties already having houses." City Manager Albert Field explained.

The houses which are in the proposed annexation area all border West 20th street on the west side. The area is approximately one block deep except for a two-block area between Ave. C and Ave. D. In that same area, however, is a block of land already inside the city limits.

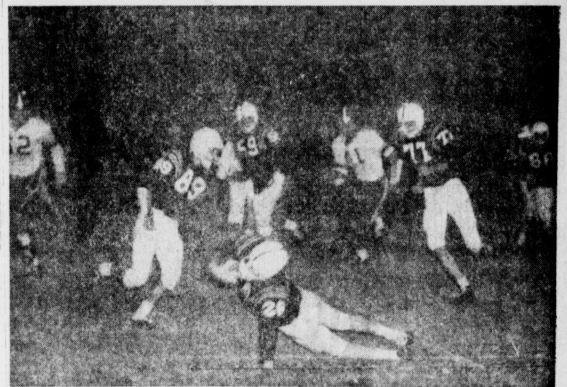
Still another area being considered for possible annexation is a half-block strip along the east side of 17th street, extending from the rear of the Richard Hills Baptist Church property to the end of 17th.

Included in the region are a four-unit apartment house, the Colonial, and a six-unit series of duplexes, opened recently. The duplexes are known as the Monterey apartments.

The 17th street properties already are being served with city water and sewer, the manager said, as are homes on 20th street which lie outside the present city boundaries.

If the councilmen decide to annex the property, they will pass an ordinance authorizing the mayor to run notices in the paper, telling of the action. Property owners in the area covered will be permitted to appear at a public hearing to be set later and voice their opposition to the move, Field explained.

This it will be 20 to 30 days before the property can be admitted to the city provided the councilmen move to accept the area and no protests are made. The annexation matter is expected to be the principal business considered at Monday's council session, due to start at 2:30 that afternoon.

Powerful Denver City Horses Ride Rough-Shod Over Mules

Muleshoe's Mules lost their first game this season to the No. 2 ranked Denver City Mustangs 32 to 3 Friday night in Benny Douglas Stadium.

The Mustangs, playing heads up football, dominated the field from the start of the first quarter to the end of fourth quarter. Denver City received the kick-off on their 16-yard line and ran it back to their 46-yard line where they moved to the Muleshoe 45 before they punted to the Muleshoe 15-yard line.

The Mules moved only two yards before having to punt to the Mustang 49. The Mustangs, with the aid of a 15-yard penalty, moved to the Mule 1-yard line and David Mitchell punched over for a touchdown with three minutes and 40 seconds left in the first quarter. Jimmy Young then slipped in for two more points.

Muleshoe took the ball on their 15-yard line and advanced to the 36-yard line where they punted to the Denver City 9-yard line as the quarter ended.

The Mustangs tried to pass from their 14-yard line, but it was intercepted by Joe Adams on the 24-yard line and a 15-yard penalty moved it back to the 39-yard line. John Thompson threw a 20-yard pass to Billy Darnell at the 19-yard line. Adams then moved the ball in yards before having to punt to the Mustang 49. Officials To Look At Road Projects

Bailey county commissioners at their October meeting Monday will take a long look at the various road projects under way in this county as a major part of their tomorrow's agenda, County Judge Glen Williams said Saturday.

Of top interest at the moment is the Portales-Muleshoe road which is being built as a "dry-weather" road to connect the two county seat towns, looping off 15 to 20 miles from the present route via Clovis. The road, although dirt, "will be the kind of road that can be traveled throughout most of the year," Judge Williams said, "and, of course, eventually it will be paved."

The route has virtually been completed on the New Mexico side, although gravel will be needed to cover the sand beds now existing along the route. Commissioner Loyd Stevens, in whose district the route lies, has been attempting to sign up the last of the easements. The route should be completed before the end of the year.

The Longview FM route which will parallel the present SH 214, is another road project that the commissioners will study at their session tomorrow.

This route connects the Baileyboro-FM746 route with continuing pavement, and this will provide pavement along a four-square area. The distance to be paved by the present project is a seven mile strip between Baileyboro and intersecting FM-746. Judge Williams said 29 different parcels are involved in that route, and all but three have been settled. He said it is expected the others will be wound up within the next few days.

Meantime, work of signing up tracts along U. S. 84-70 to the Farmer county line to the northwestern edge of Muleshoe is proceeding, although there are still "two or three" tracts yet to be signed up, it was explained.

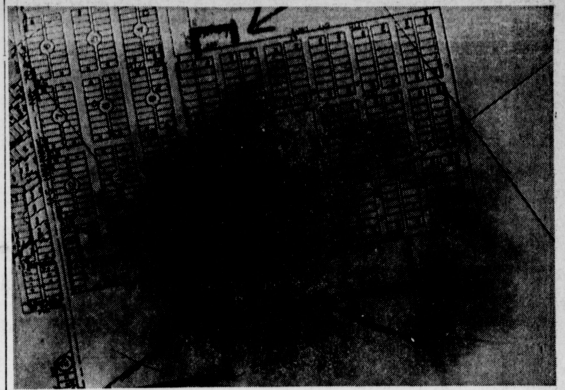

Gladiator's Helmet Dug Up

LAVENHAM, England (AP) — A Roman helmet, which may be the first gladiator's helmet to be unearthed in Britain has been found on a farm near this Suffolk village.

Officials of the Tower of London Armouries say the constructor of the helmet strongly resembles one used by the gladiators in Roman times. A similar helmet was found in Pompeii and is now in the National Museum at Naples.

"It is quite different from any of the British Museum's five Roman helmets found in Britain," said J. W. Brailsford, deputy keeper of the Department of British and Medieval Antiquities at the museum. These are legionary or cavalry parade helmets.

Newcomers Need Texas Car Tags, DPS Chief Says

Most new residents of Texas are required to buy new vehicle registration plates for their automobiles as soon as they establish residence in Texas. The same is true of those who accept gainful employment in the State.

Actually, Texas observes a reciprocal passenger car registration agreement with all other states. Fourteen States permit non-residents to obtain license plates at varying periods after they establish residence or obtain gainful employment. All other States demand immediate purchase of new plates, and — in observance of the reciprocal agreement — so does Texas.

R. W. Townsley, Director of the Texas Highway Department, Motor Vehicle Division, has reminded all law enforcement agencies in the State of the re-

Enforcement of out of State license plate agreements is very important to law enforcement since a current license plate, in addition to providing revenue to build and maintain roads, serves to identify a vehicle with its owner," Townsley said.

He pointed out that varying "grace periods" are allowed new residents moving to Texas from these states:

30 days — Alabama, Colorado, Georgia, Mississippi, Ohio, Tennessee, West Virginia, Wisconsin.

60 days — Virginia, Wyoming.

Six months — Connecticut, Minnesota.

On the next December 31 — California, Kansas. New residents from all other States must obtain license plates as soon as they move to Texas, or as soon as they accept a job in the Lone Star State. The only exceptions are daily commuters from bordering States, who need not relicense their vehicles though they may work in Texas. Non residents in Texas as visitors or students and not engaged in gainful employment may operate on Texas high-way with their current home state license plates. However, such plates must be renewed prior to the non resident's home state enforcement date or Texas plates must be purchased.
