No 'sweat' on faculty situation

The teacher problem in the Post Public Schools as related to resignations and employment of new teachers is not nearly as black as some people are trying to paint it. In fact, the situation at this time of year is as good or even better than at the same time in any previous year that we can recall.

Monday of this week, only four vacancies remained to be filled on the schools' faculty list, and Supt. William F. Shiver was making preparations even then for a three-day trip within the state to interview applicants for those four vacancies.

Some good teachers have resigned in recent weeks, but qualified teachers have been hired to replace them, and that is the same situation that exists in pratically every school district in

Supt. Shiver told this newspaper that the ideal situation for the Post schools or any other school, for that matter, is to have no more than two or three resignations, but where does it work out that nicely?

'Regardless of how good a teacher is, if he doesn't want to continue living in Post, I have not encouraged him to stay," the superintendent said. He added that most of those who have resigned feel that they are bettering themselves

Shiver pointed out that 17 new teachers came nto the Post school system last year, but that there won't be that many new ones this year. So, where can the present picture of faculty change be said to be worse than it ever has been-as some would have us believe?

The Post schools or any other school would be in a sad shape if it ever lost a teacher or an administrator that could not be replaced. To our knowledge, that hasn't happened yet.

We've lost some good teachers and a couple of good administrators this year, but we have qualified teachers and administrators to replace them. Instead of giving up on a situation that ian't all that bad, let's be thinking of what we can do to make the new school people coming into our community feel that they are more than

Why lunchroom prices went up

Figures supplied by School Supt. William F. Shiver show why the school board found it necessary to raise the price of school cafeteria lunches at their last regular meeting.

Federal commodity products furnished the school lunchroom during the school year just closed were only about half what they were during the 1964-65 school year.

In 1964-65, fruit received by the school through the federal commodity program totaled 105 units. but during 1965-66 dropped to 60 units. Rortyfour units of beef totaling 2,420 pounds were furnished the lunchroom in 1964-65, but dropped to 23 units, or 1,219 pounds, during the school year

Forty-six units of turkey meat, totaling 2,678 pounds, were received in 1964-65, as compared with only 12 units-540 pounds-in 1965-64. The lunchroom did not receive any roust at all in 1965-66, whereas in 1964-65 it received 19 units.

Chicken furnished the lunchroom totaled 56

units, 1,685 pounds, in 1964-66; but dropped to 34 units, or 729 pounds, this last school year. Beans, corn, pear, and other vegetables totaled 68 units in 1964-65, but only 45 units in 1965-66.

This reduction in federal commodities made it necessary for the school to have to purchase more food for the lunchroom, resulting in a sizeable deficit

The lunch price increase: which goes into effect at the beginning of the 1966-67 school year, is from 35 to 40 cents for students and from 40 to 58 cents for adults.

The school superintendent predicts the increased prices will enable the functionom to overcome the deficit, and also indicated that it will make a higher quality lunchroom meal possible.

This was one of those increases the school board didn't want to make, but in the face of dwindling commodities and higher food prices there just wasn't any way of getting around it.

No sensible approach to it yet

Generous-minded Americans contribute over a quarter of a billion dollars a year to 33 national voluntary health organizations and their local or state affiliates. But, as far as we have been able to determine, none of these organizations inchides in its program a sensible approach to low-cost childhood immunization.

The immunication a child should have up to school age, including that required for school. entrance, costs an estimated \$89 under present routing charges. This estimate does not include office visit charges made up the physician, and

those charges generally are from \$4 to \$5 a visit. The immunization and tests a child should have up to school age include DPT, polio, mea-

sles, and smallpox vaccine and tuberculin test. Families in the lower income groups are finding it increasingly difficult to pay for the immunization their children should have. Any help they could ger through a voluntary organization would contribute greatly to the over-all health of the nation. In its cutegory, low-cost childhood immunication appears to be one of the things we need more than some of the things we have or are trying to get -- CD



New paving set on 'bad stretch'

Good news to travelers on U.S. Hwy. 380 is the announcement that new paving will be laid late this summer from Tahoka a little more than eight miles east.

The proposed new paving will replace an experimental stretch paying that has been a headache to drivers ever since it was laid in the 1930's. When constructthe highway department experimented with about three types of mix, one of which included mixture of asphalt with natural soil on the roadbed.

This "bad" stretch of highway runs from the railroad tracks in east Tahoka to the curve a little more than a mile east of the Draw

road Junction with U. S. 380. The new paving will be a hightype two-lane paying, 26 feet wide plus a 9-foot paved shoulder on each side - a total of 44 feet.
