

Antelopes geared for invasion of Big Red' gridgers Friday night

Crippled Post team confident

The Post Antelopes, more sorely crippled by injuries than at any other time since the start of the season, attempt to do here Friday night what neither they nor any other team has done in eight years—win a district defeat on the Denver City Mustangs.

Coach Don Orr's Mustangs will lead a 3-2-2 mark into Antelope stadium against the 3-1 mark of Glyn Gregg's Antelopes. The game time set for 7:30.

Denver City opened its district with a 24-13 win over Slaton Friday night while Post was losing Morton, 35-0, in its loop year.

Neither team played a common conference for this season. The Mustangs' only non-loop win was 14-6 blanking of Muleshoe. They lost Seminole, 6-6; Levelland, 0-0; to Brownfield, 12-6, and to Sanford, 7-6.

COACH GREGG said Tuesday that senior quarterback Duke Altman is a "very doubtful" starter against Denver City Friday night. "We will know more about him by this time Thursday," Altman said. A strained ligament in his knee kept him out of the Morton game.

Senior Dick Kennedy, who had been playing at end on offense and halfback on defense, took over the injured Altman against Slaton and is due to start at quarterback against Denver City. Coach Gregg said, "If we're able to get Altman at quarterback, Kennedy will see action as a running back," the coach added.

Halfback Paul Walker, who scored 21 points on three touchdowns and five extra point kicks against Slaton, suffered a knee injury Friday night, and the injured knee was to be sore Tuesday than was right after the game, the coach said.

Walker is tabbed to start against Friday night, along with back Jimmy Bartlett, who re-injured a neck injury in the Morton game. Other casualties from Friday night's game include halfback Tom Heaton with bruises, and center Clyde Cash with an injured knee.

still has the best chance of beating Denver City it has had since the two teams have been in the same district—and that the Antelopes will do just that.

Against Slaton Friday night, Denver City had its closest call in several years in a district game before winning, 24-13. Slaton led at one point, 13-12.

Scouts report that the Mustangs have "perked up" considerably on offense in their last two games, with Coach Orr apparently having

found a backfield combination that will click.

ROBERT KIZER, a 157-pounder who started the season at quarterback, is now playing at a line position, and Gary Hatfield, whose weight is listed at 136 pounds on the program, is the quarterback. He has scored five touchdowns this season for 30 of the 59 points the Mustangs have put on the scoreboard.

Hatfield is a good passer and a dangerous man in an open field.

The halfbacks are Biff Hatfield, Gary's cousin, who weighs 147 pounds, and Charles Rice, whose weight is listed at 130. The fullback is John Powell, a 170-pounder, who started the season at a line position.

AGAINST Slaton, Biff Hatfield gained 111 yards on the ground in 16 carries for an average of seven yards every time he was called on. Gary Hatfield gained 67 yards in 17 tries.

What Denver City lacked in offense through its first five games, it made up for in defense. Going into the Slaton game, four Class AAA teams and Stamford, a Class AA powerhouse, had managed only 25 points against the Mustangs.

Probable starters on offense in the Denver City line are Mike Mead, 160, and Dwayne Young, 175, ends; Kizer, 157, and Leland Tucker, 196, tackles; Dave Emler, 154, and Jimmy Streety, 144, guards, and Allen Arnold, 199, center.

Christmas plans considered by Chamber group

The Chamber of Commerce Retail Promotions Committee met Tuesday afternoon at Judy's Cafe to begin making plans for Post's Christmas promotion.

Dave Sanford is checking upon possible musical entertainment groups which might be available for a musical Christmas opening similar to last year's promotion.

John Brockman is checking with merchants in an informal poll to determine whether the majority want the Christmas opening promotion on Saturday, Dec. 3, or Saturday, Dec. 10.

Santa Claus will make his appearance here during the opening similar to last year when he was escorted into town by the high school band, gave candy to the youngsters, and was available for several hours for interviews with boys and girls on their Christmas desires.

Bryce Martin, committee chairman, reported \$211 left in the Chamber's promotion fund and said that additional funds would have to be obtained from merchants to underwrite the balance of the Christmas promotion's cost.

Merchants in past years have been underwriting the entire cost of the Christmas promotions, but last year's was financed by the balance remaining in the fund from oversubscribed previous promotions.

The promotions committee will meet next Wednesday afternoon at Judy's to draw up a promotions budget, plan a fund-raising campaign, and approve the principal entertainment if the proper kind can be found available.

City's oil activity continues to bustle

The George R. Brown oil interests here have had another busy week.

E. R. (Buster) Moreland yesterday announced potential tests for two new wells, preparations to complete two others, a progress report on a fifth, the rigging up of a sixth preparatory to drilling, and the application for two new locations.

THE NEWEST in-town start is the J. E. Lynn No. 2G, which is located on two vacant lots in the 400 block North Mohawk in the new Westgate Terrace Addition.

The Wes-Tex Drilling Co. moved its rig onto the location, owned by George R. Brown, yesterday morning from the Williams No. 2G test, just north of Westgate Terrace. It will be drilled to the bottom zone of the Gorieta at around 3,750 feet.

