





### Doctor shortage is community's problem

Last week's Dispatch told the story of Dr. C. H. Bausman's temporary retirement from practice because of illness and the hospital problem it created.

A serious community problem is involved. Our problem, as it has existed for a number of years, is a familiar one-a doctor shortage. If this problem is solved, there is no hospital problem. The hospital problem is relevant because a hospital must have physicians to admit patients and treat them. A hospital cannot operate without physicians

When The Dispatch declared last week that the doctor shortage and hospital had hit an alltime low, this newspaper was referring to the obvious fact that without local physicians on the staff and without patients, the hospital was at its economic bottom.

The Dispatch in its reporting was not in any way critical of the efforts of Garza Memorial Hospital trustees, nor was any such criticism intended

In fact, this newspaper has been impressed with the good job the trustees, together with Hospital Administrator W. C. Stivers, have been doing to operate the hospital with the physicians who are available.

A survey of county hospitals across West Texas made recently revealed that Garza Memorial Hospital was operated on a smaller patient load than other hospitals, but with a much less tax rate required for county support and less operating deficit per patient.

Our hospital is one of the most efficiently operated in the entire West Texas area from the economic standpoint. Credit all this to a hardworking hospital board and efficient administra-

For the first nine months of 1966, the hospital was in considerable better financial shape with only one physician on the staff most of the year than it had been for the first nine months of 1965 when the hospital had two physicians most of the time.

This was due to all types of economics devised by the hospital trustees and administrator.

Members of the hospital staff, for example, in many cases have been selected for individual abilities to perform two needed jobs, not just one. This has enabled the hospital to offer just as good service with less total personnel. Finding and hiring experienced personnel of this kind has taken both time and effort.

The current hospital board has been the first to put the hospital's operations on a budget. The county couldn't have more diligent stewardship of bospital affairs than that exhibited by present trustees and administrator.

One final point also needs to be made about Post's physician shortage. Finding additional physicians is the responsibility of the entire community. It is NOT the responsibility of the hospital trustees. Their responsibility is the operation of Garza Memorial Hospital.

That the trustees and administrator have worked hard and are continuing to work at the thankless task of seeking new physicians, on either a permanent or temporary basis until Dr. Bausman can return to practice, simply means that they are doing all they can for this community

But remember, the doctor shortage is OUR problem as a community, not THEIRS as hospital trustees.-JC

#### -Denver City over Post 99.2 Power Ratio 102.4 **3** Points By

THE GAME here Friday night with the Post Antelopes challenging the Denver City Mustangs for the district crown finds the defending champions a narrow 3 point favorite according to the state-wide Harris Rating System. If the game had been played a week ago, the Mustangs would have rated a 4 point edge by Harris. The Antelopes power rating remained unchanged from last week at 99.2, but Denver City's slipped .8 at a point from 103.4. This week's ratings found Stanton dropping to the very bottom of the state's Class AA ratings-193rd out of 193 Class AA teams. Morton rates a 6 point favorite to win their first game in beating Stanton. But the Indians are lowly rated too, ranking 187th.
