GLENN HOLDER DIED 31 DAYS AFTER INJURY

CAUSED BY SPINAL INJURY RECEIVED IN SHALLOW WATER DIVE ON MAY 11TH

The accident causing the death occurred on May 11th when the youth's head struck the bottom of four feet of water after a dive of ten feet from the Santa Fe bridge that crosses Pease River. Paralysis, from just below the shoulders and over the rest of the body, was instantaneous. He was brought to the Crowell heavital and about two weeks Crowell hospital and about two weeks later was returned to his home, how-ever, he was never relieved from his paralyzed condition, although never lost consciousness and always maintained a cheerful attitude, in spite of the fact that he knew death was certain.



Since county agents have been stressing the importance of cow testing and proper feeding, a number of farmers and dairymen are finding out why milking cows has not paid them a profit. County Agent DuPuy, of Bee County, induced a farmer to weigh his milk. He also tested for butter fat and took note of what each cow consumed in the way of feed. After testing for a month, he learned that several cows in his herd were consuming feed costing from 18 to 25 cents more than their milk was worth, not taking into account the labor of milking and caring for the animals. Prior to the test, the farmer considered these cows about the average in his herd. By weeding out these boarders, this man has doubled

his net profit.

Mr. DuPuy found another farmer who was losing money milking cows. The error in this instance was in the feeding. This farmer was feeding altogether too much high-priced feed when a different ration would have produced as much milk at half the

Another farmer in Bee County said that his cows were not paying, but upon investigation it was learned that the milk the calves were consuming was not credited to the cows, nor the value of the calves. In all three cases, no credit was given the cow for the fertilizer made available.—Farm and



HELPING TO BUILD TEXAS

Dallas will soon begin on its new sewer system, bonds of \$4,000,000 for which were recenty voted. Gainesville is to have a \$60,000 sweet po tato curing plant on farmer's pledges to plant 1,000 acres in that unually remunerative crop. The yield normal ly is 2,000,000 bushels on the 1,000 acres. The first exclusive turkey raising plant in the Electra area start-ed early this year with a flock of 50 hens and six toms and a 1,000egg incubator.

When the Borden milk plant was opened at Waco a year ago, its equipment was designed to anticipate needs of three years. So keen has been the interest in dairying that already the plant has had to increase its capacity and has installed equipment for manufacturing sugared condensed, whole condensed sweet milk and ice cream mix. Receipts are now running more than 90,000 pounds a

Indications are that the so-called "hill country" of Texas will entertain more tourist-visitors this year than in its previous history. Kerrville, Junction, Llano and nearly a dozen other towns in that section not only are advertising for visitors but preparing to take care of their needs in the way of hotel and camping facili-ties. 

MILKING THREE TIMES A DAY

According to experiments at the agricultural school of the Louisiana State University, frequent milkings of heavy producing cows increases the amount of milk secured by twenty per cent. This test was merely in verification of what has been quently determined with cows on test. When the udder becomes full, it seems that the cow ceases to manufacture more milk until she has a place to put it.

It would hardly pay to milk a small producer more than twice a day. As a matter of fact, there are many cows that are not worth milking at all. But, if a cow is a good producer and the yield of milk can be increased one-fifth by three milkings instead of two, it is worth while. With a herd of five cows, three milkings are the same as having six cows on twice-a-day milking .- Farm and
