Mrs. R. L. Kincaid, president of the Thirteenth District Parent-Teach and exchanged one bushel of cucumbers and exchan

vegetables, tomatoes and tomato preserves. I brought back several large pumpkins and canned twenty-one cans of pumpkin and seventeen cans of sweet potatoes. I canned ten pints of grape marmalade, two pints of sweet peppers, four quarts of hot pepper, eleven pints of pinto beans and six hundred and sixtyeight cans of vegetables, meats, pre-serves and fruit, along with two and one-fourth bushels of dried peas that I went to the sand and gathered on the halves. In all I have about five.
I raised about fifty friers and have an adequate supply of milk, butter

and eggs. I got a recipe file with tickets saved from one of my local stores and began collecting recipes, being careful of my selection. I attended several lectures on adequate diets from A. & M. experts adding such recipes as they gave us to better the health of our families.

Miss Dosca Hale, our Home Demonstration Agent, also gave us a dem-onstration on the adequate diet. I never add a recipe that calls for expensive foods as there are plenty of (Continued on Last Page)







TAXES ARE TOO HIGH

Anyone who pays taxes is painfully aware that the steadily increasing cost of government is one of our greatest handicaps to a general re-turn of better conditions. In spite of this realization, tax news from Chicago comes with a distinct shock. On twenty-nine big mortgaged buildings being managed for the benefit of the bondholders, taxes this year are almost as much as is being paid to the investors. Taxes were one-fifth of all the revenue and twice as much as was paid for

fuel, gas, light and power.

Here is a clear-cut example of loss caused by our top-heavy, costly system that piles up expenses to be paid back by taxpayers, frequently from very poorly lined pockets. The George M. Forman Realty

Trust, forced to undergo this great expense, is operating the buildings for many thousands of small investors, distributed through every state Its methods have been studied and praised in Washington, and by banking and real estate leaders. yet, although it reports satisfactory earnings to be distributed to its bondholders, they have been deprived of sorely needed additional income through our too-high cost of government.

OLD TIME SPEEDERS

None will deny that the traffic problem, especially in our larger cities, is becoming extremely acute. Added to the congestion, which appears unavoidable, is the menace of the inattentive driver and the willful

I figure that I am entitled to one major mistake a week. This is my quota. As long as I keep within it I feel all right. And frequently I run over.