The C. L. Williams No. 2G is now ready for completion and oil string has been set.

A completion rig also has been moved on the City of Post Unit 28, No. 1 test location on the original townsite.

Moreland reported the C. L. Williams, Et Al Unit drilling at 2,794 feet yesterday morning.

The two new locations for which applications were made this week are for the C. L. Williams, Et Al Unit No. 2 Well, located 100 feet north of the No. 1 and the F. B. Robinson No. 7G, which will be 58 feet north of the Robinson No. 3G, just west of Chantilly Lane in northwest Post.

The new Williams location is approximately a half mile northwest of the original Post townsite.

MORELAND SAID the No. 2, Unit 35, City of Post, well has been completed north of the First Christian Church as a dual producer from the B and D zones of the San Andres.

The well potentialized at 108 barrels of 31-gravity oil plus 20 per cent water from the B zone and 114 barrels of oil and 20 per cent water from the D zone.

It is located 50 feet west of George R. Brown's triple producer, the No. 1, Unit 35, City of Post.

Speaker says crime is concern of individual

"Probably the most important factor in law enforcement is the individual citizen's attitude," Lt. Gov. Preston Smith said last Thursday night at a public meeting in the primary school auditorium, sponsored by the Woman's Culture Club and Post Lions Club.

Speaking on the subject, "What Can You Do?," Smith said the individual citizen's attitude is an important factor in law enforcement "because in the end it is what the public wants that the public gets in law enforcement as in other things."

The lieutenant governor told his listeners that he had decided to talk about crime "after giving a lot of thought to a subject imperative to Americanism."

"Nearly everybody in this country is against crime except the criminal, and his lawyer won't let him say anything," Smith continued. "Most of us know the difference between right and wrong, although we sometimes hate to make the decision."

"For the first time in their memories," he said, "many Americans, in many of our cities, find themselves afraid to leave their homes in the dark—or in the light, either, for that matter."

He said the consensus seems to be that four factors among many contributing most to the crime wave are these:

1. Overcrowding, frustration and resentment in the slum areas of our towns and cities.
2. Court decisions that have

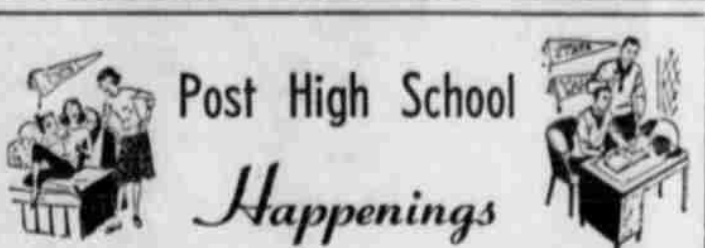

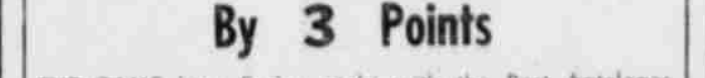

Census Bureau survey of school enrollment to include this area

The Census Bureau's annual survey of school enrollment in the U. S. will be taken during October and will include this area, according to Francis H. Wilmer, director of the Bureau's Regional Office in Denver. The survey, which is aimed at obtaining a count of the number of children and young adults enrolled in the Nation's schools for the new academic year, will be taken here during the work week of Oct. 17-21, the director said. Questions in the survey will cover pupils enrolled in both private and public schools, as well as kindergarten through the elementary and secondary grades and college and professional schools. Additional questions this year are designed to determine the current number of high school dropouts and, for college students the type of college (1- or 4- year) being attended, the type of student housing being used, and the major field of study. The school enrollment survey is taken in conjunction with the Bureau's monthly survey on employment and unemployment taken for the U. S. Department of Labor. The information is collected from a scientifically selected sample of households in this area and from other samples throughout the country. The Bureau interviewer who will visit families in this area during October is Mrs. Lois N. Kennedy of 415 South Ave. R.

Walker leads 'lopes to initial loop win

Fullback Paul Walker spearheaded a crunching ground attack which rolled up a net of 340 yards at Morton Friday night as the Post Antelopes paraded back and forth through the Indians' gridiron tepee for a convincing 35-0 victory in the locals' 4AA lid opener.

The scalping could have been worse, too, if Coach Glynn Gregg had not shown some fourth quarter compassion and inserted a make-shift attack unit of reserves when the tough Antelope defense produced two more scoring chances.

Walker, who rambled 89 yards for a touchdown on the Antelopes' first scrimmage play, totaled 179 yards on 13 carries, scored three touchdowns and booted five perfect PAT placement kicks.

Dick Kennedy, versatile senior, proved his worth as a back-in-quarterback when he took over direction of the Antelope attack and played a standout game after a knee injury sidelined Duke Altman before Post could even get its hands on the football.

A regular this year at either end, halfback or linebacker, Kennedy proved he hadn't forgotten how to run a ball club. He guided the team smoothly, scored one touchdown himself on a 33-yard "sneaky" burst up the middle, rang up 49 yards on six carries, and punted twice for a 45.5 yard average.

