



Gate receipts at this year's Post Stampede and Southwestern Championship Junior Rodeo totaled approximately \$4,150, Donald Windham. Post Stampede secretarytreasurer, said today.

The rodeo association's part of gate receipts came to about \$1,500, which is in addition to what they made on the dance and concossion rights.

Saturday night's crowd, totaling approximately 2,000, was one of the biggest, if not the biggest, crowds ever to attend the final night's performance of a rodeo here. The gate receipts that night were about \$1. 300, not including receipts from the sale of advance tickets by queen candidates and box seat sales.

Early tabulations indicate that this year's roden was about \$300 hetter financially than last year's event.

Except for the first night when rain emptird the stands of spectators about halfway through the show, the rodeo went off smoothly, The complete results were as follows:

Let's not create a 'monster' here

It is dangerous thinking to hold to the premise that a law enforcement arm should "pay for itself" through arrests and fines

While most people here don't accept that premise 100 per cent, too many figure "the law" should pay half its way, or two-thirds its way.

Why is it dangerous?

Because when public pressure is put on to make arrests, officers have but two choices: either to buck the pressure and arrest only law violators or to bear down and arrest just about anybody in sight.

If officers bear down in response to such pressure, we have created a home-grown government monster which the individual citizen has a hard time standing up to in defense of his rights.

To compound the local law enforcement situation, we now have two "competing" arms of the law-the "city law" and "the county law." They work separately, through their separate courts, and into separate treasuries.

When one arm makes more arrests than the other, then there is heck to pay for the hindmost. The public says they are not doing their job well enough because the "other law" is making most of the arrests.

Now let's take a look at the situation from a different angle. There aren't many burglars. murders, rapists, or knife-cutters. These law violators won't "pay the way" of any "law arm." Nobody expects the police or the sheriff's department to arrest enough of these lawbreakers to pay for the "law cars", the salaries, the uniforms, or anything else. Most of these kind of violators don't draw fines anyway. They go to jail or to prison.

That leaves the drinkers to provide most of the income for the law agencies. A check of the arrest books here will clearly show that Back in prohibition days, this field was even better income because selling was illegal, too, and some stiff fines could be meted out to the bootleggers. Today there are only the drunks and the DWIs.

The Dispatch believes, just as do most law abiding folks, that a dranken man in a public place should be arrested and that an intuxicated man behind the wheel of a high-powered car is one of the most dangerous enemies of society.

What's the problem, then, you ask. The problem is that "law arms" can't have arrest quotas. If they have, the individual officer is "pressured" in his decision as to who is a drunk and who lun't.

Some of the bigger cities with traffic messes have traffic arrest quotas. Brother, in those cities drive with one eye in your rear view mirror.

It is the right of the public to criticize their law officers if the public thinks the officers are not "working" hard enough at law enforcement, if they are not patrolling, etc. But to measure their efficiency by the number of arrests is entirely wrong

This newspaper is not writing this editorial to help our lawmen or to protect the drunks. We are writing it point to the simple fact that we the public can create a monster of our own making measuring law efficiency by the total dollars fines for the month or the number of arrests made per shift.

It is the kind of a monster, once created, you and I are going to have to fight if we live here. It is the kind of a monster all our neighbors are ing to do their utmost to avoid. They can do that too simply by not coming here where "our monster" would live

There is no doubt but that good law enforcement is a real financial problem to any community that has it. Most cities cannot afford enough. The pressure builds up from the public as costs nt to put the cost on the backs of the wrong-

Here in this community there is another apach to the problem, if you the public want That is to have a "coordinated" law arm, partially paid by the city and partially paid by the unity, instead of our present dual law arms that "compete" for arrests.

Public pressure here can cut the costs of law enforcement but that will require real coordination and cooperation. Other communities faced with essentially the same problem have brought this about.

This is nothing new. We here in Post have been over the very same ground several times before. We would suggest that we go over it again. If YOU want it, YOU can have it. If you

law enforcement is the kind where the constant presence of the law arm and the efficient develupment of detection skills is such a grave deterrent that there is nobody to arrest because it simply doesn't pay to break the law .-- JC

The hazards of entering a spolling bee these days are many, but one of the greatest is the possibility of your being asked to spell a word like

pneumonoultramicroscopicallicovolcanoconiosis. That's the longest word in Webster's Dictionary, and although its meaning is rather vague. it has something to do with a disease of the lungs sometimes contracted by minors. There are 46 letters in pnoumono-etc. (count them if you like). and this is 16 more than the longest word in the Oxford Dictionary, which has a mere 29 letters. Even so, Oxford's floccipaucinihilipilification

(the act of estimating as worthless) could give some people spelling trouble.

Most of us are old enough to remember when antidisestablishmentarianism was the longest word in anybody's dictionary, so the English

language must he becoming more complicated. But with only 28 letters. it hardly rates today, and as a sticker in a spelling bee, it isn't a patch on the other two. Neither is anti-interdenominationalistically, a 12-letter double-barreled word which wouldn't faze any good speller, if he stopped to
