



UNEMPLOYMENT COMPENSATION in TEXAS

What Makes a Man Ineligible For Benefits?

Question 11: "What must

be unemployed and still not be able to draw any benefits.

(1) If you quit your job with-out any reason, the Commission weeks before you can draw any benefits. Suppose you quit in the middle of the week. You draw no draw your first check.

(2) If you are fired for misconduct, the Commission may force you to wait as long as nine weeks -plus the two weeks' waiting pe-

(3) If you fail to sign up for work at the public employment office; or, if you refuse to accept work when the employment office finds it for you; or if you ordinarily have a private occupation such as farming or carpenter work, when you do not have regular work, and you refuse to follow it; then the Commission may make you wait five weeks-plus the two weeks waiting period-before you can draw your first check.

(4) Strikers are not eligible to

draw benefits. These last two penalties (3 and 4) will be discussed in detail later

(5) If your employer gives you a week's wages when he fires you, then you cannot draw any benefits for that week. That week also is not counted when your benefits and your eligibility for benefits is

(6) If you are drawing Workmen's Compensation for a certain week, then you cannot get a bene VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURAL fit check for that week, nor car BOYS RUN TERRACE LINES you count that week in establishing your eligibility for benefits.

(7) If you are getting an old

Do I Have to Take Any Job Offered Me?

Question 12: "One of the previous articles said that I must accept new work when it was offered to me, or I would become ineligible for benefits. Suppose I am not trained for that new job; or suppose the new job would make me-a union worker-violate the obligations of my union membership. Must I still take the

ob? Answer: The aim of these employment offices is to get you, as nearly as possible, into work that is suitable for you. Of course, the Commission wants to keep as many men working as possible; but all the facts are to be considered when a man is offered a new

In deciding whether the new job is suitable for you, the Commission can consider the following: The degree of risk involved to your health, safety and morals; your physical condition and your

The Commission will also consider the chances for getting lo-

sider the chances for getting local work at your customary job, the length of time you have been without a job, and the distance of this new work from your home.

However, the Commission will not make any man take a new job when it is vacant due to a strike; or if the wages and conditions of work are less favorable than the wages and conditions in similar jobs in that locality; or if taking wages and conditions in similar jobs in that locality; or if taking the job would force you, against your will, to join a company union or would keep you from joining a recognized union.

Are Strikers Eligible for Benefits? Question 13: "A previous ar-ticle said that strikers cannot draw benefits under this Act. Suppose I lose my job as a result of a strike at my factory, although I personally had nothing to do with the strike. Will I be ineligible for benefits?"

Answer: No. But you must be able to prove to authorities that you had no part in the labor dis-

You must show that you were not taking part in, or helping to finance, or directly interested in the labor dispute which stopped the work.

If you belong to a labor union or group, and other members of that union are interested in the dispute, then you will be considered to have a direct interest in it. In other words, if any particular union in any one factory or mine or office becomes involved in a labor dispute, then all members of that local union in that plant are involved and none of them can

draw unemployment benefits.



develop pneumonia suddenly," he said, "but most often it occurs in persons who have, or who recently have had, a cold. Yet many people do not take the cold seriously enough. Suspect every cold. Go to bed immediately if you have fever with a cold, call your physician, and do exactly what he says. By intelligently following your physician's advice at the beginning of the attack, you may ward off the after effects which so often follow neglected colds - pneumonia among them.

"Almost any part of the air passage may sometimes be attacked by bacteria. When the nose is affected we call the condition : cold. The tissues of the nose react to such infection by a profuse mucous discharge or mucous liquid. This discharge is really an attempt on the part of the body to get rid of the germs and their poisons. If the infection is lower down, it causes a sore throat. If the voice box is affected, the condition is called laryngitis. If he germs reach the bronchi, the isease is known as bronchitis. If the germs get down to the lungs, the person affected has pneumonia. Thus it may be seen that the common cold may be the beginning of one of the most serious complica-

tions of the respiratory tract. "These respiratory diseases may be avoided many times by estab-lishing individual health measures. Help prevent colds and pneumonia by proper personal hygiene. Eat moderately, drink plenty of pure water, and sleep 8 to 10 hours every night with windows open. Do not allow the tem-