Kennedy had to sub as the kicker, too. Just before the half, after Davis Heaton, halfback and regular punter, had gone out with a rib injury, Kennedy really kicked the Antelopes out of trouble. He boomed one 57 yards into the wind with the ball rolling dead on Morton's six-yard-stripe.

Kennedy also recovered one Morton fumble to set up an Antelope touchdown in the third period and played his usual rugged game as a linebacker on defense.

While the victory was the easiest of the season, it very likely can prove to be very costly.

All four regulars of what began as the Antelopes' starting backfield this season were injured in varying degrees — the worst being strained ligaments in Altman's left knee, which may sideline the starting signal caller and passer for the title clash with Denver City.

Halfback Jimmy Bartlett was knocked unconscious in the second period when a diving Morton player hit late and rammed his helmet into Bartlett's neck with a crack heard in the stands after Bartlett had been tackled and was on the ground.

Heaton reinjured the ribs he hurt in a pre-season scrimmage, but returned to action in the second half. Walker came off the field with a swollen knee, but he played the entire game after hurting it in the opening quarter.

eight in the air, forced two fumbles, and held the usually hard-running Indians to but 34 yards aground and one first down rushing in the last half.

Morton Coach Fred Weaver termed Post's defense the finest he has faced all season.

Heaton saved the "whitewashing" for the Antelopes in the first quarter when he caught Donnie Harvey, fleet Morton tailback from behind on Post's 25 after Harvey apparently had broken clear for a touchdown romp from Post's 42.

Tight-end Donnie Windham, whose trademark is crushing tackles and rib jolting blocks, came up with the "block of the game" on the first Post scrimmage play. He cleared out the only Morton defender who had a shot at Walker on the fullback's 80-yard scoring run with a sideline block at midfield to give Walker running room down the sideline.

Morton's only real scoring threat of the game came after the opening kickoff when they drove 71 yards to a first down on Post's 9-yard line. Four plays later, a high pass from center ruined a Morton field goal attempt from the 23 and barefooted end Danny Culpepper was swarmed under on the Antelope 20.

The Indians, who believe in their ground game and have been able to run on all their other opponents, kicked only once the entire game. They ran or passed on fourth down the rest of the night in an effort to get back into the game and several times gave up excellent field position to Post when the fourth down gambles failed to pay off.

Morton spent most of the first quarter with the football, staging two ground drives with Walker's 80 yard TD gallop sandwiched between.

Post held the second drive for downs on its 37 and rolled 63 yards for its second tally in seven plays with Kennedy going up the middle for the last 33 steps.

It was 14-0 at the half with a third Post drive fizzling on the Morton 39 on penalties and pass incompletions.

Early in the third period, the Antelopes stopped a Morton fourth down gamble on the Indians' 49 and moved to payday in seven

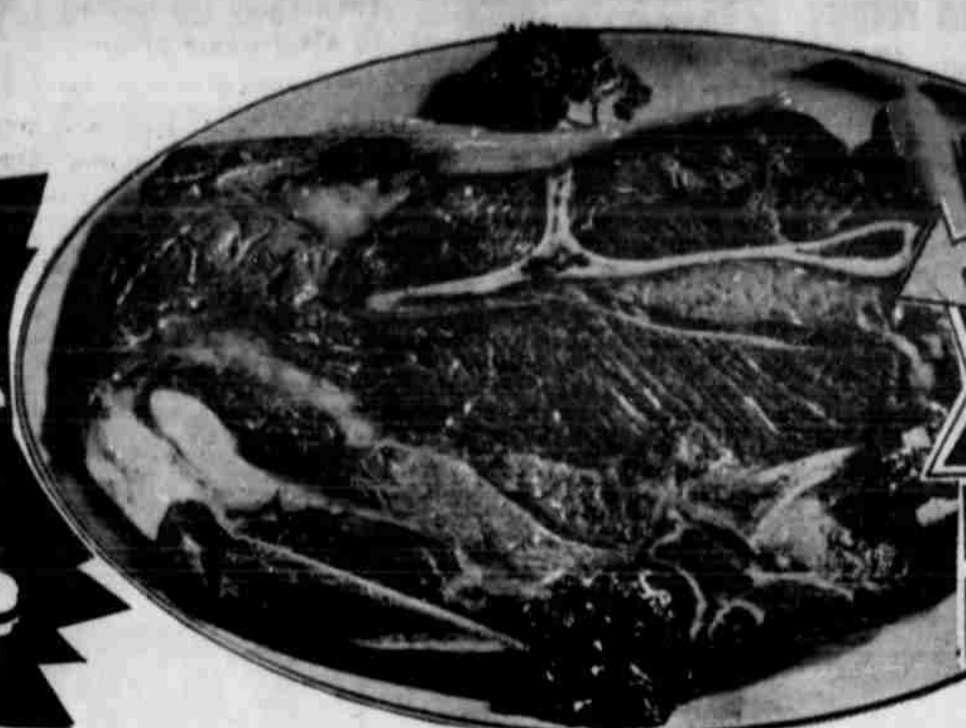
