John W. unpaid taxes became delinquent, according to figures obtained from the tax assessor-collector's office. Week began last Sunday evening The exact amount of taxes on the llected since Sept. 1, was \$74,-362.83, which constitutes a total of over 81 per cent. This was \$4,011.15 more than was collected

The amount of taxes that were collected during the month of January that were due according the current tax rolls was \$37,-

During the past month taxes for roads collected were \$2,107.98; the ad valorem taxes were \$16. 450.03; and taxes for the common chool districts were \$6,242.99. Taxes for Crowell Independent school district are separate from the taxes of the common school districts. The state taxes collected in January were \$9,123.35. The total state taxes collected were \$17,929.56 and the county taxes were \$56,433.27.

Taxes that were not paid by Feb. 1 became delinquent at that date. The amount of taxes that became delinquent was \$15,867.57 compared with taxes equalling \$29,770.99 that became delinquent last year in Foard County.
The taxes for the Thalia school district, which are also kept separate, showed a total co current taxes of \$5,689.73.
